AROUND THE STATE.

Items of Interest Culled from the Louisiana Press.

Prominent White Man Assassinated by Negroes—Trainmen Killed in a Wreck. Manned Prisoner Leaps to Death. Steamer Carter Sunk.

Louisiana has \$1,574,453.20 on deposit with its fiscal agents.

Boll weevils have been found in Vernon and Calcasieu parishes.

The first cotton bloom of the season was announced from Alexandria.

James Barnes was shot and killed by J. D. Williams at Sterlington.

The annual session of the Louisiana Christian Endeavor Union was held at Shreveport.

During the month of May 979,000 barrels of oil were produced in the Jennings field.

Two convicts escaped from the state penitentiary at Oakley and one from the farm at Angola.

The Capital City Bank has been organized at Baton Rouge, with a capital stock of \$50,000.

As the result of an error in an old government survey many acres of land in Vermilion parish are in dispute.

Capt. D. M. Kilpatrick, a prominent citizen of New Orleans, died at his home in that city after a long illness.

Thomas Harrison, former commissioner of labor for Louisiana, lost his suit to recover his salary for January, 1905.

Firebugs are operating at Alexandria, nine alarms having been turned in during a period of twenty-four hours.

The Louisiana exhibit for the Lewis and Clark exposition at Portland, Oregon, was shipped from New Orleans last Sunday.

The town council of Jeanerette adopted a curfew ordinance and regulated the speed of automobiles to six miles an hour.

Five demonstration farms have been established in Louisiana by agents of the United States department of agriculture.

Breaks in the levees on Red river were reported in Rapides and Bossier parishes. The river is 3.2 feet above the danger line at Shreveport.

J. G. Lee, state commissioner of agriculture and immigration, gave out a report estimating cotton acreage reduction in Louisiana at 21.8 per cent.

Confederate memorial day and the anniversary of the birthday of Jefferson Davis was fittingly observed throughout the state last Saturday.

The steamer H. M. Carter collided with a railroad bridge at Alexandria and sank in six feet of water. No lives were lost and the greater part of the cargo was saved.

Robert White, a manacled prisoner charged with forgery who was being taken to Texas to stand trial, plunged headlong through a window of a moving train near Lake Charles and sustained injuries which caused his death in a short while.

Engineer William Miller and Trainman Coley Cross were scalded to death and another trainman was seriously injured in a passenger wreck on the Southern Pacific Railroad at a point near Sulphur. The accident was caused by a cow on the track.

Ernest Lacour, a prominent white man, was assassinated by a negro at Batchelor. The murderer was captured and lynched and four other negroes said to be implicated in the tragedy were arrested and lodged in jail at New Roads, later being removed to Baton Rouge for safe keeping.
