

Arrangements are under way for the  
grand fete champagne and 4th of July  
festival to be given July 2, 3 and 4  
for the benefit of the building fund of  
Ascension Hook and Ladder Com-

### Proceedings of the School Board

REGULAR MEETING.  
DONALDSONVILLE, LA., June 14, 1905.  
The school board of Ascension parish met  
this day in regular session in the superintend-  
ent's office, with the following members pres-  
ent: E. N. Fugh, president; O. D. Goudran,  
Adolphe Netter, A. L. Bizard, John E. Landry,  
and Dr. J. T. Bringer. Absent: Leon Pizar, E.  
W. Cook and Mathias Rodriguez.  
The minutes of the previous meeting were  
read and approved.

The superintendent made a verbal report  
of the financial standing and the general con-  
dition of the schools, which report was on motion  
received.

The board requested the superintendent to  
submit at the next regular meeting an estimate  
of the probable amount of money necessary to  
run the schools during the next session.

A resolution offered by Dr. Bringer appro-  
priating \$300 to the summer normal school to  
be held in Donaldsonville July 20 to Aug. 4 was  
unanimously adopted.

A committee composed of E. N. Fugh, Adolphe  
Netter and C. D. Goudran was appointed to make  
arrangements for the accommodation and en-  
tertainment of teachers attending the summer  
normal school.

On motion of Mr. Netter, seconded by Mr.  
Landry, Prof. J. L. Rusca was re-elected prin-  
cipal of the Ascension parish high school for  
the ensuing year.

Bills amounting to \$130.20 were approved and  
ordered paid.

There being no further business the board  
adjourned.
