

Bank Dividend Declared.
 At the regular monthly meeting of the board of directors of the Bank of Donaldsonville Wednesday forenoon, President W. M. McCalliard, Vice President Chas. Maurin, Cashier W. D. Park, Assistant Cashier J. J. Brun, Directors C. Kline, L. E. Bentley, N. Eris, J. W. Tucker and C. R. Aleman were present, leaving Hon. Henry McCall and Adolphe Netter as the only absentees. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved; the report of the discount committee, covering transactions since the last meeting, was reviewed and adopted; the cashier submitted a report showing the bank's total volume of business at the close of business on July 3 to have been \$101,433, an increase of \$67,000 as compared with the figures reported on the same date a year ago. The deposits account has grown from \$249,879 to \$418,886 in the past twelve months, while the aggregate of the capital, surplus and undivided profits has increased from \$109,647 to \$121,578.

It was unanimously decided to declare a dividend of 88 a share, payable on demand, and Cashier Park is issuing dividend checks to the stockholders accordingly. A stronger or more practical evidence that the bank is cited in proof of the solid and prosperous condition of the Bank of Donaldsonville.


