It is expected that the convention will be attended by approximately 1500 delegates, including nearly every state in the Union. Hon. Joseph Cannon, speaker of the national house of representatives, has announced his acceptance of an invitation to be present, and among other notable will be Senator Bailey of Texas, Senator Hamer of Indiana, Governor Blanchard of Louisiana, and James J. Hill, president of the Great Northern Railway. A feature of the convention will be a banquet, which is likely to prove one of the largest ever given in St. Louis. While the primary purpose of the convention is to further the movement for a deep waterway from the lakes to the Gulf, resolutions will be adopted urging congress to pass a rivers and harbors bill carrying large appropriations for the improvement of the Mississippi, Ohio and Missouri rivers.

Reduced rates of one fare plus \$2 for the round trip may be obtained over practically every road in the country, and the hotels of St. Louis will make liberal concessions to delegates and their families.

School Notes.

The Donaldsonville branch of the parish teachers' association held its initial meeting of the session of 1906-07 this forenoon, assembling in the local high school building at 10 o'clock a. m. An interesting program was carried out and officers for the ensuing year were elected.

The institute will be under the supervision of State Institute Conductor J. E. Keeney, assisted by Superintendent Showalter and other educators, and it is expected that every teacher in the employ of the parish school board will be present. State Superintendent J. B. Aswell, President B. C. Caldwell of the State Normal School and other speakers of note will deliver addresses.
