## Accident to "Bob" Byrne.

The many friends in this community and elsewhere of Robt. M. Byrne, the popular private secretary to Collector of Customs Henry McCall, will be grieved to learn of an accident that befell him Monday by which he suffered the fracture of both bones in the right leg, just above the ankle. Mr. Byrne had been out on the United States revenue cutter Independent, one of the vessels composing the Rex naval parade, and returning, was standing on the running guards of the Saccharine and White Water, two tugs lying between the cutter and the wharf, assisting the ladies of the party over the hiatus, when the boats slowly drifted together and the guard of one being higher than that of the other, crushed Mr. Byrne's leg before he perceived the danger. Dr. E. K. Sims, of Donaldsonville, who had also been a member of the party, assisted the injured man into the cabin of the White Water, where an examination showed that both of the bones in the right leg had been fractured. Dr. Sims proceeded to temporarily dress the injury, while Henry McCall, Jr., went for an ambulance. As it happened, the ambulance was only a block away, having come out for A. M. McCormick, pilot on the ferryboat Halliday, whose right arm had been broken by the tipping of the steering wheel, and Mr. McCall summoned it. The attendants came, but declined to accept another charge and said they would return for Mr. Byrne. This was not satisfactory to Dr. Sims, who ordered Charley Hospital, where the bones were set and the sufferer made as comfortable as possible. While painful, the injury is not serious, and it is expected that within two or three weeks Mr. Byrne will be able to get about again.


