Negro Boy Accidentally Killed.

Linden Quezereque, the nine-year-old son of Alphonse Quezereque, Jr., a well-known colored citizen of this town, was shot and almost instantly killed about 7 o'clock last Saturday evening by Frank Mathews, also colored, the little son of John Mathews. It seems that young Quezereque and the Mathews boys, Frank and John, obtained possession of a small 22-calibre revolver and were playing with it in the vicinity of their homes in St. Patrick street, near the corner of Opelousas street. They had snapped the pistol several times, thinking it unloaded, but when Frank Mathews took hold of the weapon and, pointing it at Quezereque, pulled the trigger, a loud report ensued and the unfortunate victim of the accident dropped to the ground with a bullet in his brain. A negro boy who was standing on an opposite corner rushed over and picked up the wounded youth, carrying him into the home of his grandfather, Alphonse Quezereque, Sr., from whence he was conveyed to the residence of the latter's son, Dr. E. K. Sims and Rev. J. M. T. Massardier, pastor of the local Catholic church, were immediately summoned, but just before they arrived the little fellow breathed his last, without having regained consciousness or uttered a word. Dr. Sims, who is coroner of Ascension parish, examined the body and found that the fatal bullet entered just in front of the right ear, penetrating the brain and causing death within a brief interval. Young Mathews was arrested by Policeman Albert Gauthreaux and lodged in jail, but was subsequently released after an investigation by Dr. Sims, District Attorney G. A. Gondran and Sheriff S. H. St. Martin, who reached the conclusion that the killing was entirely accidental, and not the result of malice or design. Quezereque's remains were interred in the Catholic cemetery Sunday afternoon.

Col. C. D. Gondran Attacked by Appendicitis.

Col. C. D. Gondran, one of Ascension's leading business men and most prominent citizens, was prostrated several days ago at his home at Belle Helene, in the upper portion of the parish, with a severe attack of appendicitis, and for a time his condition proved a source of considerable apprehension to his family and host of friends. The sufferer was taken to New Orleans Tuesday afternoon on a special train over the Mississippi Valley Railroad, and upon arriving at that city was conveyed to the New Orleans Sanitarium, where an operation was successfully performed the following day by Drs. P. E. Archibard and Frederick Parham, two of the ablest and best-known physicians of the southern metropolis. At 9 o'clock last night Col. Gondran was reported to be resting quietly, and there is every indication that he will recuperate rapidly from the effects of the operation and soon be completely restored to health. This will be good news to his legion of friends in Ascension and elsewhere, all of whom will join The Chief in congratulating him on the happy outcome of his painful and alarming experience. Those who accompanied Col. Gondran to New Orleans, besides his wife and daughter, were District Attorney G. A. Gondran of Donaldsonville, Joseph Gondran of Soulouque, G. B. Reuss of Hoben Solms, and Dr. D. C. Brumfield of Darrow.

Bank of Ascension to Increase its Capital.

Elsewhere in today's Chief will be found a notice to the effect that a meeting of the stockholders of the Bank of Ascension will be held on Tuesday, April 2, at 12 o'clock m., for the purpose of amending the charter so as to increase the capital stock and number of directors, and electing a board of directors to serve for the ensuing year. The present capital aggregates \$30,000, and it is proposed to add \$20,000 to this amount, with the view of enabling the bank to handle a larger volume of business and widen its sphere of influence. The affairs of this sterling institution are in first-class shape, and it may be taken for granted that even greater prosperity and augmented growth will follow the projected increase of capital.


