Death of Uigere Prejan.

Uigere Prejan, a native and lifelong resident of Assumption parish, died at his home on the west bank of Bayou Lafourche, about five miles below Donaldsonville, at 6 o'clock a. m. Tuesday, the 29th ult., aged eighty-one years, eight months and seventeen days. His remains were laid to rest in the local Catholic cemetery at 9 o'clock Wednesday forenoon, after impressive services at the Church of the Sacred Heart, the funeral obsequies being attended by a large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends.

Mr. Prejan was for many years one of the largest and most successful sugar planters of this section of the state, and was noted for his strength of character and attractive personality. He led the life of an upright, honorable Christian gentleman during his long and notable career, and earned the highest esteem and unqualified respect of all with whom he came in contact.

The surviving relatives include a widow, three sons, S. Prejan of Half-Way plantation, and Elphege and Jack Prejan of Plattenville; four daughters, Mrs. Joseph Belle of Port Barrow, Mrs. Emilie Bourgeois of Plaquemine, Mrs. Adam Ruiz of Brusly Maurin, and Mrs. Leonard Smith of Magnolia plantation, Plaquemine parish; three sisters, all residents of Lafourche parish; fifty-two grandchildren and twenty-one great grandchildren. To these afflicted ones The Chief, in common with the host of friends of the deceased patriarch, begs leave to tender sincere and profound sympathy.

Death of Joseph Richard.

Joseph Richard, a native of this parish, but for the past five years a resident of Assumption, died at 1 o'clock last Monday morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Valentine Goetz, on Elm Hall plantation, aged 64 years. The funeral took place at 9 o'clock Tuesday forenoon from the residence of deceased's son-in-law, Charles LeBlanc, in Smoke Bend, services being held at the St. Francis of Assisium Church and interment being made in the Donaldsonville Catholic cemetery. Mr. Richard was a prominent member of Major Victor Maurin Camp No. 38, U. C. V., and the members of that organization attended the obsequies in a body. To the bereaved family The Chief tenders assurances of sincere sympathy.

Mrs. Elizabeth Strange Singletary died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Vincent Cambre, in Port Vincent, on Monday last, the 28th ult., at the ripe old age of eighty-five years. The funeral took place from the Cambre home at 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, interment being made in Felder's cemetery at Port Vincent. In noting the demise of this estimable woman, the Baton Rouge State says: "Mrs. Singletary was one of the oldest and most beloved ladies of her community—a lady of the old régime, sweet, gentle and refined, a firm friend, a devoted mother and grandmother, and a conscientious Christian. She will be greatly missed by many outside her family circle."

Messrs. Esneault & Boston, operating the Picaune saw, shingle and planing mills in Faubourg la Pipe, received last Saturday from Catahoula parish a raft containing half a million feet of long-leaf yellow pine timber, which will be converted into lumber, etc., at the well equipped plant. DISTRICT COURT.

First Week of Regular Criminal Term. Grand Jury Submits Partial Report.

Record of Business Transacted to Date.

A regular semi-annual term of criminal district court was convened at the courthouse at 10 o'clock last Monday forenoon, with Judge Paul Leche on the bench and a full attendance of other officers and members of the bar. The following grand jury was empanelled to serve for the ensuing six months: Henry L. Weil, Pedro Alaman, Heison Gonzales, J. N. Colomb, P. Sidney Berteau, Paul Judice, Newton Rheams, Z. J. Causey, Paul Marchand, W. W. Webb, Louis Tregre and S. J. Boote. Judge Leche named Mr. Weil to serve as foreman of the jury and delivered a forceful and comprehensive charge to that body, which retired to begin its deliberations.

Sessions of court were held Wednesday and Thursday, adjournment to 10 o'clock a. m. next Monday, the 4th inst., having been ordered at the conclusion of Thursday's sitting. The grand jury submitted a partial report Wednesday afternoon and with the consent of Judge Leche adjourned until Feb. 17, 1908.

A record of the business transacted to date by the jury and the court is contained in the following summary: True bills—Elijah Caesar, wilfully shooting at; Octave Braud, stabbing with intent to murder; John Ryan, arson; Val. Stafford, Andrew Ficklee and Walter Stafford, Jr., assault and battery; George Robertson, assault with a dangerous weapon and carrying concealed weapon; Izel West, same; Dawson Powers, disturbing a peaceable assembly; Mike Capone, carrying concealed weapon; Jake Sheppard, larceny, (two indictments); Dupre Kinchen and George Ficklee, cutting and stabbing with intent to murder; Frank Mitchell, assault with intent to rape; Horace Painter, assault with a dangerous weapon; Frank Mitchell and Louis Richard, lying in wait with intent to murder and rob; Morris Butler, rape; Andrew Latimore, shooting with intent to murder; Cora Mitchell, assault and battery; John R. Evans, same; Alex. Nolan, wilfully shooting at; Elam Daniels, assault and battery; Wm. Savario, same.

Not a true bill—N. K. Fote, carrying concealed weapon; Jonas Weil, wilfully shooting at; Dr. J. B. Eastery, retailing liquor without a license. Informations filed by district attorney—Henry Hilton, Henry Blouin, Cornelius Sparrow, Elijah Caesar, Joseph Joshua, William Pack, Jr., John Wilkinson, Andrew Lewis, Gustave Joiner and Louis Rodellat, carrying concealed weapons; John Williams and Jake Sheppard, larceny. Blouin, Sparrow and Caesar pleaded guilty to the charge of carrying concealed weapons and were fined \$100 each, with the alternative of spending sixty days in jail, while warrants were issued for the remainder of the "pistol toppers," who were not present in court.
