The ceremonies will take place in the courthouse at 4 o'clock, and in addition to practically the full membership of Mohawk Tribe, there will be present a large number of visiting Indians and several prominent state officials of the Red Men order. Refreshments will be served.

Mrs. Celestine Dupuy Blanchard, widow of the late J. Zach. Blanchard, filed suit against Lewis Kirkland Williams in the district court of Iberville parish on the 24th inst., asking for \$25,000 damages for the unlawful killing of her husband by the defendant. As will be recalled, Mr. Blanchard was shot and killed at St. Gabriel on March 31 last, (Easter Sunday), the tragedy growing out of a difficulty between Dr. O. G. Brown and Mr. Williams in which Mr. Blanchard became involved, and as a result of which he was shot down by Mr. Williams, although unarmed at the time.

Frank Charles, a negro wanted at Houma to answer to a charge of obtaining goods under false pretenses, was arrested here last Tuesday by Chief of Police H. Schaff, Sr., on information furnished by Leonce Gautreau, manager of the Ashland Planting Company's Woodlawn plantation in Terrebonne parish. Charles is a cousin of Robert Charles, the negro desperado who was killed in New Orleans during the riot several years ago. Mr. Gautreau and Constable Jules Levron of Houma arrived here Thursday afternoon to take charge of the prisoner, departing for Houma the same night.

**New Postmaster at Hohen Solms.**

The many friends of Lucien Meyer, junior member of the new upper Ascension mercantile firm of Kahn & Meyer, will learn with pleasure that he has been appointed postmaster of Hohen Solms to succeed H. Roess, resigned. Mr. Meyer, who was for a number of years head clerk at Messrs. M. & J. Tobias' New Orleans Bargain Store in this town, and Gus Kahn, formerly a salesman in the store of Kessler Bros. at Belle Rose, recently purchased the contents and good will of H. Roess' general merchandise store at Hohen Solms, taking charge of the establishment on the 15th inst. That Mr. Meyer will make an excellent postmaster goes without saying, and that he and his partner will achieve a liberal measure of success in their business venture and merit the confidence and esteem of all with whom they come in contact, may also be taken for granted.

**Bond of School Superintendent Fixed.**

At a special meeting on Tuesday last, the parish school board, in accordance with act No. 17 of the recent extra session of the general assembly, took steps to let out the school funds of the parish at interest, as the law directs, and also fixed the bond of the parish superintendent, who, after February 1, becomes treasurer of all funds apportioned to the parish by the state for school purposes. The law provides that the bond shall not be less than the greatest amount on hand at any one time during the previous year, and as the books of the parish treasurer show that in February last the school board had to its credit the sum of \$10,000, the bond of Superintendent Showalter was fixed at that figure.

The school board will select as its depository the bank that offers to pay the highest rate of interest on school funds, and the parish superintendent and ex-officio treasurer of the board will then be required to deposit all school funds in said bank.

**Death of Mrs. Dominique Gentil.**

Mrs. Dominique Gentil, a native and life-long resident of this town, died at her home at the corner of Nicholls avenue and Lessard street at 2:30 o'clock a. m. last Sunday, aged seventy-two years. The funeral took place at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon, with services at the Church of the Sacred Heart and Interment in the Catholic cemetery. Mrs. Gentil was formerly Miss Eugenie Guedry, and was married to Mr. Gentil on Jan. 29, 1856. The venerable couple celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on Jan. 29, 1906, and on April 11 of the same year Mr. Gentil closed his eyes in the long sleep that knows no waking. It was the rare privilege of this estimable pair to reside for over half a century in the same home in which they were married in '56, both of them finally passing away within two years of one another in the same home in which they spent so many years together as man and wife.

Mrs. Gentil is survived by two sons, Theophile Gentil of New Orleans and Oscar Gentil of Lake Charles, and two daughters, Mesdames T. L. Michel and Armand Babin.

The heartfelt sympathy of an exceptionally wide circle of friends and acquaintances is extended to the bereaved family.

**Sales of Sugar Plantations.**

The Riverside plantation in the fourth ward of Ascension parish, about two miles below Donaldsonville, owned by Mrs. Ora Barton, widow of the late Walter I. Barton, has been sold to C. H. Landry, formerly manager of C. C. Barton's Little Texas plantation in Assumption parish, for \$45,000, and will hereafter be operated by Mr. Landry for his individual account. Jacob Lebermuth, president of the Salsburg Planting and Manufacturing Company, and one of the largest and best-known sugar planters of this section of the state, bought the Vista place, just below Riverside and also the property of Mrs. Barton, for \$13,000. Riverside contains about 600 and Vista about 250 acres of cultivated land, and the two plantations combined form one of the most fertile and desirable sugar properties in Louisiana. The mules, implements, carts, seed cane, hay and the beautiful residence on Riverside are all included in the act of sale of that plantation, and the new proprietor may be depended on to bring the place up to a standard of cultivation not exceeded in its palmett pays. Pending other arrangements, Mrs. Barton is temporarily the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Clerville Himel, of Minnie plantation.

Another valuable sugar property in this locality that has recently changed hands is L. H. and J. B. Ferchard's Eliza plantation in upper St. James, seven miles below Donaldsonville, which was sold last week to Jules Teberne for \$36,000, the transfer being effected through the real estate agency of Loisel & Schneidau, of New Orleans. In 1895 this same plantation, which contains 1085 acres, was sold to Ferchard Bros. for \$24,000. It is thus shown that in the short space of ten years the value of the property has increased by \$12,000, demonstrating that Louisiana lands are increasing in value as the agricultural development of the state continues. Eliza's new owner, Mr. Teberne, formerly resided at St. Amelia, in the parish of St. James, but closed out his holdings in that vicinity and moved to New Orleans with his family about a year ago. His return to "the country" will prove a source of genuine pleasure to his wide circle of friends and acquaintances in Ascension and St. James, all of whom will join The Chief in welcoming him back and wishing him much success in his venture.

**Winter Weather.**

The coldest weather of the season was experienced on Monday and Tuesday of the past week, when the mercury descended to the 30 degree mark and ice formed in plentiful quantities. A heavy rain fell on Wednesday, commencing about 9:30 o'clock a. m. and continuing until after midnight with practically no intermission. As might be presumed, the precipitation followed a rise in temperature, from twenty-five to thirty degrees being the size of the shower hours. The lightest kind of a shower occurred early Thursday morning, but later in the day the sun bobbed up serenely and chased the wet-looking clouds to the other side of the earth. The weather turned cold again Thursday evening and during the night the mercury dropped below the freezing point, ice being everywhere in evidence yesterday morning. Clear, cold and altogether delightful are the terms which best indicate the character of the meteorological conditions prevailing during the last two days of the week.
