CHARTER

OF THE

Union Manufacturing Company, Limited.

United States of America—State of Louisiana—Parish of Ascension.

BE IT KNOWN THAT on this 18th day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and eight, before me, R. J. CHAUVIN, a notary public in and for the parish of Ascension, state of Louisiana, duly commissioned and sworn, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who severally declare that availing themselves of the general laws of the state of Louisiana relative to the organization of corporations, they have formed and organized and do by these presents organize and form themselves into and constitute a corporation for the objects and purposes and under the stipulations and agreements hereinafter set forth which they hereby adopt as their charter, to-wit:

ARTICLE ONE.
 The name and style of this corporation shall be THE UNION MANUFACTURING COMPANY, LIMITED. Its domicile shall be at Sorrento Postoffice, in the parish of Ascension, state of Louisiana, and it shall have and enjoy succession by and under its corporate name for a period of ninety-nine years from and after the date hereof.

ARTICLE TWO.
 The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and established, and the nature of the business to be conducted by it are hereby declared to be a general cotton ginning business, a general sawmill business, a general corn milling business; to build, buy or lease and operate cotton gins and their accessories; saw-mills and their accessories and corn mills and their accessories in the parish of Ascension, and at such other places as may be hereafter determined; to kiln cotton, saw timber and mill corn for the general public and to charge and collect therefor; to buy and lease cotton and cotton seed; to buy and lease cotton and other lands and to sell and re-let the same; to cultivate cotton and other crops on the lands and on leased lands; to buy and sell lumber and timber and to manufacture it into turpentine and other products; to buy and grow corn and to manufacture it into meal and generally to do and perform any and all things that may be requisite and necessary to carry out the objects and purposes of this corporation.

ARTICLE THREE.
 This corporation shall have power to contract, sue and be sued in its corporate name; to make and use a corporate seal and the same to break or alter at pleasure; to hold, lease, receive, purchase and convey to mortgagor, lease and hypothecate property, real, personal and mixed, corporeal and incorporeal; to name and appoint such directors, managers, agents and employees as its business interests and conveniences may require, and to make and establish as well after and amend from time to time, such by-laws, rules and regulations as may be necessary for the proper government of the affairs of the corporation.

The president, and in his absence or inability or death, a vice-president shall be the proper person on whom all citations and other process shall be served.

The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at five thousand dollars, (\$5000), to be divided into and represented by five hundred shares of ten dollars each, said stock shall be paid for in cash, and such certificates of stock as may be issued to the subscribers as may be fixed by the board of directors; or the same may be issued for labor performed for services rendered, or for money or property received or purchased by the said corporation, upon such terms and conditions, and subject to such amendments, as at such times as may be decided upon by the board of directors. The corporation shall be a going concern and shall be authorized to commence business as soon as three thousand dollars (\$3000) of the capital stock shall have been subscribed for. No stockholder shall at any time own in his own name or hold more than fifty shares of the capital stock of this corporation.

ARTICLE FIVE.
 All of the corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a board of directors, to be composed of ten stockholders of the corporation, five of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any and all business of the corporation. The said board of directors shall be elected annually, on the first Monday in February of each year, except that the first board of directors appointed, named and designated in this charter, who shall hold their offices until the first Monday in February of the year in which their successors are elected and installed.

All such elections of directors shall be by ballot and conducted at the offices of the corporation, or under the supervision of two commissioners, who shall be stockholders of the corporation and who shall be appointed by the board of directors. Ten days' notice of said elections shall be given by written or printed notices to be mailed to each stockholder at his last known post-office address. Every stockholder shall be entitled to one vote for each and every share of stock standing in his name on the books of the corporation, to be cast in person or by proxy by a duly authorized agent or attorney. All of the votes thus cast shall elect. A failure to elect a board of directors on the date above specified shall not dissolve the corporation, but the directors then in office shall remain in office and continue to perform the duties of their offices until their successors are elected and installed, and another election shall be held as soon as possible after the expiration of the term of office of the board of directors then in office. The board of directors shall have their first meeting on the first Monday in February of the year in which they are first elected, a vice-president, a secretary and a treasurer, who shall hold their respective offices for a term of one year or until their successors are elected and installed.

The board of directors shall also have power and authority to make and establish as well as alter and amend, by-laws, rules and regulations necessary in the conduct and management of the business of the corporation; and the said board of directors shall have full power to borrow money, to execute, issue, negotiate, create, issue, issue notes, bonds or other obligations, and generally to do and perform all things necessary and lawful for the carrying out of the objects of the business of the corporation, and also to issue and sell shares of stock of the corporation, for cash or in payment of labor performed, services rendered, or property received, upon such terms and conditions as it may see fit.

Any vacancy occurring among the directors shall be filled by the board of directors.

ARTICLE SIX.
 Transfers of stock shall be made upon the books of the corporation by the stockholder in person or by his duly authorized agent, or attorney, and no transfer of stock shall be admitted or held to be valid or binding so far as the corporation is concerned until it has been recorded on the books of the corporation; and no stockholder shall dispose of his stock to another stockholder or to an outside person until he shall have offered the said stock for sale to the corporation at the book value thereof.

ARTICLE SEVEN.
 No stockholder shall ever be held liable nor responsible for the contracts or debts of the said corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due to the corporation on the shares owned by him; nor shall any person informally in or out of the corporation be held liable for any liability beyond the unpaid amount due on the shares of stock subscribed for by him.

ARTICLE EIGHT.
 The capital stock of this corporation may be increased, or the act of incorporation may be

altere or amended, or the corporation may be dissolved, by three-fourths of the capital stock at a general meeting of the stockholders convened for that purpose, of which forty days' notice shall have been given by publication in one newspaper published in the parish of Ascension, and by written or printed notices mailed to each stockholder at his usual post-office address.

ARTICLE NINE.
 At the expiration of this charter, or in the event of the prior dissolution of the corporation, its affairs shall be liquidated by three commissioners who shall be elected by the stockholders of the corporation at the meeting at which it is decided to liquidate. The duties of the said commissioners shall be defined and their compensation fixed by the stockholders, and they shall continue in office until the liquidation of the affairs of the corporation shall be completed.

ARTICLE TEN.
 The following named persons shall constitute the first board of directors of the corporation and shall serve from the first Monday in February, 1908, or until their successors are elected and installed: R. M. Johnson, William LeBlanc, C. S. Stuckey, Joseph Sorrento, James McAllister, Wallace Trabue, Felix LeBlanc, E. C. Casey, C. V. Albritton, R. M. Johnson shall be president, William LeBlanc shall be vice-president, C. S. Stuckey shall be secretary and Joseph Trabue shall be treasurer.

The incorporators, whose names are affixed to this act, have and do by these presents subscribe for the number of shares of the capital stock of this corporation set opposite their said names.

This same act passed in the parish of Ascension, state of Louisiana, on this 18th day of February, 1908, in the presence of Edwin J. Leroy and Adolphe J. Beauchamp, legal and competent witnesses, who together with said incorporators and me, notary, have signed these presents after due reading of the whole.
