Teachers' Institute Next Week.

Arrangements have been concluded for the annual parish teachers' institute to be held at Donaldsonville next week, beginning at 9 o'clock Monday morning, and it is confidently expected that the gathering will prove one of the most successful and notable of its kind in the history of the educational development of the parish. Supt. C. J. Brown will direct the work of the institute, and the following competent instructors will have charge of the various departments: Prof. J. L. Rusca, principal of the Donaldsonville high school; Dr. R. B. Powers, associate professor of education at the Louisiana State University, and Miss Mary B. Grubb, supervisor of industrial work and drawing in the Baton Rouge public schools.

Dr. Powers is an educator of unusual ability and experience, having been engaged in the work of training of teachers for a number of years. Miss Grubb comes at the special request of Supt. Brown as the expert of the state. She will show how industrial features can be introduced in rural schools with the materials at hand, and her lectures and demonstrations will be a particularly interesting and instructive feature of the week's work.

Prof. T. H. Harris, state superintendent of education, and Dr. A. B. Coffey, professor of philosophy and education at the Louisiana State University, will address the people and teachers at night sessions of the institute to be held at different times during the week.

DISTRICT COURT.

First Week of October Jury Term—Negro Plaintiff in Habeas Corpus Suit Charged with Incest—Fourth Ward Fraudulent Election Case Continued.

The regular October term of district court was convened at 10 o'clock Monday forenoon, with Judge Paul Leche on the bench and all court officers present. The following grand jury was impaneled to serve for the ensuing six months: J. A. Berthelot, Thos. P. Dixon, H. T. Ayraud, S. S. Ferguson, M. Contant, Charles Judice, O. A. Poise, D. D. Dalferes, Carl G. Spahr, John A. Miller, L. G. Babin and Joseph Picard. Judge Leche designated Mr. Berthelot to serve as foreman of the jury and delivered the usual charge to that body, which then retired to begin its deliberations. In the afternoon the jury brought in not a true bill in the case of Vincent Pizoloto, the Italian who a few weeks ago shot and killed another Italian while the latter was attempting to break into Pizoloto's residence at night.

As the grinding season is under way and practically everybody in the parish is at work, the further work of the grand jury was continued until the early part of next year and the inquisitorial body was discharged subject to call. No petit jury was drawn to serve at the pending term of court for the same reason. It is expected that Judge Leche will call a special jury session of district court some time next January, when the work of this session will be disposed of.

Brief sittings of the judicial body were held on Tuesday, adjournment to 10 o'clock a. m. Thursday, Nov. 5, having been ordered at the conclusion of the latter session.

The case of Alcide Leroy, the fourth ward election commissioner who was indicted by the grand jury for mis calling and misreading election ballots at the Democratic primary election of Sept. 29, was continued indefinitely, owing to the absence of Mr. Leroy's counsel, Hon. E. N. Pugh.

At Wednesday's session of court, during the trial of a writ of habeas corpus in the case of Briscoe Hicks vs. Theodore Butler, the defendant filed an answer in which he alleged under affidavit that he is now in possession of plaintiff's two minor children, a boy aged six and a girl, Alethea, sixteen years old, and that the latter steadfastly refuses to return to her father, alleging that he has criminally assaulted her on several occasions.

Judge Leche considered the allegations of the defendant and the minor child so important that he ordered the suit continued until next Friday, pending an investigation into the charges. Upon the adjournment of court an affidavit was issued against Hicks, charging him with incest, and he was taken into custody early Thursday morning and incarcerated in jail. Hicks is a negro and resides in the seventh ward.

At a meeting of the state board of engineers held in New Orleans on Tuesday last, the contract for the construction of the Souvenir levee in this parish, containing 100,000 cubic yards of earth, was awarded to Clark & Gibson at 18 1/2 cents per cubic yard. Other bidders were Luman Bros., in Other bid was Worthington Construction Co., 25 cents; J. R. Babbett, 18 9/10 cents; O. D. Smith & Co., 21 cents. Work on the embankment will be started at once.

SUGAR SQUIBS.

Opening of the Grinding Campaign in Ascension and Elsewhere—Items of Interest from Field and Factory.

A steady rain fell throughout this section of the cane belt last Tuesday, but the weather prior to and since that day has been perfect in every respect and enabled the sugar planters to make rapid progress in the work of harvesting the cane crop.

The results being obtained in the factories are surpassing the expectations of even the most sanguine, and there is yet to be heard a single complaint of light tonnage or poor sugar yield.

Louis Bourgeois, of St. Amant, is in charge of the double-effects at the Suple's Sons' Catherine factory in Iberville parish.

D. Ohmeyer, the efficient chief sugar boiler of the Myrtle Grove factory in Iberville parish, was in town Tuesday afternoon on a flying visit to his family.

Camille and Maurice Bourgeois and Decel Mayers, well-known young east Ascensionites, are holding down responsible positions in the big Evan Hall factory at McCall.

Sims Braud, a well known young engineer of this city, returned home last Sunday from Iberville parish, the destruction by fire of the Mayflower factory on Oct. 24 having thrown him, together with a number of others, out of employment for the season.

Alex. Poche and J. W. Byrnes returned Tuesday night from El Potrero, Vera Cruz, Mexico, where they have been employed for the past several months as chief engineer and electrician, respectively, at one of the largest sugar refineries in the cane district of that country.

The Coffield plantation in the fourth ward, which was seized by Sheriff E. C. Hanson pursuant to an order of seizure and sale issued in the suit of the Bank of Baton Rouge vs. Mrs. Catherine T. Webster, will be sold under executorial process on Saturday, Nov. 28. The sale will take place at the front door of the courthouse in this town at 11 o'clock a. m., and will be conducted by Sheriff Hanson.

The cane crop on the plantation will be ground at the Coffield mill under the supervision of L. A. Landry, Jr., who was named keeper of the property pending its final disposition by process of law. Grinding operations will probably be commenced next Monday, with Charles LeBlanc, of Donaldsonville, officiating as chief engineer. Approximately 2500 tons of cane will be handled.
