AROUND THE STATE.

Items of Interest Culled From the Louisiana Press.

Forest Fires in Deade Parish--Cause: Factory at Dodson--Fire at Opelousas.

Wealthy Farmer Dies at Benton. J. B. Miller Bitten by Mad Cat.

A syrup canning factory will be established at Dodson.

Forest fires prevail in some portions of De Soto parish, due to five weeks of drought.

Fire at New Iberia destroyed two million feet of cypress lumber that was stored in a dry kiln.

Two thousand acres of sugar cane will be cultivated on the Angola state convict farm in 1910.

J. E. Adger, a wealthy planter of Benton, died after calling his children home and predicting the end.

Cracksmen at Gibsland demolished the safe in the postoffice and escaped with a considerable amount of funds.

A carbon dropping on a film in an electric theatre in Opelousas resulted in a fire that destroyed the building.

J. B. Miller, of Abbeville, was bitten by a mad cat and was taken to New Orleans, where he will undergo treatment at the Pasteur Institute.

A rice mill will be established at Natchez, Miss., to care for the extensive crops of this cereal to be grown in Concordia and Tensas parishes.

Twelve applications to stand the examination for certificates of eligibility as parish superintendent of education have been filed at Baton Rouge.

Alleging cruel treatment in a turpentine camp, W. H. Pasterson, a convict in Calcasieu parish, has filed an application for habeas corpus in the supreme court.

J. D. Bedgood, former assistant postmaster at Slabtown, pleaded guilty at Shreveport to embezzling \$2800, and was sentenced to five years' imprisonment in the penitentiary.

Bell Weevil Convention at Baton Rouge.

A great deal of interest is being manifested by farmers, planters, bankers and business men the general in the convention to be held at Baton Rouge on November 10 for the purpose of discussing the boll weevil and discussing ways and means of fighting the pest. The first session will open at 11 o'clock a. m., in the house of representatives, and after addresses of welcome by Gov. J. Y. Sanders and Mayor Wade Bynum. There will be talks by Wilmon Newell, secretary of the State Crop Pest Commission; Dr. W. D. Hunter, of Dallas, Texas, in charge of the boll weevil work in the south, and Dr. J. A. Evans, representing the demonstration farm workers of the United States department of agriculture.

No session will be held during the afternoon. The delegates will be taken to the state experiment station just north of Baton Rouge and shown the work that is being done by the experimenting forces of the state in behalf of the farmers.

The night session will be devoted to an illustrated lecture by Dr. W. R. Dodson, of the state experiment stations, on "Diversified Farming."

THE WORLD'S NEWS.

Flashes of the Telegraph Wires From Near and Far.

Forty Indians Killed in Mexico--Convention Held in Jackson, Miss.--Dynamite Explosion at Gadsden, Ga. Fire at Cincinnati, Ohio.

Serious strike riots occurred in Spain.

Chang Chu, mayor of San Francisco's Chinatown, is dead.

Forty Yaqui Indians were killed in a battle with natives in Mexico.

The second squadron of the American battleship fleet arrived at Amoy, China.

Fire at Mulberry, Fla., destroyed a phosphate plant, entailing a loss of \$100,000.

Mrs. William Astor, former leader of New York society, died at her home in that city.

The dowager emperor of China celebrated the seventy-fourth anniversary of her birth.

Two trainmen were killed as the result of a wreck on the Southern Railway near Rome, Ga.

All efforts to settle the cotton mill strike at Manchester, England, have been without success.

B. E. Gaines shot and killed Miss Harriet Wing and then committed suicide at Greenfield, Mass.

John P. Caddigan, for many years proprietor and manager of the Hoffman House, died in New York.

Charles Mann, who escaped two years ago from the prison at Dolive, Ala., is surrounded in New York.

The second annual convention of the Mississippi Supervisors' Association was held in Jackson, Miss.

George E. Wolf, an American, was gored to death by a caribou while hunting in the Philippine Islands.

Two seamen were drowned by the wrecking of the lumber schooner Charles H. Hirsch, off Cape Henry.

George Cook, accused of the murder of John King, was shot to death by a mob in his cell at Kingston, Tenn.

Ten thousand bales of cotton and a compass were destroyed by fire at Belton, Tex., causing a loss of \$250,000.

While hunting near Blixot, Miss., three boys were painfully injured by the accidental discharge of a shotgun.

Catholics in Boston Mass., celebrated the centennial anniversary of the founding of the diocese in that city.

More than a score of persons were injured as the result of a fire in an eleven-story office building at Cincinnati, Ohio.

One man was killed, several persons injured and great damage done to property by an explosion of dynamite at Gadsden, Ga.

Nicholas Tschalkovsky, the noted Russian patriot, who has been imprisoned in St. Petersburg, was released on bail.

Turkey and Bulgaria have reached a preliminary understanding in the matter of the dispute between those two governments.

Congress will be asked to appropriate \$200,000 for a naval memorial in the Vicksburg, Miss., National Military Park.

George Trammell was burned to death in a hotel fire at Granis, Ark., because he was too large to escape through the window in the room he occupied.

President Castro has requested Holland to send a confidential agent to Venezuela for the purpose of investigating the dispute between the two countries.

One man was killed and several persons injured as the result of a collision between a steamship and a ferryboat on the Potomac river, near Washington, D. C.

A former member of the Black Hand society appealed to the police in New York city for protection from members of the organization who, he said, were after him.

Frank Ferriner, one of the alleged night riders under arrest at Reelfoot Lake, Tenn., has confessed his guilt and implicated more than twelve other men.

As a result of a quarrel following the chastisement of their young sister, Alfred Boon shot and fatally wounded his brother, Babe Boon, at their home in Echols county, Ga.

Electric Flashes

Wireless telegraph messages were received at San Diego, California, from the flagship "Connecticut," a distance of 2900 miles.

Centrifugal air blowers driven by electric motors are said to be far better for pipe organs in churches than the old form of blowers.

The first electric street-car line is in operation in Warsaw, Poland. The employees work from 7 a. m. until 11:30 p. m. Motorman get 62 to 67 cents a day, and conductors 62 to 68 cents.

The beautiful mountain peak of Japan, Fuji Yama, so frequently pictured on fans and screens, is to be lighted by electricity at night. Refreshment houses will be built along the trail to the top and equipped with telephone and telegraph stations.

The trees of central Europe are protected from the ravages of the Russian moth by saw moth traps. Two large and powerful reflectors are placed over a deep receptacle and a powerful exhaust fan. The beams of light are thrown on the distant mountain sides and it is said that three tons of moths were caught the first night.

Whenever the reigning sovereigns of Great Britain travel by rail through their English domain, a special train de luxe is at their exclusive disposal. It is ventilated, heated and lighted by electricity, and in the king's own private car an electric reading lamp is fixed over the head of the book. In the queen's boudoir car the furnishings are marvels of beauty, while the equipment of the dining car and those for the accommodation of the royal suite is all that convenience and comfort could suggest. All expenses connected with this train are borne by the owners, the London and Northwestern Railroad Company.
