targed into the locks. On account of
the high water in some of the upper
tributaries, particularly the Ohio, it is
uncertain when this stage will be
reached.

ervation."



Proceedings of the School Board

SPECIAL MEETING.
Donaldsonville, La., March 8, 1909.

The Ascension Parish School Board met in call
session this day at 11 o'clock a. m., with the fol-
lowing members present: E. N. Pugh, president;
Geo. Bergeron, Prosper Rodriguez, W. B. Stuart,
J. E. Walker and Albert Muller. Absent—H.
C. Braud and E. P. Melancon.
The following report of the superintendent
was read and accepted:

The Board President and Members, Ascension
Parish School Board:
Gentlemen—Since our last meeting I wish to
report to you the progress of the school. The
engagement of additional teachers for the Cal-
basse and Sacramento schools have been com-
pleted and I have employed Misses Yolande
Melancon and Ruby Chaney, respectively, for
teachers in those schools, and the former are
normal graduates and are doing splendid work.
Subject to your approval, Miss Nellie Garrett
has also been engaged as teacher in the Donald-
sonville high school to replace Miss L. E. Finger,
resigned. This department is now in excellent
condition.

All the schools of the parish have been run-
ning on a normal basis, and the enrollment has
steadily increased, there have been many
improvements in the way of beautifying
grounds, furnishing schools and the interest on
the part of patrons exceeds anything I have ever
known.
The teachers are manifesting an energy and
concentration worthy of the highest commenda-
tion, and with very few exceptions, are doing
splendid work.

Since our last meeting I have traveled three
hundred and seventy miles, almost entirely by
buggy, visiting schools and attending meet-
ings connected with school business. In most of
these visits I have been accompanied by mem-
bers of the board of the wards in which the
schools are located, and in this manner the
members of the board are kept advised of the
condition of the schools and the progress of the
educational improvement of the parish.
Your instructions concerning the limiting of
the attendance of the Conservatory and Genereux
schools to four grades has resulted in an increase
of fifty per cent in the quality of work the
teachers of these schools are doing, and par-
ents and pupils alike were satisfied.

I wish to report that Miss Amelia Klock has
resigned as teacher in the Dutchtown school
and has been replaced by Miss Fannie Hudgens,
subject to your approval.
The colored schools of the parish were opened
on February 1 with the following teachers:
Lola Chaney, Elizabeth E. D. Wright,
Spencer Bend school; Bertha Robinson, Lunville
school; D. C. Nelson, principal, Mamie O. Ar-
mstrong, at Vaccines Ferry, assistants, Donald-
sonville school; A. G. Jones, Coffield school; Ida
M. Woodruff, Buras school; Celina Catno,
Dutchtown school; A. Redwood, at Olive school;
G. W. Hamilton, Burnett school; R. H. Butler,
Moore's Bridge school; and Anselie Goulet,
Prairieville school.

The foregoing appointments are subject to
your approval.
Your attention is called to the fact that the
State School Improvement League is offering a
fifty-dollar cash prize to that school in each
congressional district which shall make the
greatest advance during this year in improving
its house and grounds, as shown on the in-
dicated lines. I feel sure that Ascension will get
the prize for this year, and we are sure of hearty
support of the schools of your wards which are
contesting.

It was moved by Mr. Muller, seconded by Mr.
Walker, and carried, that the president of this
board be instructed to take up the subject of
furnishing proper bond and the proper crediting
of interest on deposits with the Bank of Donald-
sonville, and in default of the compliance with
law in these matters that the superintendent be
authorized to advertise for sealed bids from
banks as depositories of the school fund, said
bids to be drawn up and advertised in conform-
ity with the law on or before the 15th inst.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, Mr.
Muller was authorized to sell the old Calbasse
school building and have the proceeds used for
fencing in and otherwise improving the school
grounds at that place, his actions in this matter
to be reported back to the board at its next
meeting.

Bills to the amount of \$118.81 were approved
and ordered paid.
The superintendent was authorized to pur-
chase supplies for primary teachers not to ex-
ceed \$10 in amount.
The board appointed a committee consisting
of the president, superintendent, Messrs. Braud,
Stuart, Walker and Muller to formulate definite
plans for the establishment of a state agricul-
tural high school at Dutchtown, this committee to
report the result of its labors at the next meet-
ing of the board.

The board appointed another committee
consisting of the president, superintendent, Messrs.
Melancon, Bergeron and Rodriguez to formulate
plans for establishing industrial work in the
Donaldsonville High School, this committee to
report its actions at the next meeting of the
board.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the su-
perintendent was authorized to advertise for
sealed bids for printing the proceedings of this
board, same to be done in conformity to the
law on this subject, such bids to be submitted at
the next meeting of the board.


On motion of W. B. Stuart, seconded by Pros-
per Rodriguez, the following resolution was
adopted:
Whereas, this body believes in the increased
advantages which graded schools offer over the
one-room school, but has not the time nor op-
portunity in its official capacity to learn to what
extent consolidation can be successfully effected in
this parish;
It is hereby resolved, That a committee of
three, consisting of the president, superintendent,
and the member of the board in whose ward
the proposed consolidation is to take place, be
appointed, the duty of which committee shall be
to investigate carefully existing conditions in
the several wards and make recommendations
to this body of such consolidations as it may
think advisable.

It was moved, seconded and carried that teachers
of this parish be allowed time off, with no
deduction of salary, to attend the State Teach-
ers' Association in Alexandria on April 1 and 2.

In conformity with the request of State Su-
perintendent Harris, and on motion, duly sec-
onded and carried, the board agreed to add five
dollars per month to the scheduled salary of each
teacher of this parish during the coming session,
who shall present a certificate of credits from
any one of the several nine-week schools to be
held throughout the year, to take place the summer
months of this year, this to apply to such teach-
ers as work in this parish another session, and
not to affect teachers now in the employ of this
boardless they should be again employed.
