HIGH SCHOOLS COMPETE.

First Annual Meeting of Sugar Belt Athletic and Literary Association.

George Wins Track Meet. The first annual meeting of the Sugar Belt Athletic and Literary Association was held in this city on Friday of last week and proved an unqualified success in every respect. The organization is composed of the Houmas, Thibodaux, Napoleonville, Belle Rose, Donaldsonville, Dutchtown and Hope Villa high schools, and representatives of these institutions were present to participate in the various exercises arranged for the occasion.

The track and field meet held at Cleveland Park at 2 o'clock in the afternoon attracted an audience of from 1000 to 1200 people, practically all of the leading business establishments of the city having closed their doors in order to permit their employees to witness the contests. The honors of the day were carried off by the Houma team with a total of 64 1-2 points, Donaldsonville being second with 62 1-2, Napoleonville third with 19, and Belle Rose last with 6. Thibodaux was not represented in the contests, and Hope Villa and Dutchtown had entries in only a few of the events. First places counted 10 points, seconds 6 and thirds 3.

Following is a summary of the various events:

High jump—Fay Duval, Houma, first, 6 feet; Will Blumenthal, Donaldsonville, and Claiborne Duval, Houma, second, 4 feet 11 inches each.

Shot put—Dudley Marchand, Donaldsonville, won, 36 feet 6 inches; Charles Duval, Houma, second, 32 feet 2 inches; Ray Weil, Napoleonville, third, 31 feet 10 inches.

100 yard dash—Will Blumenthal, Donaldsonville, first, 10 4-5 seconds; Warren Connelly, Houma, second; S. Sterafela, Belle Rose, third.

Pole vault—Charles Duval, Houma, first, 9 feet 1 inch; Julius Folsie, Donaldsonville, second, 8 feet 11 inches; Abby Dupont, Houma, third, 8 feet 9 inches.

Broad jump—Will Blumenthal, Donaldsonville, won, 19 feet 4 inches; Warren Connelly, Houma, second, 18 feet; Claiborne Duval, Houma, third, 17 feet.

Quarter-mile race—Clarence Boote, Donaldsonville, won, 58 1-5 seconds; Abby Dupont, Houma, second; Edward Prejan, Napoleonville, third.

Relay race—C. Robertson, Napoleonville, first, 52 3-5 seconds; Leroy Stockwell, Donaldsonville, second; S. Sterafela, Belle Rose, third.

Hurdle race—Fay Duval, Houma, first, 34 3-5 seconds; Clarence Boote, Donaldsonville, second; Beverly Clark, Napoleonville, third.

The feature of the meet was the excellent work of Will Blumenthal, of Donaldsonville. Entered in three events, he succeeded in winning two, the 100-yard dash and the broad jump, and tied for second place in the high jump.

Although Donaldsonville won four firsts against three for Houma, the latter team captured a greater number of second and third places and scored the highest number of points.

The officials were B. Blanchard and J. J. Seip, of the Louisiana State University, judges; Prof. J. L. Russ, timekeeper, and R. Swart, Jr., captain of the course.

The Donaldsonville boys' team defeated the boys' team of the Hope Villa school, and the Donaldsonville girls' team defeated the Belle Rose and Thibodaux teams. The outcome of these contests was not figured in amassing up the results of the field meet.

At night interesting musical and literary exercises were held in the auditorium of the high school building in the presence of a large and appreciative audience.

The glee club contest was participated in by the Belle Rose, Houma, Napoleonville and Donaldsonville schools, and was won by Donaldsonville. Following is the personnel of the various clubs:

The contest in declamation was won by Miss Helen Murzo, of Houma.

Miss Freda Singer, of Donaldsonville, won the composition contest. The essay submitted by Miss Evangeline Simoneaux, of Thibodaux, was found by the judges to be of an equal order of merit with that of Miss Singer, but the latter excelled Miss Simoneaux in declamation and was given the prize.

The judges of the night events were: Prof. R. L. Himes of the Louisiana State University, Judge Paul Leche of Donaldsonville, and Prof. L. E. Magack, superintendent of the public schools of Iberyville parish.

The pennants won by the victors in the athletic events were presented by Representative Robert Butler of Terrebonne.

The receipts of the afternoon and night entertainments amounted to \$245.20 and the expenses totalled in the neighborhood of \$200, leaving a balance of about \$50 to be divided among the schools comprising the association and participating in the meeting.

Arrangements have been completed for the grand joint initiation ceremonies to be held here tomorrow under the auspices of Ascension, Assumption, Lafourche and Plaquemine councils, Knights of Columbus. It is expected that between 500 and 600 members of the order will visit Donaldsonville and participate in the ceremonies incidental to the occasion, and the day promises to be a gala and notable one. The knights will be met at the trains upon their arrival here and will be escorted to the courthouse, from whence they will march in a body to the Catholic church, where a solemn high mass will be celebrated at 10 o'clock, after which the initiatory ceremonies will take place in the old Catholic church building. Nearly 100 candidates will be admitted into the order, of whom about 30 are from this parish and the remainder from St. James, Assumption, Lafourche, Terrebonne and Iberyville. W. D. Park is chairman of the committee appointed by Ascension Council to make the necessary arrangements for the big event.
