## AROUND THE STATE.

Items of Interest Culled From the Louisiana Press.

Cuban Cane Beetle Damaging Corn in Vermilion Parish—Alexandria After an Aviation Meet—Campaign Against Blind Tigers Launched at Bogalusa.

The Cuban cane beetle is damaging the early corn in Vermilion parish to a great extent.

An effort is being made in Rapides parish to secure an aviation meet for Alexandria.

The annual convention of the Louisiana Teachers' Association was held last week in Baton Rouge.

The Producers' Oil Company of Shreveport paid \$30,000 for 163 acres in the Caddo oil field.

The commissary of the Industrial Lumber Company at Lake Charles was destroyed by fire.

The lumber plant of J. L. Patenotte, at Roseland, was destroyed by fire, causing a loss of \$10,000.

Mrs. Andrew Moody, of Nugent, was shot and killed in the presence of her husband by an unidentified man.

The two-year-old daughter of Joel Morgan died at Kentwood from the effects of medicine intended for an adult.

Two men were killed in a head-on collision between freight trains on the Illinois Central Railroad at LaBranch.

A law and order league has been formed at Bogalusa for the purpose of putting the blind tigers out of existence.

Roy Flewellyn, a youth, was stabbed and fatally wounded in a resort of ill-fame at Monroe by a woman inmate.

Frank B. Morris, a hotel clerk of Alexandria, committed suicide in Little Rock, Ark., by taking a dose of carbolic acid.

The State Board of Appraisers announced its appraisal of the properties of railroads and other public utilities companies.

Joseph Pizzolotta, an Italian, was arrested by an immigration officer at Plaquemine and conveyed to New York city for deportation.

H. H. Sandoz, convicted of violating the Sunday law at Lafayette, was fined \$100, with the alternative of four months' imprisonment.

## CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS.

May 11—Animal husbandman (male), to fill vacancies in the Bureau of Animal Industry, Department of Agriculture, at salaries ranging from \$900 to \$2400 per annum. Age limit, 21 years or over. Application form 304 and special form.

June 15—Medical interne, to fill at least two vacancies in the Government Hospital for the Insane, Washington, D. C., at \$600 per annum each, with maintenance, and vacancies requiring similar qualifications as they may occur in that hospital. Both men and women will be admitted. Age limit, 20 years or over. Application form 1312.

Ten men were killed in a railroad accident at Lataque, Canada.

King Alfonso has signed a decree dissolving the Spanish parliament.

The Wesleyan Mission at Changsha, China, was destroyed by a mob.

Count Orlova, a liberal member of the German Reichstag, died in Berlin.

Six firemen were killed during a fire in the county jail at New Haven, Conn.

An earthquake in Costa Rica caused a property loss of more than \$1,000,000.

A battle is imminent between the Madrid and Estrada forces in Nicaragua.

Four persons were killed in a wreck on the Illinois Central railroad near Jackson, Miss.

Eight men were killed when an immense landslide, started by a blast of dynamite, buried a construction camp in the province of Quebec.

Count and Countess de Gatinay were arrested at Tours, France, charged with selling spurious paintings to Mrs. C. H. Paine, an American woman.

Tom O'Neil, a negro, who murdered the jailer at Meridian, Miss., was subsequently shot by police officers and his body taken by a mob of 2000 persons and burned.

Owing to the inability of the harbor at Mobile, Ala., to accommodate battleships, the navy department declined to send one there during the Confederate reunion.

Suit for \$50,000, based on a series of alleged defamatory articles, has been filed by the Southern Audit Company of Memphis, Tenn., against I. C. Enoch, a well-known citizen of Jackson, Miss.

Miss Marjorie Gwynne Gould, daughter of George J. Gould and one of the wealthiest and most attractive young women in America, was married in New York city this week to Anthony Drexel, Jr., of Philadelphia, Pa.
