Back From Cuba.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred. Werner, Sr., their stalwart young sons, Fred, Jr., and Eugene, and Mr. Werner's brother, Joe Werner, returned to Donaldsonville last Saturday night from Fancena de Moro, Cuba, where Mr. Werner has been engaged for the past several months in taking off the crop of the extensive Cape Cruz central plantation. He was assisted by Messrs. Eugene and Joe Werner, and it is needless to add that this trip proved a most efficient and reliable crew and kept things humming in the sugar-boiling department of the big Cape Cruz mill. Fred, Jr., was employed this year as assistant sugar-boiler of the St. Teresa factory at Ceiba Hueca, Manzanillo province, Cuba, which brought the season's work to a close during the latter part of April, after turning out approximately 83,000 bags of sugar. Upon the closing down of the St. Teresa plant, "Fritz" journeyed to Encarnada de Moro and assisted his father and brother in operating the vacuum pans at Cape Cruz.

Mr. Werner, Sr., informs the Chief that the output of the Cape Cruz factory for the season just closed was 97,727 bags of 98-degree test sugar, weighing approximately 325 pounds (net) each. The average yield of sugar per ton of cane was in the neighborhood of 200 pounds, although at one time as high as 220 pounds were obtained. Grinding operations were inaugurated Dec. 26, 1909, and were brought to a close May 27 last, about ten or twelve days having been lost during the campaign as a result of breakdowns and minor accidents. Messrs. Joe and Eugene Werner left here on Nov. 26 to assume charge of the Cape Cruz sugar-boiling department pending the arrival of their chief, who remained in Louisiana to take off the crop of the Belle Alliance factory in Assumption parish, where he annually officiates as chief profit-stick manager. The campaign at Belle Alliance was terminated early in January, and Mr. Werner left here on the 11th of that month, accompanied by his wife, to assume his duties as boss sugar-cook of the Cape Cruz establishment.
