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
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### CORN CLUB PRIZES.

Valuable Premiums Offered for Winners in Parish and State Exhibits of Louisiana Boys' Corn Clubs—Trip to Washington or Best Corn Grower.

"To the Boys of the Louisiana Corn Clubs: Please read this letter very carefully; it contains information important to you in your work.

"About a month ago, I sent you, either directly or through your teacher, a pamphlet on the corn exhibit to be held at the state fair at Shreveport, Nov. 2 to 11, 1910. This pamphlet gives, on pages 10 to 14, a list of the premiums to be awarded to the boys of the clubs, including some special premiums. If you did not get a copy, let me know and I shall send you another. You should carefully study the list of premiums, so that you may know what premiums to contest for; you should also study corn judging by going carefully over the explanation of the score card given on pages 5 to 9 of the pamphlet.

"In addition to the special premiums listed in that pamphlet, the following will also be awarded at the state fair:

"1. The Foster Premium—U. S. Senator Murphy J. Foster offers a gold watch for greatest profit on the crop. This award will be based on reports made by the boys on pages 3 and 4 of Form No. B-511a. This blank form has been sent to you by Prof. O. B. Martin, whose address is Agricultural Building, Washington, D. C. If you have not received your blank form, write to him for one. The form must be correctly filled out on pages 3 and 4, must be placed in the hands of your parish superintendent by the time your parish contest is held in the fall, and he will send it to me before Nov. 1, 1910. The cost of seed must be set down at 50 cents per acre; the market price of the crop at 60 cents per bushel. At the bottom of page 4, the following certificate must appear in ink, signed by yourself: 'I do hereby certify on my honor that the above report of expenses and yield of my plot of club corn is correct.'

"The winner of the Foster premium will not be awarded a prize if he does not contain not more than 1500 words and which should give the most important points in producing a good crop. Besides this, each contestant must exhibit his best ten ears and best one ear in the parish contest.

"The pamphlet on the state exhibit, referred to above, gives full directions for measuring the yield of a boys' corn patch (see pages 13 and 14).

"Every boy belonging to a corn club should be diligent at work on his crop. The plot ought to be gone over lightly with a cultivator or the harrow or sweep every week or ten days, and also just as soon after every rain as possible. Keep a mulch on your plot about an inch and a half deep all the time. If rains set in, be sure to have all drains open, so that no water may stand in the middles after the rain. Keep on cultivating the crop until after the corn tassels. Plant cow peas in rows next to the corn before it begins to tassel, and leave the middles clear so that you can continue the cultivation later.
