Proceedings of the Police Jury Parish of Ascension

REGULAR MEETING. Donaldsonville, La., Sept. 14, 1910. The police jury of the parish of Ascension met this day in regular session at the courthouse, and was called to order at 12 o'clock m. Present—Gen. B. Reuss, president, first ward; K. A. Ancon, second ward; H. L. Webb, fourth ward; M. Y. Fontaine, fifth ward; Geo. Gonzales, seventh ward. Absent—Adolphe Netter, third ward; J. C. Kios, sixth ward; H. A. Webb, eighth ward.

The minutes of the last two preceding meetings were read, approved and signed.

Police Juror Lowden of the parish of East Baton Rouge, appeared before the jury for the purpose of seeking the co-operation of this body in the repairing of the bridge over Lacron Manchac, which separates the parishes of East Baton Rouge and Ascension. Hon. B. D. Dixon of this parish, also addressed the jury on the same subject. After a discussion of the matter Mr. Webb moved that a committee of one, with full power to act in the premises, be appointed to represent this parish and meet the bridge committee of the police jury of East Baton Rouge to have the said repair work done, provided that said committee shall not have the authority to create an indebtedness of more than \$750 to \$1000. The motion was seconded by Mr. Armitage and adopted on roll-call by 5 yeas and no nays. President Reuss appointed Mr. Webb as the committee of one from this body.

District Attorney P. H. Gilbert being present was called upon to give his legal opinion as to the action of the jury in reconstituting the budget at the meeting of August 3, 1910, which \$950 budget was adopted at the regular meeting held on Wednesday, July 13, 1910, and wherein the appropriation for sheriff and maintenance of prisoners was fixed at the sum of \$3000. Mr. Gilbert gave the opinion that all action taken at the meeting of August 3, 1910, looking to a reconsideration of the same was invalid, and that the budget as adopted on July 13, 1910, stood ratified as adopted and published. Mr. Armitage then offered the following resolution:

Be it resolved, That all action taken relative to the budget at the meeting of August 3, 1910, and all action taken on said budget on July 13, 1910, as published and adopted, stands approved.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. Gonzales and adopted on roll-call by 3 yeas and no nays. Mr. Webb then moved and stated that he was acting for Sheriff E. C. Hanson, he desired to say that Mr. Hanson did not solicit this increase in his contract from \$2700 to \$3000; that Mr. Hanson did not canvass a single member of the jury for this increase, but that the increase was purely voluntary on the part of the finance committee of the jury; that since the increase was given him it has been the subject of some criticism and realising that the financial condition of the parish, which is unable to stand the increase, he would ask the jury to restore his contract at the same figure as appeared in the budget of last year, that is, the sum of \$2700. The request of Mr. Hanson was granted and his contract fixed at the sum of \$2700 per annum.

Mr. Armitage offered the following resolution which was seconded by Mr. Ancon and adopted on roll-call by 5 yeas and no nays: Be it resolved, That the sum of ten dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated to assist the boys' club of the public schools of the parish of Ascension. Upon the suggestion of Mr. Webb, a discussion was entered into relative to making the necessary repairs on the courthouse. President Reuss appointed the following committee to ascertain the cost of the repairs and report at the next meeting of the jury: Reuss, ex-officio; Netter, Webb, Kios, Armitage.

The election of parish printer being declared void, Mr. Gonzales moved that G. J. Weber, of the Donaldsonville Chief be elected parish printer for a term of two years at a salary of \$100 per annum. The motion was seconded by Mr. Webb and adopted by the following vote: Yeas—Reuss, Ancon, Webb, Armitage, Gonzales; total 5 yeas—0. Absent—Netter, Kios, Webb.

Mr. Webb offered the following resolution: Whereas, E. C. Hanson, sheriff and tax collector of the parish of Ascension, has exhibited to the police jury of the parish of Ascension the receipts of the parish treasury in full for the payment of the parish taxes for the year 1909, and also his credit delinquent list for said year. It is therefore ordered that the police jury of Ascension do hereby authorize and empower said E. C. Hanson, a quietus against any claim on the part of the parish for the taxes of the year 1909.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. Gonzales and adopted by the following vote: Yeas—Reuss, Ancon, Webb, Armitage, Gonzales; total 5 yeas—0. Absent—Netter, Kios, Webb.

President Reuss announced the appointment of Juror Adolphe Netter as chairman of the public work committee vice M. Tobias, deceased. The jury adjourned. C. C. WEBER, Clerk.

CHARTER

White Elephant Athletic Club.

United States of America—State of Louisiana—Parish of Ascension.

BE IT REMEMBERED, That on the 14th day of the month of September, in the year nineteen hundred and ten, before me, notary public, duly commissioned, sworn in and qualified in and for the parish of Ascension and State of Louisiana, and in presence of the undersigned competent witnesses, personally called and appeared the persons whose signatures are attached hereto, all of whom are of age and residents of said parish and state, who declared that, availing themselves of the general laws of the State of Louisiana, and of the provisions of Act No. 112 of the Legislature and Act No. 123 of the Legislature, they have heretofore and do hereby form themselves and their associates to present and in future, into a body politic and corporate under the said articles, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.
The name, style and title of this corporation shall be "WHITE ELEPHANT ATHLETIC CLUB."

ARTICLE II.
The purpose and object thereof shall be the promotion of athletic matters and social relations among its members or under its supervision and direction.

ARTICLE III.
All of its business and other matters shall be under the supervision and control of a board of directors, to be elected annually on the 1st day of September of each and every year and shall consist of ten members, and the members of said board of directors shall immediately after being elected by the members of this corporation meet and organize by the election of their own number of a president, secretary, treasurer and manager. Until the first election on the 1st day of September, 1911, J. Edward Duffel, August Gomez, George Thompson, Pierre L. Landry, William E. Paul, Ivan, Victor Arthur, A. S. Walker, Olype S. Fernandez, Claiborne Williams and Jules Williams shall constitute the board of directors; J. Edward Duffel shall be president; August Gomez, treasurer; W. H. Kios, secretary, and George Thompson, manager.

ARTICLE IV.
The town of Donaldsonville in the parish of Ascension, is the place chosen for its domicile and clearly, may be served on the president and in his absence on the manager.

ARTICLE V.
It shall have succession for and during twenty-five years from the first day of September, 1910.

ARTICLE VI.
Under the name and style herein set forth, it shall have power to sue and be sued, in any class, convey and mortgage and real and personal property for the purpose and objects of its constitution and generally as a corporation and perform, and will be in no way contrary to the laws of the United States or of the State of Louisiana.

ARTICLE VII.
Amendments to this act of incorporation may be made in the same method as is herein provided for the formation of this corporation.
