### Rice Mill Having Record Season.

The Donaldsonville Rice Mill, the largest establishment of its kind in the state, is operating at its maximum capacity and will have one of the busiest and most profitable seasons in its history. Since beginning operations several weeks ago, the plant has been running fifteen hours per day, and has milled up to date something over 60,000 bags of rice. W. J. Harrison, the obliging and capable manager in charge, informed a Chief representative that the total output for the season will be in the neighborhood of 100,000 bags. The mill will be in operation until February. Of the rice so far handled, 15,000 sacks have been received through Whiteman Brothers' barge line from points up the Mississippi river as far as Pointe Coupee parish.

### Opera Saloon Robbed.

Burglars broke into Montero & Brande's Opera Saloon at the corner of Railroad avenue and Iberville street some time between 1:30 and 5 o'clock this morning and made away with \$13.70 in cash, which was contained in a glass concealed beneath the counter. In view of the fact that the burglar apparently had no difficulty in locating the hiding-place of this money, it is believed that the crime was committed by some one thoroughly familiar with the premises. Entrance to the saloon was effected by cutting a large hole in the wire screen protecting one of the windows in the Iberville street wall of the building. The burglar first made an attempt to get into the saloon through the rear door, but after boring several holes around the lock he abandoned this effort and resorted to the window as a mode of entrance. The police are working on the case, but have no clue to the identity of the culprit.

### New Dredgeboat Named Capt. V. Maurin.

A meeting of the executive committee of the joint organization of the Atchafalaya and Lafourche basin levee boards was held at the Nicholls Hotel last Tuesday for the purpose of formally accepting the iron dredgeboat hull constructed for the boards by the Johnson Iron Works, of New Orleans, which is presently moored in Bayou Lafourche a short distance below the T. and P. railroad bridge. The machinery and superstructure of the dredgeboat Hudson, which has been operating in the Lafourche for the past several months, is being transferred to the new boat. The latter has been named the Capt. V. Maurin, in honor of the popular president of the Lafourche basin board, and is 100 feet long by 40 feet wide. Upon being equipped with the machinery of the Hudson, the Capt. V. Maurin will be operated in Bayou Lafourche under the supervision of the Atchafalaya and Lafourche levee boards.

### Negro Horse Thief Captured.

Albert Sheppard, a negro fifty-five years old, wanted in this parish for the theft of a horse from Spencer Coleman of McManor plantation, a saddle, bridle and set of harness from Mrs. A. C. Dugas, of Smoke Bend, and a gig from Aug. Pinckens of Port Barrow, was arrested last Tuesday in Smoke Bend by Pinckens and Bush Gomez, who recognized him and notified the sheriff's office. Deputy Sheriff Lucien Acosta took the negro in charge and locked him up in the parish jail to await trial at the November term of court. Sheppard disposed of the stolen horse, saddle and bridle to Henry Montet of Assumption parish for \$40, and the harness and gig he left at a small store near Labadieville. He is an incorrigible thief and has served several terms in the state penitentiary, having been sent up from this parish in 1907 on a one-year sentence for the theft of a quantity of harness belonging to various parties.

### Claims to Have Been Shot by Burglar.

Claiming to have been attacked by a burglar at 3 o'clock Wednesday morning, Ferdinand Lee Babin, aged twenty-one years, who lives with his parents at No. 1827 Jackson avenue, New Orleans, accounts for a bullet hole in his left shoulder by declaring that when he accosted the intruder in the Babin premises the man drew a revolver and shot him, escaping immediately afterward. Babin is the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Ferdinand Babin, who resided in this city for a long number of years, occupying a dwelling in Mississippi street. They removed to New Orleans about two years ago. Babin's story is seriously doubted by the police authorities of the Crescent City, who are of the opinion that his wound was self-inflicted. The young man is now under charges of embezzlement, having been arrested Aug. 5 on an affidavit accusing him of misappropriating \$135 belonging to the Cable Piano Company, by which firm he was employed as a collector. Babin told the police that he returned home at 12:30 o'clock Wednesday morning and was on his way to an outhouse about three hours later when he was confronted by an unknown man, who threw a revolver into his face and commanded him to keep quiet. "I tried to grab his hand," said Babin, "but only succeeded in shooting it to one side, and when he pulled the trigger the shot struck me in the shoulder. I screamed and my father ran down to my assistance, but the burglar had already escaped." The bullet which went through the ex-collector's shoulder was fired at close range, as is attested by the powder stains on the undershirt he wore. The police, however, found no trace of burglars or a burglar having visited the Babin home when they inspected the premises.

## SUGAR SQUIBS.

Decided Drop in Temperature Follows All-Day Rain Thursday—Cold Wave Beneficial to Cane—Harvesting of Corn and Hay Crops About Completed.

The Louisiana Planter's Ascension letter to appear in print today says:

"There is nothing of much interest or importance to record this week in the way of crop notes from Ascension. The splendid weather which prevailed throughout the greater part of last week and the week before has given way to a recurrence of the rains with which this section has been afflicted to a remarkable extent during the past summer. Heavy showers fell on Sunday, Tuesday and Wednesday, and on Thursday the rain came down steadily from early morn to dewy eve. Naturally, the precipitations have been accompanied by a lowering of the temperature, and the past few days and nights have been quite cool, a fact which the sugar planters are truly pleased to note.

"The cane crop is doing nicely—showing up in better form every day—and the prospects for a good yield are very encouraging. While the stalks are still a little green and immature, this condition will soon be remedied by the advent of cooler weather, which will check the growth of the cane and cause it to ripen.

"A few days more will bring about the completion of the task of harvesting the corn and pea-vine hay crops, which has engaged the attention of the field forces for the past several weeks. Corn is reported to be in excellent condition and the crop is probably the most successful raised in this parish in some years, while on the other hand the hay crop is considerably short and not up to the standard in quality.

"Field work is being pushed and much land has been prepared for the next cane crop. Many of the planters have been busy during the past fortnight putting down fall plant and quite a large acreage has already been seeded.

"Summarizing climatic conditions for the month of September, Local Weather Observer W. D. Park says that the maximum temperature was 95 degrees on the 3rd and 6th, and the minimum 62 degrees on the 19th. Rain fell on 10 days, the total precipitation aggregating 10.37 inches. Of this amount, 3.12 inches fell on the 9th, marking the greatest precipitation in any one day throughout the period. With reference to sunshine, the month was divided into 24 clear days, 3 partly cloudy and 3 on which the sun did not show up at all.

"Hon. Henry McCall reached New Orleans on the Southern Pacific steamship Mornus Monday forenoon, looking very much improved by his two months vacation. He spent five weeks at the Badin Creek Sanatorium, where he was half-starved on a diet of salt-less bread and vegetables, meats of all kinds being strictly tabooed. The good effects of the severe regimen are now apparent in Mr. McCall's greatly improved health and appearance, and he was in fine fettle to enjoy a couple of weeks in New York before returning to Louisiana to resume the duties of his position as collector of customs at New Orleans. He was gratified to receive reports of a considerable betterment in Evan Hall crop conditions, and wishes the same might be true of the sugar market, which is already displaying the downward tendency of prices that is nearly always coincident with the opening of the Louisiana harvest season.

"Preparations for the launching of the grinding campaign are under way at all of the factories in this neighborhood which will be in operation the coming season. The machinery is being turned over and placed in condition to meet the demands that will be levied upon it, and everything about the mills is being overhauled and tuned up. One of the first plants in this section to get under way will be the big Belle Alliance house, where the season's labors will be inaugurated on Oct. 17. The Miles Company's Houmas Central factory at Burnside will make a start on the 20th, by which date the campaign will be general in Ascension."


