# BIG AUCTION SALE.

Monday, Nov. 14, and will continue daily and nightly until the entire stock is disposed of. The hours of the sale will extend from 10 o'clock a. m. to 11 p. m., and at a certain time every night three handsome prizes will be given away.

Mr. Rousseau's stock consists of dry goods, notions, hats, shoes, men's and children's clothing, men's furnishings, fine laces and embroideries, a complete lot of furniture and stoves, a magnificent new piano, and a large assortment of linoleum, matting, rugs, art squares and crockery. The fixtures, consisting of six silent salesmen, two National cash registers, tables, counters, skirt racks, paper cutters, etc., will also be sold at auction to the highest bidder. Any article in stock will be put up at the request of a customer who may wish to bid on it.

Mr. Rousseau states that this sale will be bona fide in every respect, and that everything in the store will positively be closed out without limit or reserve.
