It was moved and adopted that sealed bids be invited for furnishing the town with 800 feet of rubber or cloth hose, 2 1/2 inches in diameter, 4 nozzles and 6 couplings, said proposals to be opened at a special meeting of the council to be held March 8, 1911, at 8 o'clock p. m.

On motion, duly seconded and unanimously carried, a resolution was adopted expressing sincere thanks to the members of the various companies of the local fire department, the fire departments of Napoleonville, Plaquemine and Whitecaste, the officers and crew of the steamer McDougall, the various sugar planters who despatched men and teams to the city, and all others who in any way aided in extinguishing the disastrous fire which swept over Donaldsonville on Wednesday, Feb. 22. CHARTER

MISSISSIPPI RIVER TOWING COMPANY, LIMITED.

United States of America—State of Louisiana—Parish of Ascension.

BE IT KNOWN, That on this the fourteenth day of February in the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, before me, Walter Lemann, a notary public duly commissioned and qualified in and for the state and parish aforesaid, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named, personally came and appeared the several parties whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declared that they constituted themselves a corporation and hereby agreed to adopt this charter, binding and to do so for the purposes hereinafter expressed and to do so for the purposes hereinafter expressed and to do so for the purposes hereinafter expressed.

ARTICLE I. The name and title of this corporation shall be the MISSISSIPPI RIVER TOWING COMPANY, LIMITED. It shall be domiciled in the parish of Ascension, state of Louisiana. All elections or other legal process shall be served upon the president, and in his absence upon the vice president.

ARTICLE II. The purposes for which this corporation is established and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared to be to construct, own, purchase, lease, hire and maintain steamboats, towboats, steamships, barges and other watercraft for the transportation of freight and passengers on the Mississippi river and other rivers and streams tributary thereto, and to construct and maintain wharves, landings, docks, sheds, warehouses, wharf boats and other structures, and to do all other acts and things pertaining to said business or arising therefrom.

ARTICLE III. The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of fifteen thousand dollars, divided into one hundred and fifty shares of one hundred dollars each. The said stock shall be issued for cash or its equivalent in such manner as may be determined by the board of directors. The corporation shall be organized and shall be authorized to do business as soon as three thousand dollars of its capital stock shall have been subscribed and paid for.

ARTICLE IV. The business of this corporation shall be conducted by a board of five directors who shall be elected annually on the last Saturday in February in each year. Said board of directors shall elect from among themselves a president, a vice president and a secretary-treasurer. A majority of the board of directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of all business. The first board of directors of this corporation is hereby declared to be as follows: President, Arthur S. Bank; vice president, Cecilien Esneault; secretary-treasurer, Louis N. Boston, and David E. Lawrence.

ARTICLE V. Upon the dissolution of this corporation by liquidation or otherwise its affairs shall be liquidated by two commissioners to be appointed by the stockholders. The said commissioners shall be elected and passed in the parish of Ascension, state of Louisiana, on the day, month and year first above written in the presence of G. Cires and U. J. Esneault, competent witnesses, who hereto sign their names together with the signatures of the said parties hereto and subscribe to the amount of shares set opposite their respective names.
