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Improvements Under Way.

The plans for the handsome four-story hotel building to be erected in Mississippi street by the Donaldsonville Hotel Company have been received and the architect's drawing of the building as it will appear when completed is on exhibition in one of the show windows of the Lemann store. The structure makes a most imposing appearance and will be an ornament to the community in which it is to be located, as well as an improvement of which the town may well be proud. Subscriptions to the capital stock of the hotel company are still coming in, and the corporation is now in sound financial condition and ready to undertake the work of erecting the hotel building as soon as the remaining details preliminary to the letting of the contract have been completed.

The work of remodeling the east half of the ground floor of the People's Bank building, where will be located the new moving picture theatre to be established by Messrs. Trepagnier and Boston, is proceeding rapidly under the supervision of Contractor Joseph Messina, and it is anticipated that the playhouse will be completed and ready for occupancy by next Saturday, the 10th inst., on which date it is proposed to give the opening performance. A large number of suggestions for a name for the new theatre have been deposited in sealed envelopes at Mr. Trepagnier's jewelry store in Railroad avenue, and these will be opened about Tuesday or Wednesday of next week and a title selected from among the number by a committee of judges. A prize of a two months' admission ticket will be awarded to the young lady whose suggestion for a name is adopted by the committee. Messrs. Trepagnier and Boston have engaged Charles Delas, a well-known young picture machine operator of Morgan City, to operate the machine in the new theatre, and have arranged for a first-class film service, with change of program and illustrated songs daily. They have spared no expense or effort to make the new establishment thoroughly modern in every particular, especially with reference to the cooling and ventilating appliances, and they are confident that it will compare most favorably with any amusement place of its kind in the state.
