Coating of Vaporization.

Electroplating calls for a cell, a current and a conducting surface. A new process invented by a Zurich engineer gives coatings not only upon metal surfaces, but upon plaster, glass, celluloid, wood or paper. It is adapted for producing a veneer of tin, lead, copper, aluminum, or even gold or silver. The metal or its solution is vaporized under a pressure of 40 to 60 pounds per square inch, and the vapor is allowed to escape from a small orifice, when it cools instantly, projecting solid particles of the metal against any surface with such force that a homogeneous solid coating is formed at once and may be made a quarter of an inch thick in a few seconds. This coating may be made adherent, for decoration or protection, or detachable, for reproductions, etc. Coated objects of metal, wood and paper have been shown in Zurich, and the process promises to become important.

What a Fertile Soil Means.
Nothing contributes more to profitable farming than a soil that is fertile and well cared for; and nothing is more certain than that prosperity is impossible in general farming unless the fertility of the soil is maintained. The farmer who averages twenty bushels of corn per acre has a return of \$10 per acre when corn sells at 50 cents. If the cost of the acre of corn, including rent or interest on investment, labor, seed, etc., is \$2.50, his net return per acre is only \$7.50. But if the yield of corn be increased to forty bushels, the cost per acre will not be materially greater. His net return is then about \$12.50, or five times as much. That is, by doubling the yield, the profits are increased five times. If this principle of farm economics were fully understood, fewer acres of our tilled land would be allowed to grow poorer year by year, and a greater effort would be made to increase the fertility of our wornout lands and to maintain that of the newer and richer soils.

A great campaign is needed in Louisiana on this subject of soil fertility. Millions of dollars are involved. It is a matter of present moment, and its meaning to the next generation is beyond estimation. Farmers who allow their lands to become poorer year by year have been called "soil robbers." They are indeed, robbers who draw annually upon the fertile elements in the soil and return nothing to it. They rob themselves. They destroy the satisfaction and delight that come to the farmer only when prosperity abounds; they make farm life a drudgery when it should be the most pleasant of all occupations. But, chiefly, do they rob their children of that measure of soil fertility to which nature entitles them; and they are laying the basis for adversity and penury among their children and their children's children.

If the writer were asked what the first and immediate step should be in order to increase the fertility of the average acre of land in Louisiana, his reply would be "the planting of leguminous crops." Cowpeas and velvet beans alone, or in corn, soy beans, peanuts, lespedeza, crimson clover in the fall on the uplands and sandy soils, red clover after corn or in cotton at the last cultivation on alluvial land, alsike clover on the poorly drained land, vetch alone or in oats, bur clover, melilotus or sweet clover—these are the crops that mean most in restoring fertility to the land. Dipping Hogs for Lice.
M. C. Froeston writes the following letter, telling how he made a dipping vat for his hogs: "I dug a hole in the ground two feet wide at the top and eight feet long; at the bottom eighteen inches wide and four feet long, making it three feet deep, with a gradual incline for the hogs to walk out. Then I took good cement, mixing it in the proportion of one part cement to four parts of sand, and plastered this over like a cistern, placing the cement directly on the dirt. After this coating of cement had thoroughly set, I whitewashed the inside with pure cement to make it absolutely light. I used one sack of cement for the entire work. The tank does not leak. My hogs were covered with lice this spring. After making my tank, I dipped twice, and I do not believe there is a louse on my hogs. I dipped the second time two weeks after the first. This is what I call a poor man's dipping tank. Why not a million of them? When you can build a tank at a cash outlay of not more than one dollar?"

To dip hogs in such a vat it should be filled with a 1 or 2 percent solution of kresol. Such a dipping solution is made by adding one part of kresol to 75 parts of cistern water, warmed to temperature. To fill such a vat as that described above will take about 225 gallons of dip. This will require 3 gallons of kresol, which should not cost over \$4. By spending about \$5 or \$6, then, and doing a little intelligent work, it is possible for the hog-raiser to keep his stock free of lice, mange, etc., and save a considerable amount of money spent in producing the blood on which these parasites live.—Dept. Agricultural Extension, Louisiana State University.
