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MEETING OF POLICE JURY.

Bayou Bijou Drainage District Created and Commissioners Appointed—Parochial Lawmakers, Sitting as Board of Review, Approve Assessment Rolls for Current Year. (Official Proceedings.)

Donaldsonville, La., June 28, 1911. The police jury of Ascension parish met this day in special session, at the courthouse, and was called to order at 11 o'clock a. m. Present—George B. Reuss, president, first ward; K. A. Aucoin, second ward; Adolphe Netter, third ward; H. L. Well, fourth ward; L. W. Armitage, fifth ward; J. C. Klos, sixth ward; Oral Gonzales, seventh ward; H. A. Webb, eighth ward.

After roll-call, the jury took a recess until 12:30 o'clock p. m.

At 12:30 p. m. the jury reassembled, and the following ordinance was read: AN ORDINANCE Organizing and creating a drainage district, comprising certain lands situated in the parishes of Ascension and Iberville; declaring the powers of said body, and carrying into effect the provisions of Act No. 317 of the General Assembly of the year 1910, and the provisions of Article 291 of the constitution of 1898.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of Ascension, that whereas, in the year 1908, the general police jury of the parish of Ascension and Iberville that a drainage district be organized and created, comprising certain lands situated in the parishes of Ascension and Iberville, for the purpose of more readily draining the said lands, and whereas, by the act of the General Assembly of the year 1910, all that part of the parishes of Ascension and Iberville lying on the right bank of the Mississippi river, and embraced within the boundaries following to-wit, shall constitute and form, and be incorporated in the limits of a drainage district to be known and styled "BAYOU BIJOU DRAINAGE DISTRICT":

Beginning on the right bank of the Mississippi river at the line between the Celeste and Cannon plantations in Iberville parish, and extending easterly along said line to the upper corner of Old Hickory plantation, thence in an easterly direction along the back line of Old Hickory plantation to the corner of the plantation of Claiborne and Celeste plantations and the swamp lands belonging to New Hope plantation, thence in a southerly direction along the back line of Celeste plantation and a portion of Laura Higgins plantation to the line between sections one and two in township 11, south, range 13, east, thence south along the line between said sections one and two to the corner common to sections one, two, seven and twelve, thence west along the line between sections two and eleven to the quarter section corner, thence south along the center line of sections eleven and twelve to the center of section fourteen, thence east along the center line of sections 14 and 15, to the corner of section 13 on the townsite of the town of Sacramento road, thence north along the line between township 11, south, range 13 east, to the corner common to sections one and twelve and six and seven, thence east along the line between sections six and seven to the 80-arpent line of McCall's McManor plantation in the parish of Ascension, thence north along the line between the easterly direction along the line between the plantation of McManor and New Hope plantations to the Mississippi, thence up the right bank of the Mississippi to the point of beginning.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that there shall be five commissioners for said drainage district, who, or whose wives, shall be assessed with at least five hundred dollars worth of real estate in said district, and shall be citizens of the state of Louisiana; two of which said commissioners shall be appointed by the police jury of the parish of Ascension, which has the greatest area in said drainage district, one by the police jury of the parish of Iberville, and one shall be appointed by the governor of the state of Louisiana.

Section 3. Be it ordained, etc., that such drainage district, when created, shall be a body corporate with all the powers of a corporation; it shall have perpetual existence; shall have the power to sue and be sued, and to contract obligations; to sue and be sued; to have a corporate seal and to do and perform any and all acts in its corporate capacity, and in the corporate name, necessary and proper for the carrying out of the purposes and objects for which the said Bayou Bijou Drainage District is created under this ordinance. It shall have the power of expropriating property for the purpose of acquiring sites for pumping stations or acquiring lands for any other purpose that it may find necessary; it shall also have the power to acquire machinery, to maintain pumping plants, or any machinery whatever that may be found necessary for the purpose of draining or reclaiming any of the lands embraced within its limits, and it shall own the right of way for canals and ditches, and all sites which it may acquire either by donation, purchase or expropriation, for the purpose of securing a proper outlet for the waters of said drainage district, shall have authority to extend canals, beyond the limit of said drainage district, with the same power and authority, within fifteen (15) days after the same manner and to the same extent as if such canals and ditches were wholly within the said drainage district. The domain of this drainage district (Bayou Bijou Drainage District) shall be, and the same shall be hereby conveyed to the said drainage district at the time of its organization, at which domicile it shall be sued and service of citation made on the president, officer in person or on some person in charge of the office.

SCHOOL BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

Election Called for June 24 in School District No. 1, to Vote 5-Mill Ten-Year Tax, Recalled at Request of Majority of Signers of Original Petition. (Official Proceedings.)

Donaldsonville, La., June 19, 1911. The school board met this day in special session at the call of the president for the purpose of recalling the election set for the 24th inst. to decide whether or not the people of the eighth ward desire to tax themselves for school purposes. The following members were present: E. N. Pugh, A. Muller, J. E. Walker, Geo. Bergeron, W. B. Stuart and Henry C. Braud. Absent—E. P. Melancon and Prosper Rodriguez, Sr. The following resolution was offered by Mr. Muller and seconded by Mr. Pugh:

Whereas, at a special meeting of the signers of the petition asking for an election and the committee in charge of calling this election held a meeting at Oak Grove schoolhouse on Saturday, June 10, to take into consideration the holding of said election and whereas it was shown that the proposition to be submitted was in error and the entire fourteen thousand dollars was to be used for the purpose of constructing new schoolhouses at Oak Grove and at Dutchtown; it was resolved that the member of the school board, Albert Muller, Esq., be instructed to go before the school board and request said school board not to hold said election and further requesting the president of the board who was present at that meeting to act in concert with Mr. Muller in regard to this matter, that in accordance with these instructions Mr. Muller presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That whereas an error had been made in the submission of the proposition to vote a five-mill tax it is the wish of those who inaugurated and promoted this election that said election of the twenty-fourth of June be not held. Mr. Stuart objected to the above on the grounds that Mr. Muller did not present a written authorization from the signers of the petition asking for a recall of this election; that in as much as the board could not have ordered the election had not a petition properly filled and signed by one-fourth of the taxpayers been presented to the board, that in his opinion and as a matter of record the board could not recall the election, unless asked to do so by petition signed by at least one-half of the taxpayers at whose instance the election had been ordered.

To this objection Mr. Muller stated that the resolution was not reduced to writing but that in view of the objection made he is perfectly willing and ready within the next twenty-four hours to file with the board a copy of the proceedings of said meeting duly authenticated by the president of the meeting.

It was moved by Mr. Stuart and seconded by Mr. Walker that Mr. Muller's resolution be laid over until Friday, June 23, when the board will again meet. A vote was taken, which resulted as follows: Yeas—Braud, Bergeron, Stuart, Walker, nays—Pugh and Muller; absent—Melancon and Rodriguez. On motion of Mr. Braud, seconded by Mr. Walker and duly carried, the school at Gonzales was closed, a parish high school to be known as Gonzales High School. The meeting adjourned to Friday, June 23, at 11 o'clock a. m. J. L. RUSCA, Sec. E. N. PUGH, Pres.

Donaldsonville, La., June 23, 1911. The school board met this day at 11 o'clock in adjourned session, with President E. N. Pugh in the chair and the following members present: Messrs. Walker, Muller, Bergeron, Stuart and Braud. Absent—Messrs. Melancon and Rodriguez.

A petition from the eighth ward, school district No. 1, properly signed by a majority of the original signers of petition address to the board asking for a special school tax election, and asking the board to recall said school tax election, was received by the board and upon motion of Mr. Muller, seconded by Mr. Braud, the election set for June 24 was recalled, the vote standing as follows: Yeas—Pugh, Stuart, Muller, Walker, Braud, Bergeron; absent—Melancon, Rodriguez. It was moved by Mr. Braud and seconded by Mr. Muller that the president of the board be authorized to wait on the state superintendent to ascertain the status of the law governing the requirements necessary for approved high schools, with particular reference to buildings, lighting and ventilation. The motion was carried.

A communication from Protective Hose Company No. 4, addressed to the school board, was received and referred to the superintendent for inquiry and investigation. After a general discussion of matters pertaining to the welfare of the parish school system, the board adjourned to meet again in July at the call of the president. J. L. RUSCA, Sec. E. N. No True "Perch" in Louisiana Waters.

Fishermen with rod and line catch a great many of the fish which they call "perch." These fish are either sunfish or bass, there being no true "perches" in the waters of the state. Ten species that are called "perch" are sunfish, and two belong to the bass family. It is a little bit difficult to distinguish these fish, and in an effort to make the matter clearer and easier President Frank M. Miller of the State Game and Fish Commission has prepared a list which under the head of a color scheme may perhaps be of some use to the fishermen in ascertaining the right names.

All of these fish are found throughout the state in bayous, lagoons, rivers and lakes, in from 2 to 8 feet' depth of water. Their color depends a great deal on the character of the water, the prevailing color, however, being green. Two of these species are green or greenish throughout—the round sunfish, or flker, and the goggle-eye or red-eye rock bass.

Five species of sunfish commonly called "perch" that are green, greenish, or olive colored on the side and back, and yellowish or golden on the belly, are the golden-eye Warmouth bass, the blue-spotted green sunfish, the red-breasted bream or yellow belly sunfish, the blue gill sunfish and the scarlet sunfish. Species of sunfish commonly called "perch" which have other markings than green or greenish sides and backs and yellowish or brassy bellies, are the red-eared sunfish, the red-spotted sunfish, the long-eared sunfish, and two species of "perch" sunfish, one of which grows to a length of about 10 inches and the other to a length of three inches, the latter being somewhat rare.

Disciples of Isaac Walton who are desirous of knowing just what kind of fish they land will be interested in Mr. Miller's very instructive article, copies of which may be obtained by addressing the State Game and Fish Commission, New Orleans, La.

Believes in Local Option.

In an interview with a representative of the New Haven (Conn.) Union, Gov. Baldwin of Connecticut expressed himself as being in favor of local option as applied to the liquor traffic, and declared that he is not in sympathy with the legislative or constitutional platform of the Prohibition party. The governor said: "I think a pledge of total abstinence from intoxicating liquors is to most men a safeguard of health and character, but I am not a believer in crowding total abstinence down everybody's throat. Prohibition in my view should be a matter of local option, and while I am not accustomed to take anything myself I have always voted for license in New Haven, believing it to be too large a city to be governed under a rule of prohibition."

Fifty aeroplanists started from Vincennes, France, June 18, on a "European circuit race," the prizes for which aggregate \$94,000, and between 500,000 and 1,000,000 people assembled to witness the start. Three of the aviators were killed and five others hurt by falling soon after beginning their flight. Two of the deaths resulted from explosion of the benzene reservoirs and the third from the aeroplanes becoming unmanageable and dashing into a tree.

The recent liquor election in Cadde resulted in a majority of 49 in favor of prohibition. The city of Shreveport gave a considerable majority for licensing saloons, but the country wards overcame the city vote and went it 49 better. So the question is settled again—for a little while, much to the satisfaction of the prohibitionists and the blind tigers.
