Big Bond Issue Voted.

At an election held in the New River Drainage District of the parish of Ascension on Tuesday, August 1, a proposition was voted by a majority in number and amount of the property taxpayers participating therein to issue bonds bearing five per cent interest to the amount of \$175,000.00, and payable within forty years. The bonds are to be secured by a 5-mill ad valorem tax on all property subject to taxation within the district, and an 11-cent acreage tax on all lands situated within the district. The board of commissioners met at their domicile on Friday, August 4, in the evening, and after recounting and canvassing the ballots and tally sheets found that there had been cast 122 votes with an assessment of \$74,935 in favor, and 106 votes with an assessment of \$50,530 against the proposition. The majority in favor being 19 in number and \$24,405 in amount. The board declared the proposition carried and ordered the returns promulgated in the official journal of the parish.

The carrying of this proposition will prove of incalculable benefit to the large number of property taxpayers of the district, and will in a measure be the means of practically reclaiming thousands of acres of land which in the past produced but small crops. The total acreage of the district is nearly 62,000, and when the work of draining the principal streams has been completed there is no doubt but the New River section, which has always been considered as having the finest lands of the state, will be a veritable garden spot. It is presently proposed to dredge and clean the New River proper from its source in the rear of the Riverside plantation, on the Mississippi river front, to its outlet, Blind river, a distance of more than twenty miles; to clean and dredge what is known as Black Bayou for a distance of seven miles, that is, from the rear of the D. B. Miller, Sr., place to New River at or near St. Amant; to dredge and clean the Smith bayou for a distance of four miles, and the cleaning and dredging, wherever needed, of the Goodine bayou. Under the propositions submitted at the election the board is also authorized to take all necessary steps that it may deem proper to economically drain all the territory embraced within the limits of the district.

The board of commissioners in whose hands this gigantic proposition is entrusted, and who will inaugurate the work at an early date, is composed of Messrs. Leon Picard, president; C. D. Goudran, vice president; and Messrs. Robert F. Ayc, A. U. Babin and German Nargassans, with C. G. Weber as secretary-treasurer. It is the purpose of the board, when the funds which were authorized at the election are available, to advertise for bids for the whole work contemplated and to award the contract to the lowest bidder, with the proper security for the early completion of the work.

Mr. Folse is a resident of Morgan City, where he is employed by the Texas Oil Company. About a year ago he went to the Tour Infirmary in New Orleans to undergo a minor surgical operation, and there he met Miss Calcoete, who was at that time a member of the staff of trained nurses of that institution. The two young people fell in love with each other almost at first sight, and the pretty romance which was engendered by their meeting reached its crowning point of happiness last Sunday, when the devoted pair pronounced the solemn words which bound their lives together in the indissoluble bonds of matrimony.

MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL.

Contract for Water Meters Awarded to the Hersey Manufacturing Company.

SPECIAL MEETING.

Donaldsonville, La., Aug. 9, 1911. The council met this day in special session, at the powerhouse, and was called to order at 8 o'clock p. m., with Mayor Charles Maurin in the chair and the following aldermen present: W. J. LeBlanc and Frank Milano, first ward; D. Ohlmeier and A. J. Schroeder, second ward; W. D. Park and E. C. Wathen, third ward.

The mayor stated that the meeting had been called for the purpose of receiving bids for supplying the town with water meters. Proposals were received from the Hersey Manufacturing Company, the National Meter Company, and the Standard Water Meter Company. Representatives of these concerns, Messrs. B. F. Erwin, C. Y. House and G. K. Garrison, addressed the council, explaining the merits of their respective meters and outlining in detail the terms, conditions and guarantees contained in their respective proposals.

After a general discussion of the matter by the council, Mr. Park moved that the bid of the Hersey Manufacturing Company be accepted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wathen and adopted on roll-call by a vote of 6 yeas and no nays. The mayor was authorized to enter into a contract with the Hersey Company for furnishing the number and sizes of meters required, on the terms stipulated in the proposal of that company.
