INTERESTING CEREMONY.

Corner-Stone of Elks' Home to be Laid Tomorrow Afternoon—Public Invited to Attend.

The corner-stone of the Elks' home will be laid at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, and the ceremonies prescribed for such occasions by the ritual of the order will be publicly carried out under the direction of Exalted Ruler Walter Lemann. The regular monthly meeting of the Donaldsonville branch of the parish teachers' association was held yesterday in the auditorium of the local high school, with a full attendance of members. The meeting was opened at 9:30 o'clock a. m. with interesting morning exercises conducted by Supt. J. L. Rusca, consisting of singing, reciting of the Lord's prayer, and a short talk on "Obedience." The point of the talk was that parents and teachers should set a good example in obedience to those whom they have the right to command, by cheerfully obeying the authorities superior to them. The best commanders are the ones who know how to obey best.

Principal R. S. Vickers of the high school called the institute to order, and the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The following program was rendered: Model number lesson in primary grade, Miss Dora Kaffie; lesson in model story telling to same grade, Miss Victoria Chambers; informal discussions on above subjects, by all.

The meeting adjourned at noon for dinner, and reconvened at 1 o'clock, when the afternoon program was rendered as follows: Discussion of chapters 3 and 4 from the adapted text of "Sociology," Miss Howard; discussion of chapters 15 and 16 from "The Teacher and the School," Robert Garvot; use of the library in the school, Miss Annie Perry Dodd; relation of the teacher to the community, Miss Ola Lee; practical value of literary societies, Miss K. E. Perkins.

After each number an interesting informal discussion was participated in by all, and many valuable points in practical pedagogy were well brought out.
Mr. Rusca and all the teachers commended in warmest terms the splendid attitude of the Ascension parish toward the teachers. The conditions of Donaldsonville seem to take an especial interest in the school and the faculty, which shows a most healthy progress in the cause of education. It was decided that the faculty of the local school would hold an informal reception some afternoon, in order to become better acquainted with all the patrons. It is hoped as many mothers and fathers as can possibly do so will be in attendance. All are cordially invited.

"Trelawney of the Wells."

Our local high school have in store for us an entertainment of unusual merit. They have secured the L. S. U. Dramatic Club to give its presentation of "Trelawney of the Wells" at the Gondran Theatre, on Friday evening, Jan. 31, has been selected as the date for the engagement. This company of young folk, with the enthusiasm of college life, with an unusually clever presentation of an exceptionally delightful play, "Trelawney of the Wells" is from the versatile pen of Sir Arthur Wing Pinero, the noted English playwright and master of modern drama, and represents him at his best. There is not a dull incident in the comedy, and as to the troupe, they are clever, quick, captivating.

Death of Mrs. Augustin Barbier.

Mrs. Augustin Barbier, nee Leonald LeBlanc, died at 2:40 o'clock Monday morning at the home of her son, E. A. Barbier, on Souvenir plantation, aged seventy-one years and seven days. Deceased had been ill only two days, following a stroke of paralysis, and her demise proved a shock to her family and host of friends. The funeral took place at 9 o'clock Tuesday forenoon, with services at the St. Francis of Assisium Catholic church in Smoke Bend, and interment in the Donaldsonville Catholic cemetery.

Mrs. Barbier was a native of Assumption parish, but had resided in Ascension the greater part of her life. Her first husband was Ursin Aucoin, and their union was blessed with one child, a daughter, now Mrs. J. P. Becknel, of New Hope plantation. In 1887 Mrs. Barbier was married to Augustin Barbier, who survives her, together with nine children, namely: Ulysses Barbier, of Geismar; Ernest Barbier, of Sams-town; Edward Barbier, of Souvenir; Mrs. J. P. Ronquillo, of St. John; Mrs. J. A. Landry, of Port Barrow; Mrs. J. O. Lambert and Mrs. H. T. Lambert, of Ascension plantation, and Miss Lizkie Barbier, of Souvenir. She also leaves thirty-four grandchildren. The Chief tenders sincere sympathy to the bereaved family.

Death Intrudes on Revelers.

A despatch to the New Orleans Picayune from McElroy, dated Jan. 11, says:

"A party of young boys and girls from Sorrento, La., en route to McElroy to a dance, and traveling on a large hand car, met with a serious accident tonight when the car collided with a logging train.

"Charles D. Paine was killed at accident tonight when the car collided with a logging train.

Make Paying Crop Despite Overflow.

That it takes even more than a crevasse, with a consequent inundation of their lands, to keep Louisiana farmers from making money, is attested by the following special from New Roads to the New Orleans Picayune, which we quote from the latter paper of Jan. 13:

"Messrs. Tregre and Schenayder, of Pointe Coupee, La., who cultivated 210 acres of rice in this parish, which they planted immediately after the flood, made 3160 sacks, an average of about 16 1-2 sacks per acre. The crop was grown from seventy-two sacks of seed. They sold it at an average of about \$4 per sack."
