Syrian Merchant Arrested.

Kail Jacob, a Syrian merchant formerly in business here, and who filed a petition in bankruptcy some months ago, was arrested in this city last Saturday afternoon by United States Marshal E. M. Kimler, of New Orleans, on an affidavit charging him with having, during February last, concealed from the referee in bankruptcy some \$2500 worth of assets properly belonging to his estate. The accused was taken to Baton Rouge and lodged in jail, where he is being held pending the furnishing of bail in the amount of \$750. Jacob was tried here some time ago before Benjamin B. Taylor, referee in bankruptcy for the eastern district of Louisiana, on the charge of disposing of goods out of the ordinary course of business, with intent to defraud. The complainant was the May & Ellis Company, of New Orleans, and it was shown by T. and P. freight bills that Jacob had shipped from this city to Lizzie Jacob, at Whitecastle, cases of dry goods, notions, soaps, perfume and other merchandise, these shipments having been made during the month of January and up to Feb. 7. It is presumed the charge against him of concealing assets grew out of the investigation into these transactions.

The stock of goods in the store of Lizzie Jacob at Whitecastle, which was seized under a writ issued by May & Ellis, was sold at auction last Saturday by S. W. Gardner, of Donaldsonville, to Habib Shubert, a prominent Syrian merchant of this city, for \$1921.
