COTTON CROP OF 1912.

velopment of the boll weevils in their early stages, and killing frost followed by warm weather in the latter year greatly reduced their numbers. These conditions resulted in a great reduction in the number of weevils in 1911. The season of 1912, however, was again favorable to the weevil, and there was a considerable extension of the area subject to this pest. Owing to the general dissemination of the information obtained by the federal and state departments of agriculture, the destructiveness of the boll weevil is being greatly reduced.

Some idea of the importance of cotton production in the United States from an economic standpoint may be had when it is considered that, next to corn, cotton is the most valuable crop grown in the country, and that cotton in its unmanufactured condition is the largest single item of export. The value of the cotton crop of 1909 represented 15 per cent of the total value of all the crops of the country. The value of cotton exported during the fiscal year 1912 amounted to \$565,849,271, or 26.1 per cent of the total value of all articles of domestic merchandise exported during the year. It exceeded the amounts for iron and steel manufactures, meat and dairy products, and breadstuffs combined, these three groups ranking next in importance among articles exported. These large exports, combined with the more than five million bales consumed in domestic manufacture, strikingly indicate the importance of cotton in the economic affairs of the nation.

Altogether the greatest cotton-growing section in the world, both in extent and in production, is located in the south-central and southeastern parts of the United States. It includes small portions of Virginia, Kentucky, Missouri, Kansas, and New Mexico, and the states lying to the south. This cotton-producing area is about 1500 miles long, from east to west, and about 500 miles wide. Within the past few years the cultivation of cotton has been undertaken in Arizona and California on irrigated land with considerable success, especially in the latter state. The growing of more valuable crops, however, will likely prevent any appreciable increase in the production in these states.

Numerous efforts have been made in recent years to introduce the cultivation of cotton in new countries and to increase the production in others. In some instances failure has attended these efforts, and in only a few cases does there seem a probability of making a material addition to the world supply of commercial cotton. The largest addition, however, has been furnished by the United States, where the acreage devoted to this crop can be and will be largely increased whenever the price conditions warrant it. It would appear from the information at hand that the greatest increase in the growing of cotton in foreign countries may be expected in Asiatic Russia, India, and Egypt, in which last named country irrigation works of magnitude have been projected, some of them being under construction.

misdeemeanor and shall subject the offender to fine of not less than one dollar nor more than fifty dollars, and in default of payment, said offender shall be sentenced to work on the streets one day for each dollar of fine. Coffee Importations into United States.

About three-fourths of the coffee imported into the United States comes from Brazil. In the first nine months of the current fiscal year that country supplied 560 million pounds, valued at seventy-eight million dollars, somewhat more than three-fourths of the total quantity of 716 million pounds imported. The average import price of the Brazilian coffee was 13.9 cents per pound, as against 10.2 cents in the full fiscal year 1911, and 7 cents in the fiscal year 1909. The other principal countries from which coffee is imported into the United States are Colombia, with 69 million pounds in the fiscal year 1912; Venezuela, 38 million pounds; Central American states, 14 million pounds; Mexico, 13 million pounds; and the East Indies, 5 million pounds. The import price per pound of the coffee from countries other than Brazil is about the same as of coffee from that country.

The average consumption per capita of coffee in the United States has shown a steady decline during the period in which prices have so sharply advanced. In the fiscal year 1909, the average consumption per capita was over 11 pounds, and the average import price 7.5 cents. In 1911, when the average import price had advanced to 10.3 cents per pound, the average consumption per capita was but 9.3 pounds, and in 1912, when the average import price was 13.3 cents, the average consumption was but 8.9 pounds.

For over two years the city of Shreveport has been enmeshed in the dry column of Louisiana cities, and for the past eight months a vigorous campaign has been waged against the "tigers," but notwithstanding all this, the chief of police, in his report for May, says there were 46 arrests for violating the blind tiger laws, 45 for drunk and disorderly, 16 for drunk and down, and 17 for selling liquor without license. Again, the question arises, does prohibition prohibit?—Jenn. Times.

Bombardier Wells, British heavyweight pugilist, was knocked out in the fourth round of a bout with Georges Carpentier at Ghent, Belgium, June 4. The fight was scheduled to go twenty rounds and at the outset it looked as if the Britisher would be an easy winner. He knocked the Frenchman down in the first and second rounds, but the plucky Gaelic scrapper returned the compliment with interest in the next two rounds, finally landing a solar plexus punch that put his antagonist to sleep.

Jack Johnson, the Chicago negro who holds the heavyweight prize-fighting championship of the world, has been found guilty of violating the Mann white slave act, and is under sentence to spend a year and a day in the Joliet penitentiary and pay a fine of \$1000. He has taken an appeal and will be allowed to remain at liberty on his appearance bond of \$30,000 until the case is finally decided.

Gen. Marfo Menocal was inaugurated as second president of the republic of Cuba, May 20, succeeding Jose Miguel Gomez who had occupied the office since the United States surrendered control of the island's government January 28, 1909. The new president was educated in the United States and is very friendly to us, besides being extremely popular with his own people.

Wm. Adler, the New Orleans merchant and banker who was convicted of misusing the funds of the State National Bank, has been released from the Atlanta penitentiary and will devote his efforts to the development of mining property in Central America.

counting be adopted as early as possible. Those charged with the policing of the city and with the taking care of the streets and collection of garbage should be selected with a view to their efficiency and ability to carry out the tasks which properly belong to them. They will be expected to give full return for the compensation paid them, to the end that the city will have the full benefit of the funds expended to make this a better and healthier community to dwell in.

It shall be ever the aim of this administration to work for the best interests of the health and comfort of our people. As the work progresses it will be found that many evils can be corrected with but little discomfort to the individual and with great resulting good to the community in general.

The ordinances requiring weeds and grasses removed from the sidewalks should be revised and re-enacted so as to make them effective. The ordinance requiring all vacant lots to be fenced should be repealed, and in lieu thereof an ordinance adopted requiring all property owners to keep their premises free of unsightly weeds and tall grasses. This will work not only to the betterment of the city, but will result in improved health conditions as well.

Much of the trouble from a sanitary point of view is due to inefficient drainage and improper ditching. I recommend and will strongly urge the employment of an engineer to run the proper levels so that all ditching in the future may be done along correct lines to give the proper results. Such an expert will be able to recommend what steps should be taken to relieve the existing situations until such time as the city will be in a position to install a modern sewerage and drainage system. We trust the day when this can be done is not far off.

The streets should be kept clear of all paper and rubbish. A more frequent gathering of the refuse and garbage from the households should be inaugurated, and the throwing of oyster shells, paper and the like in the streets should be positively forbidden. The householder should be encouraged to keep his premises neat and clean so that all may work to the common end, that is, the improvement generally of the city's appearance. The advisability of adopting a modern system of disposing of the refuse and garbage is well worth considering at this time.

The dust nuisance must be terminated at once. The damage occasioned by dust cannot be estimated. The inconvenience to the public in general, to the places of business, to the residences and to their occupants, not to mention the hurt from a health standpoint, are all so great that steps should be taken immediately to better the conditions now existing. We believe this can be done with but little expense. But whatever the expense, the resulting benefit is so great that no one can or will object to the adoption of a system which will so materially add to the comfort and health of our people.

We have the making here of a City Beautiful. Ideally located at the junction of the mighty Father of Waters with the picturesque Bayou Lafourche, distant enough from the metropolis of the state to command our share of the trade which so rich an adjoining country must needs afford, yet near enough to the same metropolis to give our citizens the opportunity to avail themselves of the advantages which only large centres can offer, we have here in our city the making of a home for an ever increasing population. There are amongst our citizenry as fine a body of men and women as are to be found in any city in the state. The opportunity is knocking at our door. "Tis up to us to enter upon this new era under trying conditions. But, fellow citizens, it is such trials that make success for men achieve most when sorely tried.

With a cleaner and better city assured, with the splendid improvements already obtained, we go forward on a new era of community building with a determination to make the most of the splendid opportunities we have. The eyesores must be converted into places of beauty and attractiveness. Each vacant lot should be, as are the vacant lots in progressive Shreveport, converted into garden cities. The owners thereof will, I am sure, cooperate in this movement to the end that the productiveness of this great country of ours may be shown on every side. Just think of these possibilities! A city beautiful with garden cities everywhere. How better could we expend our energies than in exhibiting right here in our midst the glorious possibilities of our soil. Its fertility we know; its possibilities we can only dream of.

Let us in making the city beautiful provide trees that are graceful, strong and numerous, yielding ourselves to the frame of mind which was Ruskin's when he exclaimed: "What a thought that was when God thought of a tree!"

Let us in the great work we have undertaken remember, as Henry Drummond has told us: "He who makes the city makes the world. For though men may make cities, it is after all the cities which make men. Whether our national life is great or mean, whether our social virtues are mature or stunted, whether our religion is possible or impossible, depends upon the city. To the reformer, the philanthropist, the economist, the politician, the vision of the city is the great classic of social literature."

Fellow citizens: Your hearty cooperation is earnestly hoped for by myself and fellow commissioners in the tasks we have to perform. We

would have you know and appreciate at all times that this is your city, that we are your servants to carry out those measures which will be for the best interests of all. Be you not bystanders, but participators in the great work we have before us. There is work enough for all, and glory a plenty for those who will join in the great upbuilding of this one-time capital of the state, a city which for a hundred years has been the scene of so many historical events. We should always remember that here was born that peerless citizen of Louisiana, that soldier, patriot, statesman and judge, Francis Tillou Nicholls. May this city ever be worthy of such a son!

Let us proclaim to the world what an attractive and livable place Donaldsonville is. Make this a spot where people will yearn to live and we will soon boast of a much increased population. With this will come factories and industries, for where the location is ideal, where living is cheap and comforts bountiful, the people happy and contented, there will more people go.

Considers of the grave responsibilities of the office which we have this day assumed, we invoke the aid and guidance of the Divine Providence in the work before us. May we ever be worthy of the trust imposed upon us by those we represent. In the words of the poet, let us remember ever that "Not failure, but low aim is crime," and by aiming high may we be enabled to work out successfully the problems which will make of this a bigger and better Donaldsonville.

CHARTER

— of — SIMS AGENCY COMPANY, LIMITED.

State of Louisiana—Parish of Ascension. BE IT KNOWN that on this, the twenty-third day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, before me, B. J. Vega, a notary public duly commissioned, sworn and qualified in and for the parish of Ascension, and in presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and under the signatures of the persons named hereunto subscribed, who declared that availing themselves of the laws of the State of Louisiana relative to the organization of corporations, they have presented and organized and constitute themselves a corporation and body politic and do adopt this their charter, binding themselves, their associates and successors thereto.

ARTICLE I. The name and title of this corporation shall be SIMS AGENCY COMPANY, LIMITED. It shall be domiciled in the parish of Ascension, state of Louisiana, and shall have its principal office and place of business at the town of Donaldsonville, parish of Ascension, Louisiana, and in his absence upon the vice president.

ARTICLE II. The purposes for which this corporation is established and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are declared to be: To conduct a general insurance, agency and insurance brokerage business; to act as agents for fire, life, marine, casualty, plate glass, burglary, guarantee and other insurance companies; and to do a general insurance business, and generally to manage and operate any other business incidental thereto; and generally to do any and every business or enterprise not inconsistent with the constitution of the state of Louisiana, and of the United States.

ARTICLE III. The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of thirty thousand dollars, divided into three hundred shares, the par value of \$100 each. The said stock shall be issued for cash or its equivalent in such manner as may be determined by the board of directors. This corporation shall be authorized to do business as soon as three thousand dollars of its capital stock shall have been subscribed for, and to do a general insurance business, and generally to manage and operate any other business incidental thereto, and to do any and every business or enterprise not inconsistent with the constitution of the state of Louisiana, and of the United States.

ARTICLE IV. The business of this corporation shall be conducted by a board of three directors, which may be increased to five by a majority vote of the stockholders of this corporation, who shall be elected by the stockholders annually on the first Monday in April of each year. Said board of directors shall elect from among themselves a president, a vice president, and a secretary-treasurer. A majority of the board of directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of all business. The first board of directors of this corporation are hereby declared to be as follows: President, R. N. Sims; vice president, F. K. Sims; secretary-treasurer, F. K. Sims. They shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified. The board of di-

rectors shall have power to appoint such other officers and employees and to enact such by-laws, rules and regulations as they may deem necessary and proper for the conduct of the business of the corporation.

ARTICLE V. Upon the dissolution of this corporation by limitation or otherwise its affairs shall be liquidated by two commissioners to be appointed by the stockholders.

This corporation shall be authorized to do business as soon as three thousand dollars of its capital stock shall have been subscribed for, and to do a general insurance business, and generally to manage and operate any other business incidental thereto, and to do any and every business or enterprise not inconsistent with the constitution of the state of Louisiana, and of the United States.
