Charbon in Eighth Ward.

Vega Property Sold.

The fine store building and residence property of Col. A. D. Vega was sold at public auction last Saturday under executive process, pursuant to a writ issued by the district court in the suit of W. D. Park vs. A. D. Vega. The sale took place at the courthouse, and the property was adjudicated to the Bank of Donaldsonville and People's Bank for \$4600. These institutions hold mortgages against the property, which consists of lots 3, 4 and 5 in square 39, measuring 43 feet front on Mississippi street at the head of Railroad avenue, by a depth of 130 feet, together with a modern, two-story terra cotta and brick store and residence building. The structure is one of the handsomest and best located in the city.

DISTRICT COURT.

First Week of Regular Jury Term—New Grand Jury Impaneled, with J. W. Stephenson as Foreman—Sixteen True Bills Returned.

A regular jury term of district court for the parish of Ascension was convened Monday forenoon, with Judge Charles T. Wortham on the bench, District Attorney Philip Gilbert, Clerk of Court James Barman and Sheriff E. C. Hanson at their respective posts, and all other court officers and attaches present. The following grand jury was impaneled to serve for the ensuing six months: J. W. Stephenson, A. J. Schroeder, Paul Braud, C. S. McFarland, W. W. Barron, W. J. Fickling, J. W. Gauthreaux, L. B. Duplessis, John W. Opendwyer, Robert H. Landry, Geo. Bergeron and Leon R. Kennedy. Judge Wortham appointed Mr. Stephenson to serve as foreman of the jury, and delivered the usual comprehensive charge to that body.

Richard Melancon, of Donaldsonville, who was recently admitted to the bar after passing a creditable examination before the state supreme court, was presented to the court by attorney E. N. Pugh, and his certificate was ordered spread on the minutes.

Sessions of court were held Monday afternoon, Tuesday forenoon and Friday forenoon, adjournment to 10 o'clock a. m. next Monday being ordered at the conclusion of the latter sitting. The grand jury filed partial reports on Monday and Tuesday, and Thursday afternoon submitted its final report and was discharged until further notice.
