CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS.

Opportunities for Obtaining Employment Under the Federal Government.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces the following examinations to be held on the dates given below, and circulars containing further information relative thereto may be seen at the office of this paper:

Aug. 4—Specialist in transportation of farm products (male), office of markets, Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., \$2500 to \$3000 per annum. Age limit, 25 to 55 years.

Duties will consist of rendering practical service to co-operative marketing organizations and other producers, in every phase of the transportation problem.

Specialist in co-operative organization (male), office of markets, Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., \$2500 to \$3000 per annum. Age limit, 25 to 50 years. Duties will consist of the investigation of co-operative organization and the determination of the best methods of procedure, and the appointee will be required to assist in organizing producers and consumers and to give assistance and counsel to such organizations.

Assistant in cotton seed marketing and utilization (male), office of markets, Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., \$1800 to \$2000 per annum. Age limit, 25 to 45 years. Duties will be investigation of the utilization of cotton seed in all of its phases, etc.

Specialist in marketing perishable products (male), office of markets, Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., \$2500 to \$3000 per annum. Age limit, 25 to 50 years. Duties will consist of detailed investigation of the cost and method of handling and marketing perishable fruits, vegetables, and other farm products, etc.

Electrical machinist (male), signal service at large, Fort Wood, New York, \$1000 per annum. Age limit, 20 years or over. Applicants must be practical machinists with three or more years of experience.

Applicants for the above positions will not be required to appear at any place for examination.

July 22—Stenographic clerk, Departmental Service, Washington, D. C., \$840 to \$900 per annum. Age limit, 18 years or over on the date of examination. As the commission has experienced difficulty in securing sufficient eligibles for positions of this character, qualified persons are urged to enter this examination.

Aug. 6—Junior fuel engineer (male), Bureau of Mines, Pittsburg, Pa., \$1380 to \$1500 per annum. Age limit, 22 to 30 years. Duties will be to assist in tests of boiler and other furnaces, auxiliary equipment, etc.

Editorial clerk (male), Geological Survey, Washington, D. C., \$1500 to \$1800 per annum. Age limit, 20 to 40 years.

Aug. 18—Pipe fitter's helper (male), Departmental Service, Washington, D. C., \$720 per annum. Age limit, 18 years or over. Competitors will not be assembled for examination, but will be rated on the following subjects, which will have the relative weights indicated: Physical ability, 40; training, experience and fitness, 60.

acreage tax, \$1391.15; produce tax, \$1673; total, \$2266.77.

St. James—Levee tax, \$44,553.01; acreage tax, \$7708.07; produce tax, \$3359.16; total, \$55,620.24.

St. John the Baptist—Levee tax, \$13,671.88; acreage tax, \$2544.81; produce tax, \$1078.94; total, \$18,295.63.

St. Charles—Levee tax, \$32,985.38; acreage tax, \$11,392.82; produce tax, \$2268.63; total, \$46,646.83.

Jefferson—Levee tax, \$83,285.37; acreage tax, \$3522.97; produce tax, \$2377.10; sale of lands, \$716.44; total, \$94,901.88.

Plaquemine—Levee tax, \$14,448.69; acreage tax, \$5018.11; produce tax, \$4094.32; total, \$23,561.12.

Totals from all parishes—Levee tax, \$283,408.81; acreage tax, \$55,664.57; produce tax, \$59,506.37; sale of lands, \$716.44; total, \$399,296.19.

In addition to the above, there were the following receipts: Interest on taxes, \$1090.46; redemption of property, \$137.46; Southern Pacific and Texas and Pacific Railroads, \$10,000; miscellaneous, \$3870.76. The total receipts for the two-year period were \$405,394.77.

The disbursements by parishes for the same period, covering levee construction, material, labor, high water expenses, permanent work, commissioners' mileage and per diem and assessors' commissions, were as follows: Lafourche, \$1892.73; Assumption, \$1348.12; Ascension, \$10,585.53; St. James, \$24,406.17; St. John, \$24,388.01; St. Charles, \$99,601.10; Jefferson, \$132,838.35; Plaquemine, \$90,598.23; railroad commissioner, \$1670.45. Total, \$387,358.69.

General expenses were as follows: Secretary, \$3000; attorney, \$1200; printing and advertising, \$844.35; office expenses, \$1909.75; interest on bonds and notes, \$50,000; transferred to special fund, \$20,000; expenses on account of levee inspection, \$209; inspectors' salaries, \$1611; inspectors' expenses, \$289.85; high water material paid for but not used, \$21,461.56; miscellaneous, \$386.89. Total, \$102,012.40.

Total expenses during the two-year period were as follows: Levee construction, \$15,397.53; material, \$19,046.85; labor, \$103,031.70; high water expense, \$141,418.85; commissioners' mileage, \$3637.30; assessors' commissions, \$7888.28; permanent work, \$90,577.28; general expenses, \$102,012.40. Total, \$489,371.09.

The principal item of expenditure by the present board on account of contracts made by the old board was \$44,621.10 for the Hymelia timber dam.

When the present board assumed office Sept. 1, 1912, there was \$37,315.24 on hand, and the receipts since have aggregated \$190,641.63. The expenditures made by the present board total \$295,480.37, there being an overdraft of \$67,523.50, July 1, 1913.

Engineer Klerer was instructed to make a general inspection of the levees in the district and outline the work to be done to place them in good shape for the next high water. Pending the appointment of a successor to President Swartz, Levee Inspector Hector Himel was requested to look after the levees in St. James parish and make recommendations for their maintenance in proper condition.

cratic principles. It is regrettably true that in the past Democratic congressmen from Louisiana voted against their party in favor of the Dingley bill and the Payne-Aldrich bill, Republican measures, and that no protests were made on that account from the Democrats of the state. This action, we are persuaded, was tolerated because the votes of those congressmen could not have brought success to the Democratic party at that time. But no such condition now obtains. The Underwood bill hangs in the balance in the senate, and victory or defeat awaits it by a small margin. Will the senators from Louisiana bring defeat on their party by their votes against the bill? We trust not.

When the vote on the final passage of the bill is taken, we, as Democrats, have a right to demand, and we do demand that the senators from Louisiana vote with the other Democrats of the senate in favor of the bill.



Some Merit in Friedmann Serum.

A Pittsburg patient who took the Friedmann treatment in Berlin was reported by Drs. Rambaud and Lete, of the Pasteur Institute, as having had the disease arrested, although they do not consider the serum "a positive and absolute cure for tuberculosis." It is possible that, as in most important discoveries, the claims made for the remedy were exaggerated; still, if a principle has been discovered to serve even as a starting point for future investigation, the serum deserves to be well considered. A treatment that will arrest the disease and give nature and a rational regimen the opportunity to repair the waste caused by the ravages of the disease certainly is not without merit. It is unfortunate that professional jealousies among physicians and an ultra-rigid code of ethics should have prevented a fair and dispassionate test of the merits of the remedy under favorable conditions in this country.—Country Review.

ROPE FOR ALPINE CLIMBERS

It is of Special Manufacture and Combines Strength, Flexibility and Lightness.

The rope used by Alpine climbers is of special manufacture, combining as far as possible the differing qualities of strength, flexibility and lightness. Three qualities are in general use, being made from Sisal, Italian and Manila hems respectively, and occasionally, when cost is not considered, of silk. The latter, though very light and strong, is not so durable as the others. That which finds most favor among British mountaineers is known as Buckingham's Alpine rope; it is made of the best Manila hemp.

In the year 1864, Mr. McLeish recalls, a committee of the Alpine club made tests upon a number of ropes suitable for mountaineering. Of the two that were approved one was made of Italian hemp and the other of Manila. They both had a breaking strain of two tons and sustained the weight of a twelve stone man after falling from a height of ten feet. Non-mountaineers have sometimes considered this insufficient, but it is highly problematical whether the human anatomy could survive the sudden compression of a thin rope arising from any greater fall.—Fry's Magazine.

French Revolutionary Months.

The order of the months in the French revolutionary calendar beginning with September 22 the tour was Vendemiaire, Brumaire, Frimaire, Nivose, Pluviose, Ventose, Germinal, Floreal, Prairial, Messidor, Thermidor (Fervidor) and Fructidor, which ended on September 16. Then followed five days, the Sansculotides, dedicated as feasts of reason to Les Vertus, Le Genie, Le Travail, L'Opinion and Les Recompenses. Decreed November 24, 1793, this calendar was antedated to September 22, 1792. It was abolished on Nivose 10, An xiv, corresponding to December 31, 1805.
