Death of James H. Proffitt. James Hiram Proffitt, one of the best-known and most highly-esteemed citizens of this community, died at 2:30 o'clock p. m. Tuesday at his home in the fourth ward, one mile below Donaldsonville, aged sixty-three years. Mr. Proffitt's health had been failing for the past year, and during the current summer he spent several weeks at Cooper's Well, Miss., but was not benefited, his condition growing rapidly worse after his return. He had resided in Ascension for upwards of half a century and always took a prominent part in public affairs, having served as deputy clerk of court, deputy registrar of voters, deputy sheriff, and held other minor political positions in former years. He numbered his friends by the score, and his passing away will be widely and sincerely regretted.

The funeral took place Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock and was largely attended. Services were held at the Donaldsonville Catholic church, and interment was made in the family tomb in the Catholic cemetery. Besides his wife, nee Hermeneo Dugas, Mr. Proffitt is survived by four daughters and two sons, namely: Mrs. Gabe Blanchard, of Alexandria; Misses Ella, Nancy and Frances Proffitt, the latter a student of the State Normal School at Natchitoches; and Messrs. Westley and Hiram Proffitt.

To these afflicted ones the profound sympathy of the entire community is extended.

ROSH HASHANAH. Jewish New Year to be Observed Next Week—One of Hottest Days in Hebrew Calendar—Services at Bikur Cholim Synagogue.

Again the Jews, the world over, are preparing to observe the holy season which begins with Rosh Hashanah, or New Year's day, on the evening of Oct. 1, and ends with the Schemini Atzereth—the Feast of Conclusion—on the evening of Oct. 23.

In the Jewish tradition, the Rosh Hashanah marks the anniversary of the creation of the world, supposed to have taken place 5674 years ago. The present Rosh Hashanah, therefore, will mark the beginning of the year 5674.

The change of date, however, is of little or no importance, and if the Jewish New Year's day had no further significance, its appeal to the Jew would be very faint indeed. It is not the change of year, but the change of life that this day stresses, that makes it stand out as one of the holiest days in the Jewish calendar. Herein it radically differs from our civil New Year; it is a day set apart for introspection and self-examination. The sacred character of this day is implied in the two other names by which it is known, viz, the Day of Memorial and the Day of the Blowing of the Trumpets. In the Jewish New Year's day had no further significance, its appeal to the Jew would be very faint indeed. It is not the change of year, but the change of life that this day stresses, that makes it stand out as one of the holiest days in the Jewish calendar.
