Monday afternoon two spirited races were run in the presence of a small crowd, and the sport was far and away better than that of the preceding day. Each heat was hotly contested, particularly in the 2:20 event, wherein a pretty fight developed between Frances T. and Grace Brooks. The former, with Herndon driving, retrieved the laurels lost the day before by leading her field in both heats, but the Malcher mare was a good second and at all times was a strong contender for first honors. In the 2:30 class, Erastus, Jr., made things interesting for Gamworth, but the powerful Truxillo stallion, skillfully piloted by Herndon, came through in great shape and annexed both heats by safe leads.

The racing season closed Monday with the termination of the inter-parochial fair, and A-muz-u Park will be "dark" until next spring, when the Sunday matinees will be resumed under the auspices of the A-muz-u Company. Elise Memorial School Association.

(Contributed.)
In the possession of this worthy organization, the citizens of upper Ascension have every reason to congratulate themselves. It is doing splendid work educationally, the highest aim that all progressive and enlightened communities should entertain. The following is quoted from the president's address and first annual report:

"In behalf of the E. M. S. Association, for the benefit and information of a generous public, a little inside information will do no harm. In my humble opinion, everybody is entitled to know more fully our aim and objects. That our association deserves the co-operation of all can be shown in a few words.
"Perhaps to the casual observer the expenditures made through our association for needed improvements appear very insignificant. There is little to show with any prominence, and I am free to admit the fact; therefore it behooves me to correct, in a measure, this false impression.

"In an exemplary way our organization has been the source of relieving the faculty of numerous petty worries, such as incidental expenses, in itself a problem to the teachers, who heretofore have had to provide by means of entertainments, contributions, etc., the dimes and dollars required to supply the ordinary daily needs of the school. The natural result has been, for the faculty, more time for school work, and for the school, more efficiency. Our friends, the public, would scarcely believe we have spent considerably more than \$200 in the last twelve months, but such is the case. The single item of elevating the carriage driveway from the public road to the schoolhouse required quite an outlay, as it was necessary to practically build a levee through the bottoms. In this instance particularly, (and there are many others), I can not omit to mention the name of that prince of good fellows, the peerless leader in education, our generous friend and neighbor, Mr. G. B. Reuss, who so cheerfully and with all the good will at his command furnished the teams and implements free of cost.

"The association has rebuilt the fences and shed blown down prior to the last session, bought coal, repaired the walks, kept the weeds down, purchased basketball paraphernalia for the pupils, made repairs to the closets and in the library, paid a monthly salary for scrubbing and cleaning the premises, made some alterations on the stage, bought a rug and furniture for same, supplied books for the literary society and library, completed further needed repairs to the closets, purchased all medals, class pins, diplomas, etc., for commencement, besides defraying incidental expenses for broken window panes, chalk, certificates, brooms, pails, tubs, flower seed, etc., etc. Within the past three weeks we have spent over \$40 getting things in shape for the opening of the present session of school. Besides, we have created a reserve fund for emergencies that may arise."
Owing to unfavorable climatic conditions, the second annual festival for the benefit of the association was twice postponed. Notwithstanding the inclement weather which prevailed Sunday, Sept. 28, when the entertainment was finally held, the net proceeds totalled \$158.65, a sum almost sufficient to cover the expenses of the association for the ensuing twelve months.

At a meeting of the association on the 5th inst., A. R. Dugas was re-elected president, E. J. Dominique vice president, and L. Schuster secretary and treasurer. All parents of children attending the Elise Memorial School have been made members of the association at a nominal fee of 15 cents per month.

Experts Here to Aid Planters.

United States Senator Joseph E. Ransdell, Congressman Lewis L. Morgan, of this district, and B. H. Rawl, chief of the dairy division of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, arrived here from Baton Rouge Tuesday evening via the T. and P. Railroad, and early the following morning Messrs. Morgan and Rawl made a hurried trip by automobile to some of the sugar plantations in this locality, returning to Donaldsonville in time to leave on the 8:25 a. m. T. and P. train for New Orleans. The visitors were accompanied on their inspection tour by Messrs. F. B. and Walter Lemann, of the Lemann Co., Ltd., who went to Baton Rouge Tuesday to meet them. In New Orleans Mr. Rawl joined W. H. Taylor, chief of the United States Bureau of Plant Industry, with whom he has been making a tour of the state to investigate agricultural conditions, especially those in the sugar section, with a view to the possible development of other branches of industry on the lands that have heretofore been cultivated in sugar cane.
Senator Ransdell went from here Monday night to his home at Lake Providence.

ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

Office of the Board of Commissioners of the New River Drainage District of the Parish of Ascension.

Gonzales, La., Oct. 17, 1913.

PURSUANT to a resolution adopted by the Board of Commissioners of the New River Drainage District of the parish of Ascension, at a special meeting held on Friday, October 17, 1913, I, Leon Picard, president of the Board of Commissioners of the New River Drainage District of the parish of Ascension, Louisiana, by virtue of the authority in me vested and in obedience and compliance with said resolution, do hereby proclaim that a special election will be held of the property taxpayers, qualified under the constitution and laws of the state of Louisiana to vote at said election, in the New River Drainage District of the parish of Ascension, La., on Tuesday, November 25, 1913, between the hours of 7 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of obtaining the sense of the property taxpayers entitled to vote, on the following proposition, to-wit:

To authorize the Board of Commissioners of the New River Drainage District of the parish of Ascension, state of Louisiana, to create an indebtedness of seventy thousand (\$70,000.00) dollars, and issue negotiable bonds therefor, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to run for a period of not longer than forty (40) years, for the following purposes, to-wit: (a) of paying the expenses of organization and the running and operating expenses of said Board of Commissioners; (b) of operating drainage canals, ditches, or machinery owned and operated or controlled by said drainage district; (c) to open, enlarge, cut and extend such canals and streams situated within the limits of said drainage district and such other works of drainage as in the judgment of said Board of Commissioners of said drainage district may be deemed necessary and proper, economically, to drain the property included within the limits thereof.

For the purposes of said election, and in accordance with said resolution, the polling places are hereby designated at Gonzales, Dutchtown, St. Amant and Geismar, the polling place at Gonzales to be at H. C. Lathoux's shop, in the seventh ward of said parish; the polling place at Dutchtown to be at Picard & Geismar's warehouse, in the eighth ward of said parish; the polling place at St. Amant to be at the Misses St. Amant's carriage house, in the seventh ward of said parish; the polling place at Geismar to be at Picard & Geismar's warehouse, in the sixth ward of said parish, and Messrs. Adam Braud, Jr., L. A. Ambeau and Robert Jones have been appointed commissioners, and Vincent A. Gautreaux clerk, to serve at the Gonzales poll; Messrs. J. A. LeBlanc, Yve Landry and Jos. Picard have been appointed commissioners, and J. N. DeLaune clerk, to serve at the Dutchtown poll; Messrs. William A. Avey, M. G. Sevario and Armand M. Marchand have been appointed commissioners, and Hy. Woods clerk, to serve at the St. Amant poll; Messrs. Louis Geismar, John T. Many and J. A. LeBlanc have been appointed commissioners, and J. C. Klos clerk, to serve at the Geismar poll. All of said commissioners and clerks shall serve without compensation.

I do further proclaim and give notice that at 11 o'clock a. m. on Friday, November 28, 1913, the said Board of Commissioners of the parish of Ascension, will meet at Gonzales, in the parish of Ascension, Louisiana, and in open session proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of said election, which result they shall thereafter promulgate by publication in one issue of the official journal of the parish.
