Bank of Donaldsonville Liquidation. Depositors in the defunct Bank of Donaldsonville should remember that claims for any amount appearing to their credit at the time that institution closed its doors must be presented to the state examiner of state banks, or to John S. Thibaut, special agent to the examiner, at the Bank of Ascension in this city on Wednesday next week, March 4. All creditors other than depositors, who may have claims against the bank, are also reminded to file such claims on the date named, and make legal proof as to the justness thereof. Depositors and creditors must comply with this requirement in order to share equitably and ratably in the distribution of assets, and should not fail to give the matter their attention.

Death of Louis Schutzius. Louis Schutzius, a native of Rheinplatz, Germany, and a resident of this community for a long number of years, died at the Charity Hospital, New Orleans at 4 o'clock p. m. last Saturday, aged forty-four years. Deceased had been suffering from heart trouble for about eight months, and had been under treatment in the Charity Hospital for the past three months. His remains were brought to Donaldsonville and conveyed to the residence of his brother-in-law, Alcee Mollere, from whence the funeral took place at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon, with services and interment in the Catholic church and cemetery. Mr. Schutzius is survived by one sister, Mrs. Alcee Mollere, and a brother, Peter Schutzius, to whom our sympathy is extended.

Drainage District to Issue Bonds. At a meeting last week of the board of commissioners of the Bayou Conway Drainage District, Commissioners C. S. McFarland and Jonas Well and Secretary B. J. Vega were appointed a committee to arrange for the issuance and sale of bonds to the amount of \$90,000, divided into two series aggregating \$20,000 and \$70,000 each. The former will be secured by a special property tax of 5 mills, and the latter series by an average tax of 25 cents, both to extend through a period of 25 years. As soon as the bonds have been placed of work will be commenced on the drainage project for which the district was organized, and the completion of which will be the means of rendering available for cultivation many thousands of acres of fertile land in the fifth and sixth wards of the parish.

DISTRICT COURT.

First Week of Regular Jury Term—Informations Filed by District Attorney—Grand Jury's Report—Record of Business Transacted.

A regular jury term of district court was convened at 10 o'clock last Monday forenoon, with Judge Charles T. Wortham on the bench, District Attorney Philip Gilbert, Clerk of Court J. S. Barman and Sheriff E. C. Hanson at their respective posts, and a full attendance of other attaches and members of the bar. The following grand jury was impaneled to serve for the ensuing six months: D. P. K. LeBlanc, Charles J. Judice, Sam. J. Boote, Westley Floyd, N. B. LeBlanc, Vincent Portais, C. A. Jones, Rosemond Brand, Joseph Picard, Alex. F. Gonzales, Nestor Gauthreaux and F. H. Allen. Judge Wortham designated Mr. Boote to act as foreman of the jury, and charged the body along the usual lines.

The grand inquirers came into court Monday afternoon and submitted their report, embodying their findings relative to all violations of the law that had been called to their attention, and setting forth the result of their investigation into the conduct of the various branches of the parochial government. They were thanked by the court for their services, and discharged until further notice.

At the conclusion of Monday's sitting, the judicial body adjourned until Friday morning, when the work of the term was resumed. A record of the business transacted to date is contained in the following summary:

True bills—Louis Seals, Isaiah Allen, Elliott Powers and Paul Falcon, murder; James Thomas and Percy Reynaud, breaking and entering in the night-time with intent to steal; Sullivan Walker, having carnal knowledge of an unmarried female between the ages of 12 and 18 years; Charles Barber, Jr., shooting with intent to kill and murder.

Not a true bill—Lillie Patterson, getting with a dangerous weapon with intent to kill; Chester Bernard and Seaborn Nickens, larceny.

Informations filed by district attorney—Henry Savoie, Railey Winstel, Andrew Wilson, Frank Savoie and Arthur Savoie, refusing to pay road tax; Janvier Marchand, violating drainage ordinance; F. Westhoff, carrying concealed weapon; Tony Falsetta, assault and battery; Joseph Laroche, larceny; Homer Rheams, Louis James, Libby Dixon, Sam. Rheams, Albert Dixon, Doc. Rheams and George Walker et als., disturbing a peaceful assemblage; Roy Spurgeon, carrying concealed weapon; Pat. Hamilton, larceny; W. M. McCallard and W. D. Park, neglecting to make proper entries in books of Bank of Donaldsonville.

Criminal Matters. Pat. Hamilton, larceny; pleaded guilty; 60 days in jail.

James Thomas, breaking and entering in the night-time; with intent to steal; pleaded guilty; remanded for sentence.

W. M. McCallard and W. D. Park, neglecting to make proper entries in books of Bank of Donaldsonville; pleaded guilty; former fined \$2000 or two years in parish jail, and latter \$1000 or one year in jail.

Leopold Kern vs. Sarah Myer Kern, plaintiff granted absolute divorce.

Court adjourned until Monday, March 2, at 10 a. m.
