Porkers and Prosperity.

Hog raising is rapidly becoming
a paying investment for those of
our farmers who have the energy to
raise pork in conjunction with their
other farm products. Last week
the firm of DeBlanc & Landry pur-
chased from Wm. Krugger a Poland
China hog weighing 438 pounds on
the hoof. It was only one year and
three months of age and brought
its owner in round figures \$32. The
animal was slaughtered and con-
verted into sausage and was dis-
posed of within twenty-four hours
after it was ready for market. Were
more of our farmers to enter the hog
raising business in a more scienti-
fic manner than the old custom now
prevailing there would be more pros-
perity in this vicinity. We know of
farmers who after raising the lit-
tle porkers to a certain age permit
them to die from cholera rather
than take the trouble of rooting the
disease from their stock.—New
Iberia Enterprise.

Seed Testing Laboratory.

Farmers of Louisiana should avail
themselves of the opportunity of-
fered by the State University ex-
periment station of having purity
and germination tests made of seed
they expect to plant. The seed test-
ing laboratory is in charge of an
expert in the employ of the United
States Department of Agriculture,
and is well equipped for making rapid
and accurate tests. To secure a
sample take three or four table-
spoonfuls of clover or grass seed or
ten or twelve tablespoonfuls of large
or small seeds. To obtain a representa-
tive sample, handfuls of seed should
be taken at random from the top,
middle and bottom of the sack, and
after thoroughly mixing these hand-
fuls, take the samples for testing.

Snooping at the Dinner Table.

It was not only because of the
vast financial and agricultural inter-
ests involved in California that the
voters of that state defeated prohibi-
tion by a 200,000 majority. The pro-
hibition fanatics who attempted to
force their sumptuary views upon
all the people of the state actual-
ly showed the impudence to incor-
porate in the proposed law a clause
providing that a second conviction
for serving wine at meals in one's
own home should be punishable by
imprisonment. Is it any wonder
those "drys" failed so ignominiously?
But the incident of the attempted
interference with home customs is
characteristic of fanatical prohibi-
tionists wherever they are to be
found. Temperance has no meaning
for them. They would set a man's
domestic aids and the members of
his own household spying at his din-
ner table, or even in his bedroom,
to obtain evidence on which to base
an accusation of crime in a where no
crime was. The principle if allow-
ed, would banish personal liberty in
America. It could and would be ap-
plied in medicine, in education, in
religion and in all the relationships
of daily life.—St. Louis Post-Dis-
patch.

him free notices from week to week.
The paper has always advocated pa-
tronage of our home merchants, and

cept through our local dealers. But

with us, we shall give our orders


