AN ORDINANCE

To regulate the police of cattle in the parish of Ascension; to regulate live stock sanitary matters; to prevent the introduction and spread of Texas fever, or any infectious or contagious diseases of live stock; to clothe all live stock sanitary inspectors appointed by the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board for this parish with full power and authority to carry out the provisions of this ordinance; to prescribe penalties for the violation of this ordinance, and to repeal all ordinances or resolutions of this jury in conflict herewith.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of Ascension, acting on the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board and the United States government such financial and other assistance as the said board and the said United States government may offer for the eradication of cattle fever ticks and other infectious and contagious diseases among cattle, and to that end, all live stock sanitary inspectors appointed by the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board for this parish are hereby clothed with full power and authority to carry out the provisions of this ordinance in this parish, provided that all inspectors thus appointed shall not be paid any salary or other compensation for their services by the police jury of this parish unless it be out of funds especially contributed by said board to this parish for the purpose of paying said inspectors, in which event the said inspectors shall be paid only such amounts as may be designated by the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that it shall be the duty of said parish live stock sanitary inspectors to carry out the provisions of this ordinance relative to the compulsory disinfecting of cattle in the parish of Ascension, and to the proper disinfecting of other live stock, as herein provided, and to do all other things required of them by the rules and regulations of the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board for the eradication of cattle fever ticks and other infectious or contagious diseases among cattle and other live stock in the parish of Ascension.

The said parish live stock sanitary inspectors shall serve during such periods of time as may be designated by the chief executive officer of the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board, and as aforesaid, receive their compensation as above provided only for the months in which they are actually occupied as inspectors under this ordinance.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that from and after the passage of this ordinance, no cattle shall be driven, allowed to drift, or moved by rail, boat or other carrier into the parish of Ascension, Louisiana, from any part of the United States that is quarantined by the United States secretary of agriculture to prevent the spread of splenic or tick fever in cattle, until they have been dipped in an approved manner in the standard arsenical solution or otherwise properly disinfected under the supervision of a duly authorized inspector of the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board, or a veterinary inspector of the United States bureau of animal industry duly commissioned as an inspector of the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc., that from and after the passage of this ordinance, horses and mules entering the parish of Ascension shall be free from cattle fever ticks, (margaropus annulatus). When any cattle, horses or mules are received at a railroad station in this parish from any point in the United States that is quarantined by the United States secretary of agriculture to prevent the spread of splenic or tick fever in cattle, it shall be the duty of the said railroad agent to notify the nearest live stock sanitary inspector, and the cattle, horses or mules must not be removed from the station stock-pens until permission to do so has been received from the live stock sanitary inspector of this parish who may be nearest to said railroad stock-pens, or from a duly authorized inspector of the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board.

Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, etc., that from and after the passage of this ordinance, all persons owning live stock in their charge as owners, agents, or otherwise, cattle in the parish of Ascension, Louisiana, that are infested with, or exposed to cattle fever ticks, shall have all of such cattle at a regular disinfecting station situated in the ward in which said person may reside, or in which his cattle may be, at such times as may be designated by the parish live stock sanitary inspector or inspectors, or by any of the inspectors appointed by the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board working in this parish, for the purpose of having said cattle properly disinfected; provided that all such persons shall, when said inspectors intend to disinfect said cattle for the first time after the passage of this ordinance, receive a written notice from said inspector or inspectors stating the day and date and place at which said cattle are to be brought, and thereafter all of said persons shall be required, without further notice, to bring all of their said cattle to the same station, (unless another station be designated by the inspector in writing), for the purpose of having said cattle properly disinfected every 21 days after the date of the first disinfecting, provided that if the 21st day fall on a Sunday, said cattle shall be brought to said stations for the purpose stated on the Monday following the said Sunday. That the words "properly disinfected" within the meaning of this section of this ordinance are intended to mean that said cattle shall be dipped in the standard arsenical solution provided for that purpose by the parish of Ascension.

Sec. 6. Be it further ordained, etc., that from and after the passage of this ordinance, all persons owning or having in their charge as owners, agents, or otherwise, in the parish of Ascension, any horses or mules that are infested with said cattle fever ticks, (margaropus annulatus), shall have all of said horses and mules at a regular disinfecting station in this parish situated in the ward in which said horses or mules may be at such times as may be designated by the parish live stock sanitary inspector or inspectors in the manner prescribed in Section 5 of this ordinance, for the purpose of having said horses and mules properly disinfected; provided that, in the sense of this section, the words "properly disinfected" are intended to mean that the said horses and mules shall be dipped in the standard arsenical solution provided for that purpose, or simply sprayed

with a proper disinfectant in the discretion of the inspector.

Sec. 7. Be it further ordained, etc., that should any cattle, horses, or mules from any infested area, drift, swim or otherwise enter this parish in violation of this ordinance, the same shall be quarantined and disinfecting at the expense of the owner or owners thereof. Any infested cattle, horses or mules within the parish of Ascension, the owner or owners of which, after due notice, shall fail to disinfect in a manner satisfactory to the inspectors of this parish, shall be placed in quarantine and disinfected at the expense of said owner or owners, and if the owner or owners of said animals be unknown to the said inspectors, such animals shall be quarantined, disinfected and cared for, and any expense thus incurred shall be paid by the owner of such animals before the same are released by the inspectors; all monies so collected shall be turned over to the parish treasurer and placed in the fund set aside for the eradication of cattle fever ticks and other infectious and contagious diseases in cattle.

Sec. 8. Be it further ordained, etc., that nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to amend, alter or modify any of the rules of the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board with reference to its authority to appoint inspectors, or the power and authority of said inspectors granted by the statutes of the state of Louisiana, it being intended that the provisions of this ordinance shall be applied in conjunction with said Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board and the United States bureau of animal industry.

Sec. 9. Be it further ordained, etc., that any person, persons, individual, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction shall, for the first offense, be fined in the sum of not less than \$25 nor more than \$50, or shall be imprisoned in the parish jail, subject to work on the public roads of the parish, for a term of not less than 10 nor more than 15 days; and on conviction of the second or subsequent offense, shall be fined in the sum of not less than \$50, nor more than \$100, or imprisoned in the parish jail, subject to work on the public roads of the parish, for a term of not less than 20 days nor more than 30 days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 10. Be it further ordained, etc., that all ordinances or resolutions previously passed by this police jury in conflict with this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.

Sec. 11. Be it further ordained, etc., that all of the provisions of this ordinance shall only apply to and be effective in that portion of the parish of Ascension situated on the west bank of the Mississippi river, and shall in no wise affect the remaining portion of the parish.

Adopted July 14, 1915, by the police jury of Ascension parish and promulgated July 31, 1915.
