Lowery and other colored citizens of Donaldsonville have filed a petition with the Louisiana railroad commission asking that the Texas & Pacific Railway be required to furnish better accommodations for negro passengers on its passenger trains. The petition asks for two compartments for the negro coaches, so that smokers and non-smokers may be separated, and that separate closets be provided for the sexes.

Felix Acosta has been appointed a member of the police jury of Ascension parish for the second ward to fill the vacancy caused by the removal of J. M. Ourso, Jr., who is now residing in New Orleans. Mr. Acosta has qualified and entered actively upon the performance of his duties. Winds Up Short Season

The McWilliams Planting Company's Australia factory in Iberville parish finished grinding this giving day, after having been in actual operation only twelve days. The mill was started Nov. 11, but two days were lost on account of an accident. A fraction more than 2602 tons of cane were crushed, from which 228,251 pounds of sugar were produced, not including 144 cars of seconds to be dried out later. The grade of sugar manufactured was yellow clarified. Cale T. Chapman, of this city, was chief engineer, and Joseph Bray, of Darrou, was his assistant. Frank Rodriguez of Brusly McCall, president over the sugar-making department and had as his assistant Edmond Truxillo. Johnny Hebert and L. O. Cazes served respectively as cane and sugar weigher. L. P. Begue is the capable manager of the Australia plantation.

Changes in T. & P. Schedule.

Important changes in the schedule of several passenger trains on the Texas & Pacific Railroad will go into effect tomorrow. Train No. 51, which now leaves New Orleans at 7 p. m., will under the new arrangement leave at 9:45 p. m., and the running time to Shreveport will be reduced one hour. Train No. 53, the Texas Limited, will leave New Orleans at 12:30 noon, as at present, but will clip an hour off the time to Dallas and Fort Worth. Train No. 53, the morning local, now leaving New Orleans at 6:35 a. m., will leave at 6:55 a. m. and make 35 minutes faster time to Alexandria than at present. The new time-card, showing the hours of arrival of the above trains at Donaldsonville under the revised schedule, had not been received by the local agent up to the time our forms were closed.

Whorthy Colored Citizen Dead.

Albert Flateau, a worthy colored citizen of this parish, died at his home in the Dutchtown neighborhood at 10:30 o'clock Wednesday forenoon, after a long illness, aged 55 years and 20 days. His remains were interred in the Prairieville cemetery the following day, the funeral obsequies being conducted by Rev. J. C. Gouon, of the Cornerview Catholic church. Deceased had resided in the Dutchtown community all his life, and was an industrious, law-abiding and altogether exemplary citizen, commanding the respect and confidence of all who knew him. He had many friends among the best white and colored of the parish who held him in high esteem and will be deeply grieved to learn of his demise. He is survived by his wife, two sons and five daughters.

L. Echeverria, the successful local dealer in hides, furs, wool, etc., has been buying furs in considerable quantities during the past few weeks, and is receiving shipments of these pelts almost every day. Mr. Echeverria offers as high prices as the market and pays cash on the spot, with the result that he is rapidly building up a big business in this line and bringing Donaldsonville into prominence as a fur market.


