Gasoline for Cleaning Hogs.
 A farmer tells in the November Farm and Fireside that a new wrinkle in cleaning hogs has been discovered. The writer says:
 "Most men dislike the work of scalding a hog because of the steam and smell. A new plan does away with this entirely. The method as reported to me was to take the dead hog to an open place free from litter or straw, and where there is nothing to catch on fire. Then pour a small quantity of gasoline over the carcass and touch a lighted match to it.

Ordinance No. 33 C. Series.
 An ordinance to promote the safety of the public in the city of Donaldsonville by defining the places at which it shall not be lawful to park automobiles, buggies, wagons, and vehicles of all kinds, as well as horses, etc., and providing penalties for violations thereof.
 Section 1. Be it ordained by the commission council of the city of Donaldsonville that it shall be unlawful at all times to park automobiles, buggies, wagons, and vehicles of all kinds, horses, etc., at the following places, to-wit: within fifty (50) feet of the intersection of Railroad avenue and Mississippi street; within forty (40) feet of the intersection of Railroad avenue and Nicholls avenue; on the west side of Railroad avenue between Nicholls avenue and Mississippi street; on the south side of Mississippi street between St. Patrick street and Houmas street; on the south side of Houmas street between Lessard street and Houmas street.
 Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that the chief of police is hereby authorized and directed to have prepared proper signs and have them placed so as to notify the public at what places it shall not be lawful to park automobiles, buggies, wagons, and vehicles of all kinds, horses, etc.
