Real Estate Transactions.
The Wilbert Lumber Company of Plaquemine, which operates the Ascension lumber yard in this city, has purchased from the liquidator of the Bank of Donaldsonville the key lot in the square bounded by Railroad avenue, Albert, Lessard and Division streets, of 60 feet on Division and Front streets, by a depth of 378 feet, and the purchase price was \$1500. The lot at the corner of Railroad avenue and Albert street, in the same block, measuring 65 feet on the former thoroughfare by a depth of 240 feet, was recently sold by the liquidator of the bank to the Castagnos Cane Loader Co., for a consideration of \$1000.

Four automobiles owned respectively by C. C. Weber and E. C. Lawless collided at the intersection of Railroad avenue and Heriville street at about 8:30 o'clock Friday morning. The Weber car was the more seriously damaged, being righted over wheel being totally demolished, the left fender bent, and the radius rod sprung. COMPULSORY DIPPING CONSIDERED

Adoption of Parish-Wide Tick Eradication Ordinance Contemplated by Police Jury—Public Meeting at Gonzales Called to Discuss Proposed Legislation—Appropriation for Carnival Celebration.

Donaldsonville, La., Jan. 25, 1917. The police jury of the parish of Ascension met this day in special session, at the courthouse, and was called to order at 12 o'clock m. Present—Leon Newman, president; sixth ward; Geo. B. Reuss, first ward; Jos. J. Falcon, second ward; Jasmin Tobias, third ward; C. H. Landry, fourth ward; L. W. Armitage, fifth ward; J. G. Nargassans, seventh ward. Absent—Ben L. Cambre, eighth ward, absent by reason of being enjoined from serving by order of court—Jos. Gonzales, seventh ward; E. D. Dixon, eighth ward.

President Newman stated the object of this special meeting to be the adoption of such legislation regarding tick eradication in the parish as the jury may think proper, and the transaction of such other business as may come before the jury. The following communication was read and received:

Donaldsonville, La., Jan. 23, 1917. President and Members of the Police Jury of Ascension Parish, Gentlemen:—The Mohawk Carnival Committee, having decided to give a carnival celebration Tuesday, February 20, 1917, is having a subscription among its members and citizens to help defray the expenses of a grand parade and ball, and would appreciate very much information on the part of your honorable body toward making this a grand success.

Having received the following favorable reply: Respectfully,
MOHAWK CARNIVAL COMMITTEE.

Dr. E. L. Smith, federal inspector in charge of tick eradication work in Louisiana, addressed the jury upon that subject, calling the jury's attention to the work accomplished by his department, and advising the jury to adopt at once an ordinance making the dipping of cattle compulsory in the parish. The subject was discussed at length, the discussion being participated in by the jury, Evan J. McCull, Mayor of Waterbury, of Donaldsonville, and C. C. Weber. Messrs. Lemann and McCull urged the jury to adopt the ordinance making dipping compulsory at once, while Mr. Weber, appearing in the behalf of a large number of the people of the parish residing in the New River country, urged the jury that it not take hasty action, in making the ordinance effective at once, but to defer the date of its becoming operative until April 1, 1918, the date when compulsory dipping will go into effect throughout the state. In taking this position Mr. Weber said that the conditions existing in that section were such that if the ordinance went into effect at once it would create a hardship upon those people. Mr. Nargassans suggested that a meeting be held at the new fair ground, where the state and federal officers in charge of the work be invited to address the people of that section upon the subject, whereupon he offered the following resolution:

Be it resolved, that the police jury as a body attend a meeting of the people of the east bank of the river, in this parish, to be held at Gonzales Saturday, February 10, 1917, at 10 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of discussing the adoption of a parish-wide tick eradication ordinance, and that said meeting Dr. E. L. Smith, federal inspector, Dr. E. P. Flower, secretary of the Louisiana Live Stock Sanitary Board, and all other citizens who may desire to participate be invited to attend and address the same.

Be it further resolved, that a special meeting of the police jury be called to be held Monday, February 12, 1917, at 11 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of taking such action as the police jury may think proper in the matter of adopting a compulsory dipping ordinance.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. Reuss, and on roll-call adopted by a vote of 7 yeas and no nays. Mr. Landry gave notice that at the special meeting of the jury to be held February 12, 1917, he would offer for adoption by the police jury the following ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE
To regulate the police of cattle in the parish of Ascension; to regulate live stock sanitary matters; to prevent the introduction and spread of Texas fever, or any infectious or contagious diseases of live stock; to provide for the appointment of inspectors for the parish, prescribing their powers, duties and qualifications; to clothe the inspectors with the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board for this parish with the same authority as the said board, and to prescribe penalties for the violation of this ordinance; and to repeal all resolutions and resolutions of this jury in conflict herewith.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of Ascension, Louisiana, in regular session convened, that in order to carry out the proper measures for the tick eradication in the parish of Ascension, there shall be, from and after the passage of this ordinance, five live stock inspectors for the parish of Ascension; each of said inspectors shall be appointed by the president of the police jury immediately after the promulgation of this ordinance; they shall each receive a salary of \$..... per month while actually engaged in the duties of their office, and hereinafter provided, payable out of the fund heretofore set aside by this police jury for the tick eradication in the parish of Ascension; said inspectors shall be residents of this parish and state.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, that this police jury does hereby exempt from the provisions of this ordinance the national and other assistance fund provided by the Louisiana State Government, and the United States government, such fund may offer for the eradication of the fever ticks and other infectious and contagious diseases among cattle and other live stock in this parish, and to that end, all live stock inspectors appointed by the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board for this parish are hereby clothed with the same authority as the said board, and to carry out the provisions of this ordinance in this parish; provided that all inspectors shall be appointed by the police jury of this parish unless it be otherwise provided for their services by the police jury of this parish unless it be otherwise provided for their services by the police jury of this parish; provided that all inspectors shall be designated only such amounts as may be designated by the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, that the police jury shall be clothed with the authority to carry out the provisions of this ordinance relative to the compulsory dipping of cattle in the parish of Ascension, and the proper disinfecting of other live stock as hereinafter provided, and to do all other things required by the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board for the eradication of cattle fever ticks and other contagious diseases among cattle and other live stock in the parish of Ascension.

of assisting in the purchasing of hose for the city of Donaldsonville; that while splendid appropriations, Mr. Lemann did not speak in favor of the resolution.

After the adoption of the above resolution Mr. Lemann requested the jury to make an appropriation of \$500 to repair the floor of the courtroom. The jury decided to refer this matter to the finance committee for action at its next meeting.

Mr. Reuss moved that a vote of thanks be tendered to Dr. E. L. Smith, federal inspector, for his splendid address on the subject of tick eradication and the offer of his department to co-operate with the parish in the work. The motion was seconded by Mr. Armitage, and unanimously adopted.

Mr. Reuss called the jury's attention to the custom that prevails throughout the country of having the American flag displayed from the courthouse on the days that court is being held, and moved that the attention of the judge and district attorney be called to this custom, and that they be requested to make such provision as may be necessary to have the flag unfurled on those days. The resolution was seconded by Mr. Landry, and on roll-call adopted by a vote of 7 yeas and no nays.

Dr. P. T. Thibodeaux, parish health officer, appeared before the jury for the purpose of calling attention to a resolution of the jury adopted at its regular meeting, directing the secretary of the jury to communicate with the president of the State Board of Health regarding the investigation of smallpox cases in this parish which had occurred since the doctor also presented a certificate signed by Drs. Cushman, Keyes, Rohard and Smith, to the effect that the cases which he had declared to be smallpox were, in the opinion of the doctors mentioned, genuine cases of smallpox.

After a discussion of the matter Mr. Reuss directed the following resolution: Be it resolved, that the action of this jury in directing the secretary to communicate with the president of the State Board of Health regarding the investigation of smallpox cases in this parish was not meant as a reflection upon the local health officer.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. Tobias, and on roll-call adopted by a vote of 7 yeas and no nays.

The jury adjourned.

Reading Club Re-organized.
The Reading Club was reorganized at a meeting held Wednesday evening in the library of the Donaldsonville High School. Mrs. Walter Lemann called the meeting to order, and the following officers were elected: Dr. John S. Laibaut, president; Walter Lemann, secretary; M. Dona Dery, secretary. Programs for subsequent meetings were considered, and Miss Annie Laurie Pujos and R. S. Vickers were appointed to select a list of topics for discussion. The next meeting of the club will be held Wednesday evening, Jan. 31, when the program will consist of a reading by Miss Mary Jane Stuart and discussion of "The League for the Enforcement of Peace," led by Charest Thibaut.

Qualifies as School Board Member.
L. B. Duplessis, of Duplessis, one of the additional members of the school board provided for in the legislative act of 1916 increasing the membership of the police jury and school board by allowing both the seventh and eighth wards an additional member of each body, came to Donaldsonville last Saturday, and qualified before Clerk of Court J. S. Barman. The constitutionality of the act in question is now being contested before the state supreme court, and the additional police jurors and school board members will not be eligible to serve unless the measure is upheld by that tribunal.

New Jury Commission Appointed.
Judge Philip H. Gilbert has appointed the following citizens to serve as jury commissioners for the parish of Ascension: Adolphe Netter, Donaldsonville; Ernest T. Melancon, Modeste; J. W. Steneston, Burnside; C. N. Gautreaux, Gonzales; J. Wesley Evans, Galvez. The new commissioners, after qualifying before Clerk of Court J. S. Barman, will probably be notified to assemble in Donaldsonville during the first week of February for the purpose of drawing up a venire of grand and petit jurors to serve at the regular term of criminal district court scheduled to be convened here Monday, Feb. 26.

The torpedo boat destroyers Sterett, Lamson and Monaghan, which recently spent several days here on recruiting duty, will pass Donaldsonville Wednesday, February 7, on their way down the river artery, completing a cruise as far up as the Mississippi as they return to their base at Vicksburg. The vessels will stop at Litcher on the return trip and remain there until February 9, when they will proceed to New Orleans. They will leave the latter city February 22 for a visit to Morgan City, Port Arthur, Beaumont, Galveston and Houston, returning to New Orleans April 4.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. Landry, and on roll-call adopted by the following vote: Yeas—Reuss, Falcon, Tobias, Landry, Armitage, Newman; absents—Nargassans; absent—Cambre; absent by reason of being enjoined by order of court—Gonzales, Dixon.

Mayor Walter Lemann, of Donaldsonville, being present at the meeting, stated that he desired to vigorously oppose the resolution on the ground that it was illegal and an intrusion to the educational system of the parish. C. C. Weber, who appeared in advocacy of the resolution, retorted by calling Mr. Lemann's attention to other appropriations made by the jury, mentioning particularly the appropriations for the South Louisiana Fair Association, and for the purpose
