CARNIVAL ASSOCIATION.

Plans for 1918 Celebration Launched at Enthusiastic Meeting.

The movement to celebrate Mardi Gras in Donaldsonville on an elaborate scale next year and annually thereafter, inspired by the remarkable success of the demonstration staged this year under the auspices of the Mohawk Tribe of Red Men, assumed concrete form Sunday afternoon, when the Mohawk Carnival Association was organized at a meeting, held in Red Men Hall. More than forty leading citizens, representing every branch of the community's industrial, professional and commercial activities, were in attendance, and a degree of interest and enthusiasm were manifested which assures the launching of the movement under the most promising auspices and augurs well for unanimous and cordial co-operation in the carrying out of the extensive plans to be undertaken.

The meeting was called to order by J. Sidney Mollere, and Hon. R. N. Sims was made chairman and Chas. A. Gaudin acting secretary. A general discussion of methods of procedure was engaged in, suggestions and views being presented by Messrs. C. C. Weber, Dr. E. K. Sims, R. S. Vickers, Walter Lemann, Abe H. Bloomenstiel and others. After a full consideration of various points, it was decided to fix the dues for membership in the association at \$2 per year, payable in advance. Citizens of Ascension, Assumption, St. James and Iberville parishes will be eligible for membership. In addition to the revenue derived from dues, funds to defray the expense of the annual celebrations will be obtained by means of contributions from merchants and business men of Donaldsonville.

Everybody present at the meeting signed the original membership roll, after which permanent organization was effected by the election of the following officers: Jasmin Tobias, president; F. L. Trepagnier, first vice president; Emile L. Rodrigue, second vice president; J. Sidney Mollere, secretary; Chas. A. Gaudin, treasurer; Abe H. Bloomenstiel, C. H. Landry, Sr., R. S. Vickers and G. D. Bentley, directors. The officers and directors comprise the executive committee, which is invested with authority to appoint sub-committees and to handle all matters pertaining to the conduct of the association's affairs, and the formulation of plans for the Mardi Gras celebrations.

Dr. E. K. Sims, C. C. Weber, R. S. Vickers, F. L. Trepagnier and Chas. A. Gaudin were appointed a committee to draw up a constitution and by-laws, which will be submitted at another meeting to be held Sunday, March 11.

Works Well Both Ways. The big barn in the rear of the Chief office, occupying a position practically in the center of the block, was sold this week by the owner, Jas. Von Lotting, to Alphonse Kahn, and is now being demolished. The material obtained from the structure in renovating and extending the Maurin stable property in Mississippi street which he and Henry Weil acquired recently by purchase from the Bank of Ascension. The removal of this barn will be the means of doing away with a conspicuous fire menace in the block in which it has heretofore been located, and at the same time the material will result in the material improvement of another piece of property elsewhere in the city.

Valuable Saddle Horse Dead. "Eagle," Evan McCall's champion gelding, died last week at a veterinary hospital in New Orleans from an attack of tetanus, which developed after a slight surgical operation intended to improve the carriage of the animal. "Eagle" was carried off highest honors in the five-carried off other classes at the South Louisiana Fair and the Shreveport state fair, and was being groomed for exhibition this year at various fairs throughout the south. The animal was a magnificent specimen of horse-flesh, one pronounced by expert judges to be a practically perfect saddle, and was valued at more than \$1000. The loss sustained by Mr. McCall in the death of this superb horse will be learned of with genuine regret by his host of friends.

New Law Firm. Through the medium of a card appearing elsewhere in today's Chief, announcement is made of the formation of a new law firm composed of John Marks, Sam. A. LeBlanc and A. L. "UP TO" ATCHAFALAYA BOARD.

Lafourche Board's Share of Bayou Lock Cost Provided For.

At a special meeting of the board of commissioners of the Lafourche basin levee district, held here Tuesday, sealed bids were opened for the purchase of \$150,000 worth of five per cent serial bonds to be issued by the district for the purpose of providing the Lafourche board's pro rata share of the cost of building a lock in Bayou Lafourche at Donaldsonville. The highest bid was that of the Whitney-Central Trust & Savings Bank of New Orleans, which was par and accrued interest, plus a premium of \$1500. The proposal further provided for the payment of three and one-quarter per cent interest on deposits, based on daily balances, or the issuance of certificates of deposit maturing six, nine and twelve months after date, bearing interest at the rate of three and one-half per cent per annum.

There being some question as to the advisability of selling the issue outright at this time, because of the fact that the Atchafalaya board has not taken any steps toward a similar issue of bonds for the same purpose, the board determined to await temporarily some action on the part of the Atchafalaya board and accepted the bid of the Whitney-Central bank conditionally under the terms of the following resolution, which was adopted:

"Be it resolved by the board of commissioners of the Lafourche Basin Levee District, that the bid of the Whitney-Central Trust & Savings Bank of New Orleans, for the purchase of the \$150,000 bond issue for the purpose being the highest received by the board, be accepted conditionally upon the Atchafalaya basin levee board adopting at its next meeting a resolution authorizing the sale of its portion of bonds for the building of the lock at the head of Bayou Lafourche, amounting to the sum of \$150,000, provided that the said Whitney-Central Trust & Savings Bank shall allow its bid to remain open with this board until March 9, 1917, in order that this board may ascertain whether the Atchafalaya levee board will adopt a resolution to advertise for sale its similar issue of bonds. In the event that such meeting of the Atchafalaya levee board does not adopt such resolution, then this board reserves the right to reject the said bid of the Whitney-Central Trust & Savings Bank. Provided further, that the said Whitney-Central Trust & Savings Bank shall have the right to withdraw its bid when notified of its final acceptance by this board.

"Be it further resolved, that the president of this board be and he is hereby authorized and empowered for and on behalf of this board to enter into and sign an agreement with the said Whitney-Central Trust & Savings Bank to carry out the purposes and objects of this resolution.

In order to meet the contingency that might develop should the bid of the Whitney-Central bank be withdrawn, the board adopted the following resolution:

"Be it resolved, that in the event the Whitney-Central Trust & Savings Bank withdraw its bid for the \$150,000 bond issue, this day considered, this board shall immediately thereafter proceed to readvertise for the sale of the said bond issue, to be disposed of according to law."

The principal motive that actuated the board in not finally disposing of the bonds Tuesday was that, if the securities are sold at this time, and no action of a similar nature should be taken by the Atchafalaya board, it would mean the unlimited payment of interest on the bonds, representing over the first year a difference of one and one-half per cent on the amount of the issue, since the board would be required to pay five per cent interest to the holders of the bonds, and would receive only three and one-quarter or three and one-half per cent interest on the proceeds of the issue. After the first year this would entail a net loss to the board of approximately \$2250 per annum.

Other bidders for the bonds were as follows: Hibernia Bank & Trust Co., New Orleans, par, interest and \$750 premium, with two and one-half per cent on deposits; Interstate Bank & Trust Co., par, interest and premium of \$1205, and three per cent on deposits; Tillotson, Wolcott Co., and Mercantile Trust Co., par, interest and premium of \$1154; Spitzer, Rorick & Co., par and interest, less \$1480 for expenses and bonds.

ROAD BONDS SOLD.

Baton Rouge Bank Successful Bidder for \$50,000 Issue.

The board of supervisors of Road District No. 2 of the parish of Ascension, at a meeting held at Geismar Wednesday, opened proposals for the purchase of bonds aggregating \$50,000 to be issued by the district and for the construction of approximately thirty miles of gravelled road extending from the East Baton Rouge parish line at Hope Villa to the St. James line on the river front below Burnside. The bid of the Louisiana National Bank of Baton Rouge, offering to buy the bonds at par and accrued interest, plus a premium of \$2251, with the stipulation that the proceeds of the issue and the revenue derived from taxes shall be deposited in the Louisiana Trust and Savings Bank of Baton Rouge without interest, was easily the highest and best submitted, and was accepted by the board. Other bids were as follows:

Stacy & Braun, and Interstate Bank & Trust Co., New Orleans, par, accrued interest and premium of \$210. Blank bonds free.

W. L. Slayton & Co., Toledo, O., par and accrued interest, less \$453 for bonds, attorney's fees, etc.

Watson, Williams & Co., New Orleans, par, accrued interest, and premium of \$165, less \$1350 for expenses.

Hibernia Bank & Trust Co., New Orleans, par, accrued interest, and premium of \$27; proceeds to be deposited in said bank without interest.

Elston & Co., Chicago, par, accrued interest, and premium of \$261; proceeds to be deposited in Metropolitan Bank of New Orleans without interest.

Whitney-Central Trust & Savings Bank, New Orleans, par, accrued interest, premium of \$409, and blank bonds; proceeds to be deposited in said bank without interest.

Boyer, in the person of William, Chicago, par, accrued interest, blank bonds free; proceeds to be deposited in Metropolitan Bank of New Orleans without interest.

J. R. Sutherland, Kansas City, par, accrued interest, premium of \$510, blank bonds free, and fee for attorney's approval opinion. (Check accompanying bid not properly certified.)

William P. Bondbright Co., Inc., Chicago, par and accrued interest, less \$825 for legal and other expenses.

F. C. Hoehler & Co., Toledo, par, accrued interest, premium of \$185, and blank bonds.

Only one proposal for the construction of the highway in the district was received. This was from W. S. Bonner, and contained several propositions, as follows: 1. Road to be built according to plans and specifications of the state highway department, at fixed prices per cubic yard. 2. Bidder to do grading, ditching, banking and spreading of gravel, etc., at \$1550 per mile, gravel to be delivered by railroad and barge, and to be furnished by district; if vitrified clay pipe be used for culverts, \$1 per foot additional for pipe and laying; 24 cents per cubic yard for additional earth for fills, etc. 3. Under same conditions as set forth in proposition No. 2, but with delivery of gravel by railroad exclusively, price to be \$1880 per mile.

It was figured that the cost of the work would amount to from \$3300 to \$3600 per mile under the terms of propositions Nos. 2 and 3, and considerably more than this if the road were built according to specifications of the state highway department. The bids were therefore rejected.

After a general discussion of the matter, a committee consisting of Dr. W. P. Miles and J. N. DeLaune, with President Leon Newman a member ex-officio, was appointed to confer with the state highway engineer and ascertain if financing assistance to be extended from the highway department to build the road under its specifications and supervision. Contingent upon the assurance of this aid, the board adopted a resolution calling a special election in the district to authorize the issuance of additional bonds amounting to \$25,000. There is now available for the construction of the road a sum of approximately \$70,000, consisting of the present bond issue of \$50,000 which has been sold at a premium of \$2251, and \$17,500 contributed by the police jury of the parish. With \$20,000 furnished by the state highway department and \$25,000 derived by means of another bond issue, a total of \$115,000 will be provided which sum will be sufficient to construct the highway under the plans and specifications of the state department.
