BISHOP THIRKIELD COMING.

Will Visit Colored Methodist Congregations in Lafourche Territory.

On Friday, May 25, Bishop W. P. Thirkield of New Orleans will visit the several colored congregations of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the territory from Donaldsonville to Thibodaux, holding a rally with the leaders of these churches at Thibodaux that night. Bishop Thirkield was transferred to the south and stationed in New Orleans some six years ago, with the view to his giving special attention to superintending the colored congregations of his denomination, and this being the first time he has visited the churches of the Lafourche territory, his coming is looked forward to by the several congregations with no little interest. He will deliver an address at the local colored Methodist church, corner of Houmas and Claiborne streets, at 10 a. m., May 25, and the pastor and members extend a cordial invitation to their white friends to hear their distinguished guest. Seats will be reserved for all who will attend.

Among other questions Bishop Thirkield considers serious and is discussing with his constituents in the colored churches, is the matter of the emigration of southern negroes to the north, and he is studying the question of how to so provide better conditions for them that the exodus might be stopped. While in Donaldsonville Bishop Thirkield will be the guest of Rev. P. O. Lowrey, and in Thibodaux he will be entertained by H. L. Baker and Judge C. T. Wortham. This being primarily an educational tour, the bishop will be accompanied by President C. M. Melden of the New Orleans University, a school for negroes.
