## CUT-OVER LANDS AS LIVESTOCK RANCHES

May Be Greatly Improved by Planting Bermuda and Other Pasture Grasses.

Inquiries received by the Live Stock Extension Service, U. S. U. indicate that there is a growing tendency among the owners and prospective purchasers of cut-over lands in Louisiana to use them for establishing cattle and sheep ranches. Among the questions asked by inquirers are the number of acres required per head of animals kept with and without winter feeding; the estimated value of land for grazing purposes; methods of improving them for pasturage; the best crops to grow for winter grazing, silage and grain; the best class and breeds of cattle to use; and a few asked about the construction of fences, sheds, barns and silos.

The observations made by the specialist of this service seem to indicate that cut-over pine lands do not provide sufficient forage in winter to prevent cattle from becoming badly emaciated and showing a high rate of mortality; and inquirers have been advised that while only a few acres will be required for each animal during the summer, even an unlimited range in winter would not suffice to keep the cattle in a condition to produce a profit. They were advised to undertake the improvement of the pastures by planting Bermuda on the cleared land or in open strips in the fenced area which could be cleared up easily, and sow Lespedeza, white and bur clover on the Bermuda sod. Lespedeza, paspalum, and rescue grass seed may be sown on the native grass sod on the better portions of the land, especially along the branch bottoms and other places where there is an abundance of moisture throughout the year, and will spread over the other lands by grazing after they have produced seed. As the lands improve, the white and bur clovers will spread in the same way.

Further improvements in the use of such land for ranching purposes could be made by clearing from 10 to 20 per cent and planting it in corn with cowpeas and velvet beans, sorghum and soy beans for silage, lespedeza, cowpeas and crab grass for hay and harvesting a part of the velvet beans to be ground on a feed mill to supply bean meal feed, which is a good home-grown substitute for cotton seed meal. Corn and velvet beans make fine winter feed for cattle, sheep and hogs if pastured after frost. Oats and vetch sown in October will furnish grazing during the winter and spring.

## CORN GROWERS WILL HELP THE BIG FAIR

Premiums totaling \$1,000.00 have been offered for winners in the general corn display at the Louisiana State Fair this year. The exhibit will be shown in the main agricultural building and, as usual, will be in charge of Prof. A. F. Kidder, of the chair of agronomy at the Louisiana State University. C. B. Williams of the North Carolina Agricultural and Mechanical College, will act as judge. Both officials, Prof. Kidder and Mr. Williams, are experts in agronomy, and the corn exhibitors are assured of the very best consideration.

The corn industry is one of the state's leading industries, many farmers raising the product for market as well as for home use, and the possibilities for future expansion of the business are unlimited. The state fair association appreciates the value of the crop and the importance of its greater development, and is offering the many premiums with a view to encouraging the production of fine quantities of the grain, also to demonstrate the importance of the industry in Louisiana.

There will be lectures as well as premiums, and corn growers will learn many valuable lessons. The contests are open to adults, juveniles and all other corn growers.

## MANY FINE HOGS TO BE DISPLAYED

With Prof. E. L. Jordan of Baton Rouge in charge as superintendent, many head of fine hogs will be exhibited at the Louisiana State Fair, October 31-November 5. Prof. Jordan, who is connected with the department of animal industry, Louisiana State University, has been superintendent of the swine division several years and has performed the duties with general satisfaction. Exhibitors and other swine owners are assured the best of consideration at his hands.

Judging by numerous inquiries received from breeders, a number of the finest herds of the United States will be represented. The exhibit is expected to be record-breaking. Many Louisiana specimens, showing the improvement in the swine industry in this state, will be among the entries. The general competition is open to the world, and liberal awards are to be made. There is keen rivalry among the swine breeders and visitors to the fair this year and are promised an unusual sight in the swine barns.

Under Supt. Jordan's direction all the exhibits will receive proper attention in unloading and loading, and in the matter of pens, shelter and other accommodations. Every necessary convenience, including running water, will be provided, for both hogs and exhibitors. A new accommodation this year for the visitors is modern sewerage, which has been installed throughout the grounds and buildings.

The exhibits will be displayed in large, new buildings, one of which was erected last year at a cost of about \$50,000. There will be plenty of room for the judging which will be done by W. T. Harris, president of the American Duroc Jersey Breeders' Association.
