TRACKS IN POOR CONDITION.

Texas and Pacific Railroad Badly in Need of Repairs. The following is taken from a recent issue of the Commercial-Journal, published at Thibodaux: "The traveling public has been greatly inconvenienced by the poor condition of the Texas and Pacific Railroad's tracks and roadbed from Thibodaux to Donaldsonville. Late trains, poor connections and spilled coaches, we are told have lately been common occurrences. There is no denying or hiding the fact that the roadbed needs attention and needs it badly. The best right of way or track on earth is always requiring attention and can not be maintained without spending money for its upkeep. Rails, bedding and ties need changing and bracing. The condition of the track is fierce and it is a wonder that some fearful accident occasioning loss of life has not already resulted. The public, those interested should look into the matter and call the attention of the State Railroad Commission to this public danger to life and limb. The inconvenience of not selling tickets at this point is also another matter that requires attention and we understand will be remedied. Even if Uncle Sam is in charge the tracks need attention and delaying repairs is extremely hazardous to say the least."

Judging from the many complaints which have been heard here, the tracks and roadbed of the company are in a most deplorable condition along its main line in this section as well as on the branch line complained of by the Thibodaux paper, and should be given immediate attention.

New Officer Appointed. In pursuance of the authority vested in him by an ordinance adopted by the Council at its last meeting, which said ordinance was adopted upon the petition of a number of business men of this city, Mayor E. K. Sims last Saturday appointed Sidney Acosta, son of Jailer Acosta, a member of the police force of this city. About two weeks ago, while detailed on special police duty, Judge Paul Leche, Louisiana Fair, Acosta, with Officer Lau, less, took part in the gun duel with the two negro thieves who were gunned in Railroad avenue shortly after robbing David Israel's store. The two negroes were wounded; one in the leg and the other in the back. The latter died from the effects of his wounds in the Charity Hospital in New Orleans, while the other is being treated at the same institution, and will be brought here as soon as his condition permits and placed in jail to await trial at the next criminal term of court. Young Acosta and Mr. Lawless have been assigned to night duty. With these two vigilant and crack marksmen patrolling the streets of the city at night, there is every reason to believe that the burglaries which have been committed here during the past year will come to an end.
