To Build New Levee at McCall.

The board of commissioners of the Atchafalaya Levee District, having jurisdiction over the levee at McCall, in the first ward, where the serious cave occurred about three weeks ago, will begin in the near future the construction of a new levee to replace the one destroyed by the slough. The engineers have staked out the route of the new levee, which will be at a considerable distance back of the old, and will take up much valuable land, and as soon as the public road, which must also be rebuilt, has been laid out and constructed, the work of levee building will begin. It is said that the new levee will pass near the front of the McCall residence, so near in fact as to leave no room for the road between the levee and the mansion, and that the road will have to be routed back of the building. The road will be rebuilt at the expense of the levee board, but the routing thereof must be done by the police jury, the governing authority of Road District No. 1 in which this particular piece of road is situated. The route will very probably be staked out early next week and the work of grading and surfacing begun at once. It is a source of universal regret that the magnificent grounds of the stately McCall property must be marred to make room for a new levee, which under the circumstances, is absolutely imperative.

Attacked by Vicious Bull.

Omer Robert, one of the co-owners of Peytavin plantation, was attacked and badly bruised by a young bull belonging to Adam Falcon, Sr., in his pasture fronting on the public road, last Sunday morning. Mr. Robert had gone to the pasture to attend to his cows, and in passing near the bull was attacked by that animal and thrown to the ground and severely bruised about the back and side. His cries for help attracted the attention of men who were passing by and they rushed to his assistance and rescued him from the bovine. He was conveyed to his home nearby and a physician summoned. Upon investigation it was found that his bruises were light but that he had suffered a severe shock. He was given the necessary attention and has now about completely recovered.
