## Red Men Take Progressive Step.

At the regular meeting of Mohawk Tribe No. 33, I. O. E. M., held on Monday, the 11th inst., new by-laws were adopted whereby through a small monthly contribution by each member a new fund is created, called the "Medicine Man's Fund." This fund will be divided equally among those members who have been unfortunate enough to have the services of a doctor. Records show that the amount so raised will be ample to meet all the bills in an average year, leaving a surplus to handle epidemics, etc. This new step, originated by Mowhawk Tribe, meeting with general approval by those prominent in Redmanship in Louisiana. It is expected that many, if not all the tribes in the state, will adopt this plan, as it is a most attractive feature, and highly beneficial to both the members and the order itself.

## Town Clean and Sanitary.

W. F. Ernst, inspector of the Louisiana State Board of Health, arrived here last Monday for the purpose of making an inspection of the town. After spending several days on the job he reported to Mayor Joseph N. ## POLICE JURY PROCEEDINGS.

Election Called to Authorize Bond Issues to Fund Parish Debt and Improve Courthouse and Jail.

Donaldsonville, La., July 22, 1921. Pursuant to call of a special meeting of the police jury was held at the courthouse at 10 o'clock this day, with President W. B. Stuart presiding and the following members present: Messrs. LeBlanc, C. H. Landry, Sr., Henry S. Martin, Lester E. Wright, Nestor Gautreaux and J. Yve Landry.

On motion of Mr. Martin, seconded by Mr. Wright and carried, the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with and the said minutes were ordered approved.

President W. B. Stuart explained that the object of the meeting was to consider the calling of a special parish-wide election, for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers, propositions to authorize the police jury to incur a debt and issue negotiable bonds therefor to make needed improvements to the courthouse and jail, and to authorize the police jury to issue negotiable bonds to fund the old debts due by this parish on January 1, 1921.

After a general discussion of the matter, the following ordinance was offered by Mr. Martin, seconded by C. H. Landry, Sr.:

Section One—Be it further ordained, that a special election of the property taxpayers of the parish of Ascension, Louisiana, be and it is hereby ordered, to be held throughout and written orders of the parish of Ascension, Louisiana; said election to be held between the hours of seven (7) o'clock a. m. and 10 o'clock p. m., on TUESDAY, THE 20TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1921, at which said election shall be submitted the following propositions, to-wit:

First—To authorize the police jury to incur a debt of fourteen thousand (\$14,000) dollars and issue negotiable bonds therefor to make improvements to the parish courthouse and jail. Said bonds to bear interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to run for a period not exceeding ten (10) years.

Second—To authorize the police jury to issue negotiable bonds in the sum of sixty-six thousand (\$66,000) dollars, to fund the old debts due by the parish of Ascension on January 1, 1921, as follows:

Bank of Ascension, Donaldsonville, La., the sum of twenty-one thousand (\$21,000) dollars and interest. Picard & Geismar, Ltd., two certificates of indebtedness amounting to the sum of eight thousand and ninety-four and 14/100 (\$8,944.74) dollars and interest. Old certificate of indebtedness held by a New Orleans bank, amounting to the sum of four thousand four hundred (\$4,400) dollars and interest; balance of amount due by the parish to the Gonzales High School, twenty-three thousand (\$23,000) dollars and interest. Said bonds to bear interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to run for a period not exceeding ten (10) years.

Section Two—Be it further ordained, etc., that the secretary of the police jury be and he is hereby authorized and instructed to have prepared for use at said election a sufficient number of ballots, on each of which shall be printed the propositions hereinafter mentioned and enumerated, arranged in such a manner as to enable the voters to vote properly and intelligently on each separately, and also to have prepared for use at said special election, all necessary ballot boxes, the necessary blanks for tally sheets, the rate of voters, assessed valuation of property and compiled statements of the voters in number and amount.

Section Three—Be it further ordained, etc., that the polling places for said special election shall be at the following places in the parish of Ascension, Louisiana, to-wit:

First Ward—Precinct one, Emile Dominique's store; precinct two, Ascension store; precinct three, Mrs. A. C. Dugas' store.

Second Ward—Precinct one, Cassard's store.

Third Ward—Precinct one, court house; precinct two, Red Men Hall.

Fourth Ward—Precinct one, sawmill office.

Fifth Ward—Precinct one, Houmas Store, Burnside; precinct two, Armitage's warehouse, Edgard; precinct three, Brownson's store, Brewerton.

Sixth Ward—Precinct one, Belle Helene postoffice building, Belle Helene; precinct two, Picard & Geismar's warehouse, Geismar.

Seventh Ward—Precinct one, Lanoux's Shop, Gonzales; precinct two, Bertaux's store, St. Amant; precinct three, Lambert's store, Sorrento.

Eighth Ward—Precinct one, Mrs. Landry's store, Prairieville; precinct two, Ruby Dixon's store, Galves.
