Business Failures Decrease.

R. G. Dunn & Co. report that business failures are declining. They have fallen from 1895 for the whole country in January to 1200 in June. The prospects are bright for continued decrease. The note of improvement is beginning to drown out the chorus of alarm.

One of the financial experts says that many of the failures, although it may seem unkind to say so, are excellent signs of returning business solidity, for they have occurred where business had been built upon inflated standards and conducted along unsound, wasteful lines.

This sort of business is gradually disappearing, as it should. The firms which weather the depression will be of the type entitled to endure because their methods are sound and represent real service to the public in return for the profits reaped.

In the meantime deflation goes rapidly on. It is said, by those in a position to know, to have traveled far in one year since the world war as it took several years to cover after the civil war.

L. S. U. Issues New Bulletin on Journalism.

Five courses in journalism will be offered at the Louisiana State University during the session beginning September 21, according to the latest number of the University bulletin, just issued, which is devoted to a description of the journalism courses. These courses include news writing and reporting, advanced reporting and newspaper practice, agricultural writing, the country newspaper and newspaper advertising. According to the announcement, a feature of the department of journalism is its close affiliation with the Baton Rouge State-Times, an evening daily newspaper, which provides facilities for giving students practical training in news gathering and writing, copy-reading, headline writing, proof-reading, make-up and rewriting. Abundant practice in news gathering and desk-work is also provided in the publication of the Reveille, a two-page student weekly, which is published by students under the supervision of the department of journalism. The department of journalism at L. S. U. was organized in 1912, and many of its students are now engaged in active newspaper work.

Director to Speak on Sweet Potatoes.

The question of storing and curing sweet potatoes is being widely agitated by extension specialists, as Louisiana is producing the largest sweet potato crop on record this year and great losses will be sustained therefrom if facilities for curing for the bumper crop are not provided. Realizing that this is a colossal problem and that too much cannot be written or said about it, W. R. Perkins, director of extension at the Louisiana State University in his speech before the Interstate Farm Congress in New Orleans, September 12-17, will dwell mainly on the subject of storing sweet potatoes. Mr. Perkins feels that this will be a most opportune time to call the attention of farmers and farm women to the great necessity for protecting sweet potatoes throughout the winter months. A large attendance is expected at the congress, of not only farmers, but business men interested in the farming industry, and many interesting farm problems will be discussed.

Secretary of the Treasurer Melon declared in Washington a few days ago that the government must raise \$4,000,000,000 in taxes for the fiscal year or face a deficit.

MUST AMEND THEIR CHARTERS.

New Registration Will Delay Elections in 100 Towns.

The discovery has been made that nearly 100 towns and cities in Louisiana, in which elections are scheduled for next January, will be unable to hold said elections because of the new registration in January 1922, made mandatory by the constitution. Some of the cities and towns are operating under special charters, like Baton Rouge, for instance, but a large majority are incorporated under the Louisiana Act of 1898. This will make it necessary for the Legislature to amend the charters of cities that have their elections fixed for early next year; but one general law will cover those incorporated under the Lawerson Act. Legislation on the subject will be necessary because the constitution not only requires a new registration beginning January 1, next, but also provides that the registration books must close thirty days before an election. This places the municipalities affected in a position where they will have no qualified voters, unless the date for the election is changed.

But Governor Parker told them point blank that he would veto such a law if passed. CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS

Opportunities to Qualify for Federal Government Positions.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that a stenographer and typewriter examination will be held in New Orleans on September 13. Other examinations are announced as follows to be held on the dates stated: October 1, dictating machine transcriber; October 5, assistant examiner (patent office).

For the following positions no written test is required, the grade in the examination being determined largely by experience and like considerations, and applications will be accepted until the dates stated: October 4, deputy chief United States game warden, experts in child welfare, and investigator qualified in personnel administration; October 11, assistant in market information, and junior assistant in market information; December 1, bacteriologist, associate, assistant, and junior bacteriologist, and assistant in food inspection and assistant highway economist.

Application blanks and necessary information concerning any of these places to be filled may be secured from the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or from the secretary, tenth civil service district, Customhouse, New Orleans, La. Circulars descriptive of the examinations and places to be filled may be seen at the office of The Chief.

LEGISLATURE CONVENES.

Many Important Bills Introduced on Subject of Highways.

The Legislature convened at Baton Rouge in extra session last Tuesday. Five bills dealing with the road question and carrying into effect the "pay as you go" plan were introduced in the house on the opening day. One provides for a state highway department and a director of highways; another imposes a license tax on automobiles and other vehicles and makes it the duty of the secretary of state to collect the tax; another bill fixes a tax of one cent per gallon on gasoline; another regulates traffic on the highways and a fifth provides for the creation of a good roads commission of three men to be appointed by the governor at salaries of \$6000 a year each.
