FIGHT FOR BEER AND WINE.

One Resolution is Offered in House and One in Senate.

The fight is on for light wines and beer in Louisiana. A demand for a modification of the Volstead prohibition enforcement act began Monday night when the upper house at Baton Rouge convened for the second week of the special session. Senator William F. Durr of law to be a farce so far as the eleventh ward, New Orleans, introduced a resolution to declare the enforcement is concerned and to call upon the Louisiana delegation in congress to do everything possible to have it modified to permit of the sale of light wines and beer.

Senator J. T. Prowell of the tenth ward, New Orleans, had a similar concurrent resolution ready for introduction.

James Barrett of the third ward, New Orleans, forced the same issue in the house by introducing the following concurrent resolutions which went over one day under the rules:

"Whereas, the congress of the United States is at the present time considering a modification of the so-called Volstead Act prohibiting the manufacture of liquors for beverage purposes containing more than one-half of 1 per cent alcohol, and

"Whereas, it is the desire of the majority of the people of this state that the Volstead Act should be amended and modified so as to permit the sale of light wines and beer in wholesale quantities under proper government restrictions, therefore, be it

"Resolved, by the house of representatives of the state of Louisiana, the senate concurring, that the congress of the United States be requested to modify and amend the so-called Volstead Act so as to permit the sale and manufacture of light wines and beer in wholesale quantities under government restrictions."

The Chief sees no valid reason why light wines and beer should not be allowed in package form, but it does not countenance the return of the saloon. A meal can be complete without beer or wine. This has been demonstrated since the Volstead Act went into effect. But to that class of people who have been used to wine or beer with their meals all their lives, and know how to drink it, there does not seem to be any reason why they should be denied its use. The same thing applies to beer. It was the abuse of wine and beer that caused the Volstead Act to be put into effect—along with vile whiskey. Had the beer and wine manufacturers not linked up with distillers to fight the prohibition act the chances are that beer and light wines would be on the market today.

Quebec Goes Wet.

A dispatch says the city of Quebec voted itself wet last Monday by an overwhelming majority, estimated at 12,000, in a total poll of 25,000. The effect of the voting will be to repeal the existing local option law and place the city under the provincial liquor statute whereby the government vends intoxicants in its own dispensaries.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS

Opportunities to Qualify for Federal Government Positions.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that the next stenographer and typewriter examination will be held on October 11.

Other examinations are announced as follows to be held on the dates stated: October 4 and the first Tuesday of each month thereafter, watchman for employment at Washington, D. C. (only ex-service men are permitted to enter this examination); October 5, radio inspector; October 19, aid, division of marine invertebrate zoology.

For the position of mechanical engineer (for vehicular tunnel work), Bureau of Mines, at a salary of \$325 a month, no written test is required; the grade in the examination, being determined largely by experience and like considerations and applications will be accepted until October 11.

Application blanks and necessary information concerning any of these places to be filled may be secured from the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or from the secretary, tenth civil service district, Customhouse, New Orleans, La. Circulars descriptive of the examinations and places to be filled may be seen at the office of The Chief.

Rice Situation at Crowley.

This is about between seasons for the rice men. About all of the earlier rices are in and it is just a little early for the later varieties, says the Crowley Signal. At the association office of the American Rice Growers' Association, however, there was quite a bit of interest shown in the 1000 bags that were offered at 3 p. m. Thursday. The prices ranged from \$3.80 for Nos. 1 and 2 to \$3.55 for Nos. 3 and 4 for the Early Profligate and the one lot of Honduras belonging to Alcide Thibodeaux, consisting of 187 bags, brought the top price of the season. The Standard Rice Company got the lot for \$4.07 and \$3.88. There were three other lots, and all of this was bought by the same company. The other lots belonged to A. Leley of Estherwood, P. Thibodeaux of Morse and Arelide Blanchard of Mermentau.

It is not for The Chief to pass hasty judgement on the Arbuckle situation, but from all accounts the charge against the comedian, even though it falls flat, will not have a tendency to elevate his popularity in the minds of the public.

News has also been received to the effect that Arbuckle has been dropped from the membership roll of the Los Angeles Athletic Club, an exclusive organization.

Notice is hereby given by the police jury of the parish of Ascension as the governing authority of said Road District No. 4, that the bonds authorized therein shall be sold on the same terms and conditions contained in the above proposition, except that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not exceeding six per cent, payable semi-annually, the date of redemption is fixed by the police jury within sixty days from date hereof, in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 of Article 14 of the constitution of 1921.
