Can the sugar industry in Ascension or any parish in the state engaged in the cultivation and manufacture of sugar cane hope to approximate the success achieved during the days and regime of Hon. Wm. Porcher Miles, Gen. J. L. Brent, Henry and Richard McCall, J. C. Colfield, Bernard Lemann, James Teiler, Emile St. Martin and others, who had as valued collaborators R. T. Hanson, James and John Tucker, S. L. Boote, Alfred Beckner, J. M. Breaux, Ellis, J. W. Gleason and others who may have escaped my memory! In those days every one voted the Democratic national and state ticket; incidentally discussed the tariff on sugar, but did not depend entirely upon who was United States senator or congressman from the third district to make it possible for the industry to live. COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Ordinance Adopted Providing for Inspection of Meat Markets.

Donaldsonville, La., December 15, 1921. At a meeting of the commission council held this day, the following ordinances were adopted: An ordinance to repeal the provisions of Chapter XX, Article XXIV of the code of ordinances adopted December 29, 1921, relative to public and private markets. Section 1. Be it ordained by the commission council of the City of Donaldsonville, that Chapter XX, Article XXIV, being sections 84 to 101, both inclusive of the code of ordinances adopted December 29, 1921, relative to public and private markets, and the same is hereby repealed. Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that this ordinance shall go into effect January 1, 1922. Ordinance No. 1, C. C. Series 1921. An ordinance to provide for the public health by requiring sanitary conditions attendant upon the sale of fresh meats within the city limits, to provide for inspection of all markets and places where fresh meats are sold within said city limits, to provide a charge for said inspection, which fee is to be used to assist in the payment of the salary of the inspectors, and to provide a penalty for the failure of the proprietors to pay said fee: Section 1. Be it ordained by the commission council of the City of Donaldsonville, that in order to provide for the public health all places where fresh meats are sold shall be kept in a sanitary condition and free from contamination. Section 2. Be it ordained, etc., that the mayor shall through his special officers cause to be made at regular periods inspections of all markets and places where fresh meats are sold within the city limits, and to close said places or to prohibit the sale thereof in any meat to be used for human consumption. Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that a charge of fee of \$1.20 per annum is hereby levied against the proprietor operating a private market or place where fresh meats are sold from his place of business, which said fees and charges are hereby dedicated to defray the cost of inspections of said markets and places where fresh meats are sold, and to be payable one-half cash in advance and the balance before March 31 of each year. Section 4. Be it further enacted, etc., that upon the failure of the proprietor to pay said inspection charge or upon violation of any of the provisions of said ordinance the mayor is hereby authorized to close said market at once and to prohibit the sale thereof of any fresh meats for human consumption, and the said proprietor upon being found guilty of any violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not more than fifty dollars or imprisonment for not more than thirty days, or both at the discretion of the mayor. Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc., that this ordinance shall go into effect January 1, 1922. The license ordinance was also adopted at this meeting and the minutes with the full minutes of the meeting in next issue of The Chief.
