Would that Donaldsonville could offer to the appointive power in Washington, a candidate for the postmastership as Lafayette has done—one "who cast his maiden vote for Benjamin Harrison in 1892 and has voted the National Republican ticket ever since." But what about Senator Demogeaux who has been holding political positions of honor and trust in his state obtained by casting his political lot in a Democratic primary? Voting a national Republican ticket in Louisiana is like shooting the moon with a popgun. There are two more aspirants for the federal plum in Donaldsonville. Unlike Mr. Demogeaux they have not been voting a national Republican ticket but in other respects like him have been good Democrats for seven or eight years. No Time by Telephone
W. T. Austin, the efficient young manager of the local telephone exchange, announces that henceforth the practice of giving the time of day over the telephone to any and all persons who asked for same, will be discontinued. He says that it has been the habit of some people, and especially children, to call up the exchange at all hours to ask the time. In some instances persons cursing the switch have called to ask the time during the night as well as during the day, stating that medicine must be given the patients at fixed hours and they desired to make sure of the time. The practice disturbs the operators causes a loss of time and interferes generally with the services. All requests made to the operators to give the time of day or night will hereafter be refused. Mr. Austin says that the practice has been abolished at nearly all of the exchanges in the country.



To authorize the police jury of the parish of Ascension, state of Louisiana, to issue refunding, negotiable coupon bonds in the sum of sixty-seven thousand (\$67,000) dollars, to be sold at the first precinct of the parish for a period not exceeding twenty (20) years, at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to run for a period exceeding twenty (20) years, for the purpose of refunding, refunding extending and unifying the outstanding general indebtedness of the parish, existing January 1, 1922, including the balances due on the first and second issues of Parish Road bonds issued under the authority of section 4 of Article 281 of the constitution of 1913, in the sum of \$67,000 of the mill of the general fund, to be secured by pledge of the parish for a period not exceeding twenty (20) years.

On the purpose of said election, and in accordance with said ordinance, the polling places are hereby designated as follows:

First Ward—Precinct one, Emile Dominique's store; precinct two, Assumption store; precinct three, Mrs. A. C. Dugas' store.

Second Ward—Cassard's store.

Third Ward—Precinct one, courthouse; precinct two, Red Men Hall.

Fourth Ward—Emanuel's sawmill office.

Fifth Ward—Precinct one, Houmas Store, Dugaside, precinct two, Armistead's store, Darrow; precinct three, Brewerton's store, Brewerton.

Sixth Ward—Precinct one, Belle Helene post office building, Belle Helene; precinct two, Picard & Geismar's warehouse, Geismar.

Seventh Ward—Woodmen Hall, Gonzales.

Eighth Ward—Glee Club Pavilion, Prairieville.

Ninth Ward—Ruby Dixon's store, Galvez.

Tenth Ward—Precinct one, Berteau's store, St. Amant; precinct two, Lambert's store, St. Amant.

Messrs. W. C. Hayward, Emile Dicharry, and Emile Dominique are hereby appointed to serve as commissioners and Alfred C. Clark as clerk at the first precinct of the first ward poll.

Messrs. Jos. J. LeBlanc, Louis Rome and Fernand Collet are hereby appointed to serve as commissioners and Robert Randi as clerk at the second precinct of the first ward poll.

Messrs. Cale T. Chapman, Sullyer Brassett and M. Paul LeBlanc are hereby appointed to serve as commissioners and Henry Dugas as clerk at the third precinct of the first ward poll.

Messrs. D. Cassard, Parique Falcon and Felix Acosta are hereby appointed to serve as commissioners and E. H. Barton as clerk at the second ward poll.

Messrs. James P. Armistead, A. H. Hunley and Edward Van Lotter are hereby appointed to serve as commissioners and F. K. Sims as clerk at the first precinct of the third ward poll.

Messrs. L. J. Babin, Henry Schaff, Jr. and Henry Buquet are hereby appointed to serve as commissioners and F. E. Richard as clerk at the second precinct of the third ward poll.

And of the polling places herein designated being situated within the limits of the parish of Ascension, and all of the said commissioners and clerks of election shall be sworn in at the courthouse in Donaldsonville, Louisiana, on Wednesday, March 16, 1922, this police jury shall meet at the courthouse in Donaldsonville, Louisiana, parish of Ascension, and in open session proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots, both as to number and amount, and examine and canvass the returns, and declare the result of said election, which result shall be promulgated by one publication in the official journal of the parish of Ascension, Louisiana.
