### BIG FIRE NARROWLY AVERTED.

Prompt Work of Laddies Prevents Threatened Conflagration.

As a result of the prompt and efficient work of the local fire department, what might have developed into a serious conflagration was averted last Monday night. It was about 11 o'clock when a man, connected with the street fair which exhibited here a few days ago, in passing in front of the residence of Cyril Rodellat in Houmas, between Opelousas and Claiborne streets, observed that the house was on fire. He roused Mr. P. Deillat and his family by knocking loudly on the door. Mike Variati, who also noticed the fire, ran to the Phoenix Fire Company's hall and turned in an alarm by ringing the fire bell. All of the companies responded promptly. Vigilant Hose Company was the first on the scene and quickly had a stream working on the blaze. The Phoenix was second and about a stream was working in short order, and despite the strong wind which was blowing at the time, the fire was soon brought under control and extinguished without the necessity of using additional streams. The fire originated in the kitchen and destroyed about one half of that building before it was extinguished. The cottage occupied by Mr. Rodellat is one of several, situated side by side and close together, but by the splendid work of the fire laddies the blaze was confined to this one building and put out before it could communicate to the adjoining buildings, one of which is occupied by John Ramirez and the other by John Capone. Special mention is made to be due to Jos. Fontana and Philip Trepani, both members of Protective Hose Company, for heroic work in fighting the fire, in which work they are said to have risked their lives on the roof of the burning building.

The loss caused by the fire was not very heavy and is covered by insurance.

### WHITNEY COMSTOCK DEAD.

Good Young Citizen and Faithful Employee Passes Away.

Whitney Comstock, one of the best known and most popular young business men of this city, good citizen and faithful and trusted employee, died suddenly at his home at the corner of Opelousas and Lessard streets, Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock, aged 43 years and 4 months. While at work as salesman in the hardware department of B. Lemann & Bro.'s store Wednesday afternoon at about 2 o'clock, Mr. Comstock complained of some of his fellow-employees of a severe pain in the chest and said that he was going upstairs to his room for a while. Nothing was thought of the matter by the other clerks who were very busy at the time. But a few minutes later he came down stairs and passing through the company's private office, sat on a chair, saying that he felt very bad. It was observed that he was seriously ill and he was placed in an automobile by co-employees and hastily driven home. In the meantime Dr. H. Hanson was summoned and he responded promptly; but Mr. Comstock was then in a dying condition and it was seen that his condition was hopeless. He passed away shortly after being brought to his home. Some of the members of the firm as well as several of the employees of B. Lemann & Bro. were at his side when the end came.

Deceased was a son of the late Albert Comstock, in his day a leading citizen of this city. He was a native of Donaldsonville, and since early boyhood had been employed in the hardware department of B. Lemann & Bro.'s big store, and by dint of hard work and close attention to duty had gradually worked himself to the top in that department. He was well posted in hardware matters, had a thorough knowledge of the trade, was very courteous to the patrons of the store and always ready and willing to do everything in his power to please. He enjoyed the fullest confidence of his employers, by whom he was looked upon as one of their most valued employees, and his passing away will prove a severe loss to them.

He was a prominent member of the local lodge of Elks, Olive Camp, Woodmen of the World, and one of the charter members of Volunteer Fire Hose Company. He was a hale fellow well met, with a kind word for everybody, and his friends were legion. His sudden demise has proven a great shock to the entire community.

The funeral took place Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Impressive services were held at the Catholic church, Rev. Father Blanchet of St. Jules church, Valenzuela, officiating in the absence of Rev. Father C. M. Chambon, following which the remains were laid to rest in the family vault in the Catholic cemetery. The funeral was one of the most largely attended held here in a long time, which attested the esteem in which deceased was held in this community.

### Mr. Comstock was unmarried.

His widowed mother, Mrs. Albert Comstock, predeceased him by the Spanish-American war. He is survived by one brother, Albert Comstock of New Orleans, and several other relatives. To them The Chief extends deep sympathy in their great bereavement.

### Octogenarian Passes Away.

Mrs. Laura Michel, formerly a resident of this city, died at the Toussaints Home in New Orleans, yesterday morning at 4 o'clock at the advanced age of 84 years. She had been paralyzed for several years, and resided in a house on the property of Miss Pauline Rose in Mississippi street, and was given proper care and attention by Miss Rose. In October last year, she was removed to the Alm house for treatment, but owing to her advanced age she made no progress but gradually grew weaker until she finally passed away. She was a kind-hearted woman and a devout Catholic. The remains were brought to this city today via the Texas and Pacific railway, and the funeral took place upon the arrival of the train at 10 o'clock. Services were held at the Catholic church and interment in the Catholic cemetery. He is survived by five great grandchildren and several nephews and nieces. May her soul rest in peace!

### In Memory of Mrs. E. W. Durant.

See Nanny Miles.

There died in Charleston, South Carolina, last Friday, Mrs. E. W. Durant, nee Nanny Miles. Nanny Miles was married twice, first to Wm. Gregg Chalmers, a gallant South Carolinian, then to E. W. Durant, collector of the port of South Carolina, under the Roosevelt administration. Mr. Durant, a good business man coming from Wisconsin, soon grasped the idea of forming the Miles Timber Company at Vacherie to convert into lumber 3000 acres of cypress lumber at that place. He was married to Nanny Miles then widow Chalmers at this place. Rev. Beverly Warner performed the ceremony. Mrs. Durant is survived by her husband and eight children four from her first and four from her second husband; one brother, Dr. W. F. Miles and three sisters, Misses Beattie Miles, Mrs. Pierson of New Orleans and Mrs. Middlecor of Hendersonville, N. C.

Her first child, now 28 years old, was named Miles, after his grandfather, Hon. Wm. Forcher Miles. The gifted Mr. Miles wrote an ode, entitled: "Lines to My First Grandson," composed of five verses, the last of which reads as follows: "Be a true gentleman from spur to crown, "Ever cherish her glory and fame, "Upon those who'd degrade her forever frown down, "And keep honored and spotless her name."

Mrs. Durant was pretty, amiable and accomplished and possessed a kind and gentle disposition, inherited from her distinguished father. She had a rare faculty for art and literature, and was the authoress of a book of "poetry and prose." All in all, a noble woman. Only two years ago, when on a visit here, she called and asked to see me. My last meeting with her will always be remembered and exchanged good wishes. Today, two brief years later, she is dead. Such is life!

### Receives War Decorations.

Dr. H. F. Vulliamy, well-known local veterinary surgeon, a few days ago, received from England two medals, emblematic of decorations bestowed upon him by the British government for conspicuous service during the world war. One of the medals is of silver, on one side of which appears a bust of King George of the British empire and on the other the miniature of a mounted soldier, with the figures 1914-1918, indicating the years of the war. The other is a bronze victory medal, on one side of which appears in miniature the statue of the goddess of victory and peace and on the other side the inscription "The Great War for Civilization, 1914-1918." These medals were awarded to the doctor for services rendered in his capacity of veterinary surgeon on transport ships during the great conflict, and are greatly prized by him. The doctor also served during the Spanish-American war as a veterinarian in the British marine and a medal has been awarded to him for that service but he has never applied for the same.

### Body of Murdered Woman Interred Here.

The body of Mrs. Arthur Pichon, nee Lita Ramirez, who was stabbed to death by her husband while in a drunken condition, at their home, 901 Royal street, New Orleans, last Tuesday, was brought to Donaldsonville Wednesday and buried in the Catholic cemetery here. Deceased was a native of this city, and a daughter of Arnold Ramirez, better known as "Hamcock," and a niece of Placide Ramirez of this place. The funeral took place upon the arrival of the Texas and Pacific train at 2 o'clock p. m. According to the reports published in the New Orleans papers, Pichon, while drunk last Tuesday afternoon, backed his wife into a corner of their home and stabbed her twice in the breast and then buried the knife in her face. The deed is said to have been provoked by a chastisement administered by Mrs. Pichon to Arthur W., fourteen-year-old son of the murderer by a previous wife, which is said to have greatly infuriated the drunken man.
