Excitement at Modeste.

Some months ago mention was made of a mysterious burglar who broke into the store of a merchant at that settlement. The burglar has so far escaped arrest. The story now is of a reputed negro desperado who entered the premises of Etienne Julian, an old-time negro, well-known and respected by the entire settlement of Modeste. Julian hastened to the high officers in Donaldsonville and told his story. At 2 a. m. last Sunday an intruder whom he designates as Sol Brooks entered Julian's yard armed with a shotgun and ordered him to open his door. Julian considering that discretion was the better part of valor, refused to comply. Sol Brooks then threatened to "blow his black head off" if he didn't come out. Julian was cautious and refused to "take any chances." The desperado then retraced his steps to the front gate and at a parting salute to Julian discharged the shot gun on the public highway. When daylight broke Julian hastened to the county seat, and the following charges were sworn to by Julian against the blood-thirsty Brooks, before Judge Maurin: Unlawfully entering the yard of Julian with a dangerous weapon, to-wit: A shotgun, in violation of Section 321 of the Revised Statute discharging firearms on the public highway, in violation of Act 31 of 1886; disturbing the peace and threats to kill. The constable of the 1st ward, Arthur Schuch, went after the accused who will have to face Judge Sam LeBlanc at the next term of court. Julian says he is satisfied to let the law take its course but in the meanwhile he is preparing for emergencies.

COURTHOUSE AND JAIL.

Contracts Let for Repair of Buildings and Construction of New Vault.

The finance committee of the police jury met at the courthouse last Tuesday for the purpose of receiving and opening bids for certain repairs to be made to the courthouse and jail and for the construction of a new fire-proof vault for the clerk of court's office. There were present W. B. Stuart, president of the police jury, and J. Clarence LeBlanc, police juror from the Donaldsonville ward and member of the finance committee, C. H. Landry, Sr., of the fourth ward, the third member of the committee, was unable to be present, being confined to his bed by sickness.

Several bids were received from the following persons: Jos. Diehrich of Plaquemine and J. L. Messina and J. I. Landache of this city for the entire work; H. Schaff & Son for the plumbing, guttering, roofing, etc., and V. A. Rodrigue for the painting, glazing, etc.

After a careful consideration of the matter, the committee awarded the contract for the construction of the vault to J. I. Landache and for the repair work to the courthouse and jail to J. L. Messina.

The vault is to be located on the outside of the courthouse at the southwest corner thereof, and to be connected with the building by a door leading from the present grand jury room, and there is to be one window at the west end. The vault will be 19x21 feet and 10 feet high, and is to be built of concrete throughout, supported by heavy steel beams and iron rods. No wood will be used in the construction.

The repairs to the courthouse, include the replacing of all broken slate and all iron on the roof and copings by new slate so as to make the whole leak proof. New gutters and pipes throughout; painting the entire structure inside and outside; new floor in courtroom and main hall downstairs; repairing of the plaster in entire building; construction of ladies' waiting room in the present office room of the clerk of court; replacing of all broken glass in doors and windows, etc.

The jail repairs include fixing of the chimney tops, rebuild lower floor, repair second floor, paint steel cage, screen entire building, etc.

The work is to begin at once and to be pressed to completion as quickly as possible. When finished the parish will be provided with an absolute fireproof vault for its conveyance and mortgage books, its court records, etc., and the courthouse and jail buildings will be very much improved in appearance.

Shoe Stock Sold at Auction.

The stock of shoes in the Simon Bolag shoe store in the Maonic building in this city was sold at public auction by Sheriff George H. Richard today and adjudicated to S. L. Levy of Napoleonville for the sum of \$745. The safe and fixtures was purchased by the local Masons for \$84. The sale was made under a writ of *fa* issued by the twenty-seventh judicial district court in the case of B. Rosenberg & Sons vs. Simon Bolag.



HORSE SHOW PARADE.

To Be One of the Attractive Features of South Louisiana Fair.

What promises to be one of the most attractive features of the South Louisiana fair which opens in this city today, is the horse show parade which will take place tomorrow at 4:30 p. m. through the principal streets of the town and at the fair grounds. The following article on the subject is taken from the New Orleans States:

"The cream of social riding talent of New Orleans, Baton Rouge and towns in the vicinity of Donaldsonville will participate in the horse fashion show that will be one of the big features of the fair to be held there October 7 to 15. Announcement of this was made Wednesday by Evan J. McCall of New Orleans who besides being director of the show, is senior judge.

Mr. McCall announced that participants in the show will lead the stock parade Sunday at 4:30 p. m. through the fair grounds and town. Horses from New Orleans, he announced, will be sent Thursday at 11 a. m. on the steamer Grace. The boat will leave from the foot of Canal street.

There will be seven classes Sunday night and seven Wednesday night, Mr. McCall announced. Besides ribbons, premiums consisting of bridles, blankets, whips and other useful riding equipment will be awarded. Entries positively will close Saturday at noon, according to Mr. McCall.

Other judges besides Mr. McCall will be G. W. Sentel, Bunkie; John Truxillo, New Orleans and H. E. Wright, New Orleans.

Levee Board Sells Bonds.

The board of commissioners of the Lafourche Basin Levee District, at a special meeting held yesterday, sold a \$500,000 bond issue to the Bank of Baton Rouge. The price paid for the bonds was par and accrued interest, plus a premium of \$16,800, with the proceeds to be deposited four-fifths in the Bank of Baton Rouge and one-fifth in the Bank of Ascension of this city. The successful bidder also to pay for the legal opinion and blank bonds. There were six other bidders: The price for which the bonds were sold is equivalent to a sale of \$103 36-100, and is considered to be a very good sale. The proceeds of the bonds is to be used in constructing new levees and repairing the old ones, with a view of bringing the levees of this district up to standard grade and section within the next two years.
