

Our Young Men.

In a former issue we spoke of "Quiet Revivals," and we now wish to speak of something pertaining to the young men of our city, which has in it something of the same nature, i. e., quiet revival.

Last October there was inaugurated in the Coliseum Place Baptist Church a Saturday night prayer meeting for young men of that faith, but the meetings were participated in by young men from various other denominations, and by young men who have no regular Church connections. The Lord has blessed the efforts, so that to-day there are two other places in the City where these meetings are held, viz: Carondelet Street Methodist Church, on Monday evenings, and the Presbyterian Mission Church, corner Pleasant and Laurel, on Tuesday evenings. The meetings open at a quarter to eight, and every young man in the City is invited to each and all of these places on the evenings named.

It is hoped that ere long every evening in the week will be occupied by the young men in other Churches, that there may be a home for the young men to go upon any evening they may desire. There are yet three nights, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, and which three Churches in the City will throw open their lecture rooms for this noble and Christian purpose? We will publish a list each issue, of the Churches and the evenings, that the young men may know where there is a "Sweet Hour of Prayer."—[N. O. Baptist Messenger.


